DO YOU KNOW? - John Taylor

Do you know about the "Iron Room" in Pett?

Many Pett residents still remember it with fondness. The problem is that it is difficult to find exact dates in its history as folk's memories become a little clouded. So if you can remember any dates associated with this article, or know of any inaccuracies in it, please let me know. In the meantime I would like to thank the people who helped me by providing the information that follows.

The Iron Room (or Tin Hut as some call it) stands next to Rose Cottage in Pett Road and nearly opposite Watermill Lane. The best view of the corrugated iron roof and sides is from the footpath that runs beside the cottage and which has recently been cleared. It was built by Florentia Lucas-Shadwell, who was the daughter of the Rev. Henry Wynch, Rector of Pett 1823 -1853, in memory of her husband William Drew Lucas-Shadwell. He died in 1875 and the 'Room' was probably built around the turn of the century. It was bigger than the existing building and was first used as a Mission Hut. From then on it was used for many things. In 1909 the Pett Cricket club held a money-raising concert there. There was a time when it housed the County Library. Several organisations used the Iron Room for both their regular meetings and for fund raising events. The Pett, Guestling and Fairlight branch of the Women's Institute, which was started during the First World War, held their meetings in the 'Room'. The local branch of the British Legion met there and at one time tried to buy it, but apparently it was owned by the Church at Fairlight and the Vicar there vetoed the sale. As Pett had no Village Hall until 1923 it was often used for village entertainments including some film shows and other fund-raising events that raised money towards the cost of the Pett Village Hall. Between the First and Second World Wars a Slate Club was run in the Iron Room.


Ernest George Sinden, who was Church Warden of Fairlight Church for 17 years, used to show magic lantern slides in the Iron Room before the war. He was a typical Sussex farmer – firm, but fair and on one occasion turned two men out from the show. They had had a couple of drinks outside the village before coming to the lantern show and during it one of them passed wind. Ernest took them to task and said that the next person who did that would be 'out' – and so it was when wind was passed for the second time.

After the Second World War Mr and Mrs Mercer ran a shop in the Iron Room. This shop seemed to sell everything from haberdashery to hardware and was very popular in the village. The Mercers lived on the opposite side of the road at Hither Green; they also ran a Christmas Club from the shop which closed in the early 1960s.

Then in the 1960s Archie Beck (a builder from Guestling) and Arthur Farnes converted the Iron Room into a garage with double front doors and in doing so made the building considerably smaller. Ken Maitland kept his taxi in this conversion and for a while lodged with the Beeching sisters, Grace and Edith, who lived in Rose Cottage.

In 1980 the change in Parish Boundaries meant that the Iron Room was no longer situated in Fairlight, but in Pett. Perhaps this makes sense as it was used far more by the people of Pett than those of Fairlight. Now it looks rather forlorn as it sits there next to the cottage. However this corrugated iron structure has had its place in the history of life here and in its day has been a very important part of the Pett village life. It is well we don't forget it.

Garden Club – Sandy Andrews

The garden club's March meeting was given by landscape and garden designer, Nigel Philips. During a very amusing and informative talk, illustrated with slides of some of his major projects, he explained the why and how of using water in the garden, in both new and restoration schemes. Water is a dynamic element in



garden design, and each year it will be a feature in most of the show gardens in Chelsea Flower Show's Main Avenue. A pond can be used in many different ways: to enhance a beautiful building and to be seen from it; to harmonise with other features in a landscape; to provide a wildlife dipping pond for children in a distant corner or in a wilder part of the garden; to provide a habitat for fish. Wherever the pond is placed it should make the most of potential reflections, which could be a group of trees, or a single, beautiful specimen tree. If a pond is meant to be seen from a house, its length rather than its width gives the greatest view of the water.

