

NATURE NOTES

- I had been pottering around in the greenhouse for some time when I became aware that I was being watched. Further along the staging, perched on a pot of strawberries, sat Robin, his bright beady eyes following my every move. When I finished tidying up I left the greenhouse and Robin followed me to see whether I might be going to do something more productive outside. There may be two views about some other birds pigeons starlings spring to mind

but I've never met anyone who

didn't have a soft spot for the

confiding little Robin.

Migrant birds started appearing in March, but most species arrive in numbers during April. Watch out for swallows and house martins. The latter build their nests on the outside of buildings, and will sometimes use artificial nest boxes. Swallows nest inside buildings, usually high up, though I was once shown an occupied swallows' nest in a porch in Rectory Park.

Another bird to look out for is the Wheatear, easily recognised by its bright white rump. (Wheatear is a corruption of White-arse). In the early nineteenth century these attractive little birds were considered to be a great delicacy, and shepherds on the South Downs caught literally thousands of them

for the meat trade. Since a shepherd's wage was perhaps £6 a year, and Wheatears sold for sixpence each, they could easily double their income by this means.

The mild, wet winter was a great disappointment to those of us who enjoy crisp, sparkling weather. The grass has never really stopped growing, and tender plants left outside are flourishing.

Did you see the eclipse of the moon on March 4th? It went the most beautiful coppery bronze, reminding me of G.K.Chesteron's line 'some moment when the moon was blood'. No wonder our ancestors thought that an eclipse of the moon was a sign that the gods were angry.

As I write this we have been experiencing some wonderful Spring weather which brought out the visitors over the weekend and also heralded the arrival of our caravanning friends, back for yet another season at Pett Level. Some of these seasonal visitors have been coming for over thirty years and are as much part of the community as those of us lucky enough to reside here all year round. They certainly add to life here. participating fully in our activities and bringing with them that sense of holiday fun.

During the Winter months we have a big litter problem on the beach. We all do our bit trying to clear it up but we fight a losing battle. Thankfully the Council will soon be sending their beach cleaners and what a marvellous job they do as they walk the beach each morning collecting all the rubbish throughout the Summer. It's not until they stop at around the end of August that we realise just how much they collect when we see it all mounting up again.

As well as rubbish the sea certainly deposits surprises on our doorstep, it was sad to find the dead Harbour Porpoise which had apparently been caught in fishing nets but recently we have received a good number of oranges (mostly contaminated by oil) and bottles and shampoo! Most odd surely was the plastic leg complete with black shoe and at the time of discovery sporting a pair of underpants. Where do these things come from?

Things are also returned to the sea and it was heartening to watch a young seal being released to its natural environment by the staff of Mallydams who had nursed it back to health. More recently we have watched the return of Guillemots to the sea. These birds had been badly covered in oil from the container ship disaster in Devon and Mallydams were sent 200 of the many stricken birds to clean up and return to health. The release was covered by T.V. and it was lovely to see these endearing little birds scampering down the beach and diving back into the waves.

Toot Rock has had a large area of gorse and blackthorn cleared. This thick scrub is of little use to wildlife. apart from rabbits.. Most enimals find it too inhospitable and birds tend to nest elsewhere. It spreads alarmingly quickly, smothering other plantlife and had killed a tree planted by the Preservation Society some years ago. So detrimental to the countryside is that the Countryside this scrub Stewardship Scheme pay farmers for scrub clearance. It is also very difficult to recover any lambs that occasionally slip from the rock into it. or sheep that seek shelter from their tormentors the blowfiles within it. Keeping it under control essential part countryside management.

Finally I must apologise to the female members of Pett Level Rescue Boat for referring to them as a loyal group of men' in last month's column. · Our Annual General Meeting was held first and was very short and to the point. There were copies of our accounts for members and lots of details about our coming visits to Hole Park and Pashley Manor.

Our speaker this month was Dr. Arthur Hollman, who gave us a really lovely evening and talked about his garden at the top of Chick Hill. It was amazing to see from his slides how the garden has matured, and to see the first photographs of the house and it's place on the hill way back in the 1930's. He showed us the original planting lists from the first attempts at a garden on such an exposed and very inhospitable landscape for plants and trees. There are still quite a few of the plants and trees from that first planting now fully matured and giving shelter for more tender trees and shrubs to grow. There is even a large Olive tree maturing well, but as yet no fruit but with the changing climate who knows, perhaps olives in 2007! To see the slides showing the garden through the seasons with tiny shrubs which have grown over the years and become covered in flowers was really quite inspiring.

There were lots of questions and Arthur Hollman is knowledgeable that he was able to answer the many questions in such a way that those of us who are not so well versed in garden techniques and nomenclature (!)

came away with new ideas about what we could do in our own gardens. We all had a most enjoyable evening

DOG CONTROL ORDER

Owing to a misunderstanding between Environmental Health and the Legal Departments at Rother District Council the timing for a decision regarding Dog Control Orders had been premature.

Consequently no decisions are imminent. Analysis of the results of the current Public consultation will now be carried out at the end of April, revised draft orders produced at the end of June with a final consultation with Parishes on these draft orders during July and August.

A report will be submitted to Cabinet in October where their formal recommendations will go out to formal Public consultation in November. New Orders will then be able to come into force in March 2008.

it is important that members of the public continue to let their views be known to Rother and that the Parish Council will be able to request orders that are suitable to meet local conditions.'

