

While lecturing in Paris, noted Harvard Professor of Symbology Robert Langdon (Tom Hanks) is summoned to the Louvre by French police to help decipher a bizarre series of clues left at the scene of the murder of the chief curator, Jacques Sauniere. Enter Sophie Neveu (Audrey Tautou), gifted cryptologist and Sauniere's granddaughter. Neveu and Langdon are forced to team up to solve the mystery, and from there the story is propelled across Europe as it balloons into a modern-day mini-quest for the Holy Grall, complete with alternative theories about the life of Christ, ancient secret societies headed by historical figures like Leonardo Da Vinci, secret codes, conniving bishops, daring escapes, car chases, and, of course, a murderous albino monk controlled by a secret master who calls himself "The Teacher."

Hanks and Tautou are just fine together but not exactly a memorable screen pair; meanwhile, Sir ian McKellen's ecenery-chewing as pivotal character Sir Leigh Teabing is just what the film needs to keep it from taking itself too seriously. In the end, this hit movie is just like a good roller-coaster ride: try not to think too much about it--just sit back and enjoy the trip.

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RYE BAY COASTGUARDS

We are in to our quieter season now, but still we get the occasional calls to keep us on our toes.

We have twice been called to Winchelsea Beach to someone in the dark, possibly stuck in the mud and waving a light. On both occasions it was a lug digger with a head torch. They were false alarms but we would much rather go and be sure of there being no problem. The mud holes in that area are becoming ever more a potential hazard.

One Sunday in November, we exercised with Pett Rescue, locating a "body" on the beach for stretcher evacuation by the Rescue Boat. It was a tragic irony that the exercise finished with us and the Rescue Boat being called to Ecclesbourne Glen and a report of someone over the cliff. It was the sad task of the Rescue Boat and Hastings Lifeboat to recover a body for real at the base of the cliff. Once it was apparent that it wasn't going to be a cliff recovery for us, our job was to talk to the first informant who had seen the man go over and liaise with the Police. We should have exercised with Rye Lifeboat on Sunday 3rd December, but the weather was simply too rough to risk injury to people or damage to the boat.

On a happier note, Steve (Sparra) Harris was awarded his Coastguard Long Service Medal (for 20 years service). These used to be relatively common in the Coastguard companies, but are becoming less so with a more mobile population and more youngsters moving out of the area for work. The presentation saw The Beach Club crowded with family, friends and as many serving and retired Coastguards as have probably been seen together in one place locally. Our thanks go to all those who turned up and made it a great evening for Sparra and to Mary Cooke and Sarah Blackman for preparing the wonderful spread.


I was waiting for the Rye bus at the bottom of Chick Hill when I noticed what I thought was a squirrel I the trees opposite; only it didn't look quite right. As it came into full view on my side of the trunk I saw that it was a rate. From the bus on the way home I enjoyed a much nicer sighting — a hobby on one of the posts alongside the Military Road. So even a shopping trip (not one of my favourite activities) turned out to have some real wildlife interest.

The gales at the end of November brought down the rest of the leaves, revealing the trees in all their winter beauty. I think silver birches, especially, are at their loveliest when their graceful branches are seen against a winter sky. With their shining trunks and golden autumn leaves they are

surely one of the most attractive of all trees.

At the time of writing there are still swallows around. I wonder whether eventually they will overwinter here. Not so long ago it caused quite a stir when a blackcap was spotted in a local garden in January. Now it is quite common for blackcaps to spend the winter with us. The problem is that if we get a cold winter there will be no insects for swallows to feed on and they will die. Blackcaps will come to garden bird tables, so perhaps in the future swallows will learn to do so too, especially now that dried insects are available for garden feeders.

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FISH OF THE MONTH RECIPE

Local cod is at it's best this time of year. If you are worried about the sustainability of this fish, the type of nets used by the Rye bay fishermen are of a large mesh. This means immature cod escape. Locally cod is mostly harvested between the months of November and January.

One pot Cod with Black Olives and Tomatoes

ingredients

175g black olives in oil, stones removed

1 large onlon, roughly chopped

400g can chopped tomatoes

4 boneless cod fillet each weighing about 175g - 200g/ 6 - 8oz.