Ponds can be formal, raised, or landscaped to appear natural. Once the hole is dug, if a butyl liner is to be used a geotextile lining (or old carpet) must be laid first. The pond should be at least a metre deep in the middle, this keeps the water cool which deters the growth of algae. Access is best restricted to one side of the pond, which should always be shallow and never at a forty-five degree angle, which is the most dangerous slope for climbing out of a pond you've fallen into. The remaining surrounds can be used for marginal planting. Structures such as jetties can be built to overhang the water. A smaller pond can be installed above a larger one, a pump will circulate water from the larger to the smaller allowing for the creation of trickling waterfalls. Movement helps to keep the water oxygenated. Hard surfacing, which can also overlap the pond's edge, can be used where clean straight lines or a sweeping curved edge is wanted. In large ponds reed beds can be established. Reeds like to be in four inches of still water and can filter out excess nutrients. Butomis Umbillatus is another effective cleaner. Making a shallow slope to the sides of a natural pond will look more attractive than steep sided banks.

When you've finished the pond, what you do with the spoil will depend on how much of it you have and how much space is available. Nigel showed us a mound he designed with a double helix path, but in a smaller area it might be possible to distribute the top soil around the pond. Happy digging.

From the Rector - Richard Barron

The Power of Sacrifice.



Support From On High Mike Russell of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

One of the great advantages of being able to fly is that you can get to watch great sporting events for free! This season at the Amex Stadium, home to Brighton and Hove Albion, a peregrine falcon has used its aerial prowess to get a real birds eye view of 'The



Seagulls' home games by regularly perching on the North Stand and observing the antics taking place on the pitch below and remains totally un-phased by the raucous sound of 30,000 supporters at the regular home games.

Peregrines are now becoming a regular sighting in our towns and cities and tall buildings are ideal for these birds as it gives them a high advantage point to observe what is going on around them. Stadiums can be ideal as they often attract lots of feral pigeons that seek out the dark shelter high up in the roof, but this is what also attracts the peregrines as, in urban environments, pigeons make up a substantial proportion of their diet. The presence of a peregrine will really unsettle the pigeons so it is in fact doing the football club a great service by reducing the number of birds that can make a mess around the stadium. I'm sure it is also impacting on the number of gulls as well, though that's not such a good thing for a team that's nicknamed 'The Seagulls'.

When Brighton used to play at the Goldstone Ground I occasionally took my two young sons there and was surprised by how many different birds that I saw there over the years. Perhaps the most surprising was one wet autumnal evening, Brighton were playing local rivals Portsmouth, and at a crucial point when Portsmouth were attacking, a woodcock flew very low across the penalty area. Now, I think I was probably the only person in the crowd to notice and as I possess every birdwatchers inability not to shout out the name of a bird when you see it; this I duly did much to the embarrassment of my offspring. It is highly likely that the woodcock was a disorientated migrant from Northern Europe having just arrived from over the channel.

Another time, again at The Goldstone, I raised my eyes to the skies only to see a sparrowhawk gliding serenely over the stadium; again I shouted out at the very time the crowd had gone unusually quiet, attracting quite a few odd looks from fellow supporters. A barn owl was also seen there many years ago, perched on one of the floodlights.

At other times I have seen hobbies and common terns over the old Wembley Stadium and I know that there are other birdwatchers around that combine their love of football and birds by keeping a stadiums list!


To have a peregrine falcon, the king of the skies, as a supporter really shows the pure class of team, so perhaps I should suggest they change their name from 'The Seagulls' to 'The Falcons!'

Last month several welcome visitors came along to the Defibrillator training session held by Rother Responders. When someone collapses with a cardiac arrest, their heart can go into a kind of quivering limbo called fibrillation. One of the most effective ways to get it going again is with a sudden powerful

electric shock—and that's the life-saving job a defibrillator does. Pett Village is lucky enough to have one of these pieces of equipment – and it is vital that villagers know how to use it. This used to require hours of training, but now portable, fully automatic defibrillators are being installed in public places so even amateur first-aiders can administer them with minimal instruction. As someone who has had major heart surgery in the past I am reassured that it is there.