- Verdant Ltd has the new collection contract but staffing remains the same.
- Glass bottles will still need to be put in the recycling bins in the village ("Bring Centre") for the time being.

- Why not start composting now and find out if you need the green wheelie bin.

I'm the Pett Parish Councillor contact for recycling issues, so please get in touch if local problems arise, or if you have a query that does not appear to be covered in the RDC information.

A SURVIVOR'S STORY

Prisoner of War to Parish Priest

John Read was working in a bank when Singapore was invaded by the Japanese in late 1941. As a Sergeant in the Straits Settlement Volunteer Force, he took part in the defence of the colony and, after his capture, was sent first to work on the notorious Burma Railway and then to a zinc smelting factory in Japan.

The first part of this book gives a brief account of John's years before going to Singapore. Then follows an account of his imprisonment that is remarkable for its lack of bitterness. The third part of the book tells of his training and ordination after the war and his subsequent ministry as a parish priest.

This account has not been published previously because John thought "no one would be interested". However, even after 50 years, his quiet courage and faith come through very clearly.

DO YOU KNOW ?

Do you know about the origin of St George's Day?

The Saint of an English Army before he became the Patron Saint of England, St George may have been a soldier, but he was no Englishman. He was an officer in the Roman Army under Diocletian. He was a Christian and vigorously protested against Rome's persecution of the Christians. He refused to abandon his faith, and was martyred at Lydda in Palestine about the year 300 AD - supposedly on the 23rd of April. Over the years St George became the example of a Christian fighting man, a powerful helper against evil powers affecting individual lives. He was the soldier-hero of the Middle Ages, of whom remarkable deeds were reported. However, the story of Saint George is so wrapped up in myth and legend that it is difficult to separate fact from fiction. Some believe that he never existed at all, or that he is a Christianised version of an older pagan myth.

In the Golden Legend of the 13th century, Jacobus de Voragine gave St George a handsome write-up. The story runs thus:

One day, St George rode up to the heathen city of Sylene in Libya, where he found the citizens in great distress. A neighbouring dragon had forced them to surrender two sheep each day for its dinner, and when the sheep gave out, two of their children; and now they were about to sacrifice the King's daughter, dressed as if for her wedding. St George encountered the party by a stagnant lake, where the dragon lived, and persuaded the sobbing Princess to tell him why she was so miserable. At that moment the dragon appeared, looking inexpressibly revolting. The Saint charged, and drove his spear into the gaping mouth. To everyone's amazement, he tumbled the monster over and over.

Then St George borrowed the Princess' girdle, tied it round the dragon's neck, and got her to lead it back to the city herself. The sight of the Princess approaching with the befuddled dragon on its makeshift lead emptied the town. When the inhabitants timidly crept back, St George promised to

behead the dragon if they would all believe in Jesus Christ and be baptised.

It was a most effective form of evangelism, for everybody said "yes" at once. So 15,000 people were baptised, and four carts were commissioned to remove the dragon's body.

St George thus became a symbol of the war against evil, and is usually portrayed trampling the dragon of sin under his horse's hooves.

Crusaders had a vision of him helping them against the Saracens at Antloch, during the first Crusade, and so brought the story of St George back with them from Palestine. Later England put herself under the protection of the Saint. His day was a declared holiday in 1222. A red cross on a white field is the flag of St George. It would be interesting to know the real story of his life.

MONKFISH

Monkfish is a firm and versatile fish, caught mainly in North Atlantic waters but sometimes in the English Channel. Today it is one of the more expensive fish, It's dense flesh and lack of bones ensures that a little goes a long way. It became popular in the 1960's due to Fanny Craddock (one of the first TV cooks) recommending it as a cheap alternative to scampi. Prior to that, the only part of mankfish kept, was the liver - the rest was thrown away! It is now a very popular fish found on menus throughout Europe.

Bacon - wrapped Monkfish (serves 4)

400g monkfish tall, sliced into 2 fillets (ask your fishmonger to prepare this) 2 sprigs fresh thyme, leaves stripped

12 rashers rindless smoked streaky bacon

2 large tomatoes, halved 3 - 4 tosp vinaigrette

225g bag watercress and salad leaves


Lay 1 monkfish tail fillet on a board, sprinkle with thyme leaves and season. Lay the other fillet on top with tapering tip in the opposite direction, so each end has one thick and one thin end butted together.

Lay the bacon on a board, slightly overlapping and put the monkfish in the centre. Wrap the fish in the rashers so that it holds together quite firmly.

Heat the grill for 3-5 mins. Line the grill pan, lay the monkfish on it, with the bacon joins underneath.

Grill for about 7-10 mins until the bacon starts to crisp, then carefully turn over and cook for another 7-10 mins. At the same time, grill the tomato halves. As soon as the monkfish feels firm when pressed on top, remove and leave to stand for 5 mins. Save any pan juices and drizzle into the vineigrette. Cut the monkfish into medallions, slightly on the diagonal. Dress the watercress salad with the vinaigrette and juices and divide between 4 plates. Place the monkfish on top, season with pepper and serve tomatoes alongside.

Serve with baby new potatoes.


The Service was lead by Meriel Deasey and the address was given by Hilary Maipass. Helen Patten led our singing and many ladies from across the Benefice gave the readings.