- Pre-heat the oven to fan 180C/ conventional 200C/ gas 6. Heat 1 tbsp
 of the oil from the olives in an ovenproof pan. Tip in the onion and stir
 well, leave to cook for a minute or two and then give it another good
 stir. Add the tomatoes and some salt and pepper, then add the olives.
- Put the fish, skin side down, onto the sauce and drizzle over a splash more oil from the olive jar. Bake uncovered, for 15 minutes until the fish is cooked. Sprinkle with chopped parsley and serve straight from the pan with lemon wedges.

Serve with boiled rice and french beans.

For a spicey alternative, add a small pinch of red chilli flakes to the onion. A handful of quartered artichoke hearts from a jar can be added as well as or instead of, the olives.

DO YOU KNOW ?

'Do you know when the New Year begins? I always thought I did, but now, I'm not so sure!

For many of, us who follow the Gregorian calendar, the New Year begins on the 1st of January. Historically the New Year started at varying times in the year. The ancient Roman calendar had only ten months and started the year on 1 March, which is still reflected in the names of some months that derive from the Latin — September (seventh), October (eighth), November (ninth), December (tenth). It wasn't until around 713 BC that the months of January and February were added to the year. Since the 17th century, the Roman Catholic ecclesiastic year has started on the first day of Advent, the Sunday nearest to St. Andrew's Day (30 November); and from the Middle Ages many European countries started the New Year on 25 March, the feast of the Annunciation. In the Eastern Orthodox Church, the civil New Year (celebrating the infant Jesus' circumcision) falls on 14 January (1 January in the Julian Calendar). Rosh Hashaneh (Hebrew for 'head of year') is a celebration that occurs 163 days following Pesach (Passover) and cannot occur before 5 or 6 September.

Even today, the New Year starts on different days in different parts of the world, depending on the religious beliefs. Here are a few examples.

The Vietnamese New Year is Tet Nguyen Dan which is for most the same day as the Chinese New Year. This occurs each year on the new moon of the first lunar month and can fall any time between 21 January and 21 February.

The Sinhalese New year falls in April (the month of Bak).

The Tibetan New Year is Losar and falls from January through March.

The Iranian New Year, called Norouz, is the day containing the exact moment of the vernal equinox, commencing the start of the spring season.

The Thai New Year is celebrated from 13 April to 15 April by throwing water. The Cambodian and Lao New Year have the same dates.

Some neo-pagans celebrate Samhain (a feetival of the ancient Celts, held around November 1) as a New Year's Day representing the new cycle of the Wheel of the Year.

in the Baha'l calendar, the celebration occur on the vernal equinox on 21 March, and is called Naw-Ruz.

The Punjabi New Year Valsakhi is celebrated on 13 April and celebrates harvest. Hola Mohhalla, New Year's Day in the Sikh Nanakshahi calendar is on March 14.

A little bit of research could produce many other variations, but one thing is clear; all countries and creeds celebrate the start of the New Year. How many of them attempt to make New Year Resolutions is a different matter. As far as we in Pett are concerned no one needs to tell us how-to-celebrate-the-NEW YEAR. I am sure all of us will be making the most of this joyous time of giving and receiving.

Do have a Very Happy New Year – try not to break all those worthwhile good New Year Resolutions! I sincerely hope that 2007 will be peaceful and fulfilling for us all.

PETT SPORTS ASSOCIATION

Members of the Management Committee of the Association, (which includes representatives from bowls, cricket, stoolball and tennis), met on 11 October to discuss the planned refurbishment of the pavilion in 2007. A local builder had been asked to assess the work needed to bring the pavilion to a reasonable standard and, unfortunately, more problems were identified than originally envisaged. Of particular concern was the news that the whole of the west side of the pavilion and the uprights need renewing. Other repairs and some refurbishment of the kitchen area are also needed.

Members were unanimous in agreeing that the Association's long-term aim would be to pull down the existing pavilion and erect a new one. However, this will mean extensive fund raising over a long period of time as there is a great deal of competition for grants. In the interim, it was agreed that essential repairs should be carried out as soon as possible.

Since the meeting, a detailed specification and costing has been obtained and the Association has submitted a maintenance grant application to the Parish Council seeking help with the costs involved. This was due to be fully discussed at the December precept meeting and we await the outcome. A meeting of the Association is programmed for early in 2007 when decisions concerning the repairs/refurbishment will be made on the basis of the amount of money available.

However, the Association would welcome the comments of local people as to the future of the pavilion, which we consider to be an important part of the village's recreational facilities. A part that we feel should be protected for future generations.