At the meeting one of our members was lucky enough to win the ballot to go to the WI Centenary Garden Party at Buckingham Palace in June. A report from them will follow after the event. 

Nature Notes - Alan Kenworthy

On sunny days you may have noticed a few bumblebees foraging on the early spring flowers. They are most likely to be the fairly large buff-tailed bumblebee, or the tree bumblebee that are well known for emerging early from hibernation. Most other bumblebee species emerge a bit later. However, this column is not about bumblebees, but about their lesser known cousins, the solitary bees.

There are about 250 species of bee native to the UK – The honey bee, 24 bumblebee species, and 225 solitary bee species. Probably the reason that many people don't know about solitary bees is that many of them are very small – only a few millimetres long and look more like wasps. The larger ones may also be overlooked, but for a different reason; they are furry and look like small bumblebees. So this raises a couple of questions – how do you tell the difference between solitary bees, wasps, and bumblebees.

The really telling difference between solitary bees and wasps is their diet. Wasps get their protein from other insect species, whereas solitary bees are vegetarian and only eat pollen. Sadly, however, both are partial to a quick slurp of nectar, so if you see one visiting a flower, you can't be sure whether it is taking nectar, pollen, or both. Fortunately, the female solitary bees tend to keep the pollen conspicuously around their bodies, some species on their legs and some species under their abdomen, and provided the pollen is yellow enough, it should be easy to spot.

Telling solitary bees from bumblebees is a bit trickier, and the only positive way of doing it is to be familiar with a few species and their habits so that you can learn which is which. If you have a flowering currant in your garden, it will almost certainly be visited by the Flower Bee (*Anthophora plumipes*). This looks like a small black bumblebee with yellow hairs on its hind legs where it collects its pollen. Another one to look out for is the Tawny Mining Bee (*Andrena fulva*). The females emerge in early spring and you will often see them cruising an inch or two above your neatly clipped lawn (yes, me neither!). They are an unmistakable rich tawny gingery colour and they are looking for somewhere to nest. The nest will be a neat straight hole between tufts of grass and it will be surrounded by a small volcano of excavated earth.

It is the habits of the solitary bees that set them apart from other bees. Honey bees and bumblebees are social bees. They found a colony of worker bees that will help to gather nectar and pollen to feed the growing brood. Honey bees put aside nectar in the form of honey to see them through to spring because most of the colony survives the winter in the hive. It's a habit that beekeepers and the rest of us are grateful for. Bumblebee colonies don't live through the winter and once the workers have helped the queen to raise the male and female bees that will found the next generation, the

colony dies off. Only the newly mated queens survive the winter. Solitary bees have no workers to help them. When the female is fertilized in spring, she digs a hole – in wood, soft mortar, or earth, depending on the species – and then lays an egg at the bottom. Alongside the egg she deposits a pile of pollen, and then closes off the cell before laying another egg, piling in more pollen, and sealing off the cell. She will carry on doing this until the hole is full. That year's males and females then die off. The following spring, the egg nearest the end starts to get warm, the egg hatches into a larva which eats the pollen, turns into a chrysalis, then the adult male or female emerges from the chrysalis, bites through the seal, and goes off in search of a mate. Then the next egg hatches, and so on. The material used to seal off the cells varies from species to species. Many use mud, but if you see small semicircles cut out of your lily leaves then it is probably a leafcutter bee that uses the lily leaves to seal off each cell.

One way to attract solitary bees to your garden is to put up a bee hotel. You are probably familiar with these which have bunches of short lengths of bamboo built into a wooden box. These are ideal for solitary bees and if you put them less than six feet from the ground on a south or west facing wall, you are almost guaranteed to see the cells filling up. This time of year is an ideal time to put them up as well.

The reason that you may want to put one up is that solitary bees are great pollinators. If you look at your fruit trees or bushes when they are in flower you will see that they are being pollinated almost exclusively by solitary bees. So put up a bee hotel, enjoy watching the bees visiting it, and enjoy a bumper crop of apples. Isn't nature brilliant?!


