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NATURE NOTES

One of the best wildlife encounters during March must have been the Merlin which knocked itself out flying into the conservatory window at Hunters Meadow. Luckily it was not injured and recovered to fly away, but not before it had provided some excellent close-up views of itself. Presumably it had been chasing a small bird and not looking where it was going.

Other interesting sightings included a Hummingbird Hawk Moth in the garden of Kirojuke on 7th March, and a large toad in my own garden on March 16th, which stayed around and watched me weed for quite some time, doubtless hoping I would turn up some tasty delicacies.

Guestling Wood was a delight, with wall-to-wall Wood Anemones punctuated there by here and primroses, violets and celandine. The lanes have also been full of wildflowers including Red deadnettle. stitchwort and periwinkle (very patriotici).

The daffodils planted throughout the village were lovely until the evening of 21st March, when

March when + + vandals got to work and ripped many of their heads off. What sort of moron trashes daffodils? Perhaps we should plant Monkshood instead.

Different species of garden birds have a very definite pecking order on the feeders; Great Tits, as you might expect, take precedence over Blue Tits, and Greenfinches dominate Sparrows. However, size isn't everything. I have noticed that Chaffinches regularly see off Starlings, and if a Chaffinch is on the suet cage the Starlings stay away from it. I've never seen a Chaffinch actively threaten a Starling (although they do threaten Greenfinches), but the bigger birds certainly show a lot of respect for them. Watching garden birds is something which almost anyone do. and endlessly entertaining - well worth the price of a packet of seed and a few peanuts.

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WATER SAVING TIP OF THE MONTH

Keep a large plastic milk bottle beside the sink to catch the water you run off before the hot comes through. Use on indoor plants, seedlings etc.



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FISH RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Sea Bass, caught mainly off the south coast, were an endangered species in the 1990's due to over fishing. Conservation techniques were introduced to protect the species, which involved a ban on fishing of Sea Bass in river estuaries where they spawn. These measures have been a success and have led to stocks recovering, enabling us to enjoy this flavoursome fish available throughout the year. Sea Bass is classified as a white fish, and as such is low in fat. In May, when simply prepared it compliments new spring vegetables and is probably best cooked plainly, baked or grilled.

Grilled Sea Bass with Mint Serves 2

2 X 350 - 400g/ 12 - 14 oz. Sea Bass 40 fresh mint leaves 20g/ 3/4 oz. unsalted butter/ olive oil salt and freshly ground pepper 150ml/ 3/4 pint dry white wine/ fish stock

Scale and fillet the Sea Bass and remove the small bones from each fillet – found just behind the head – with a pair of pilers – your fishmonger should be able to do this.

With the point of a knife, make 10 small incisions in the flesh of each fillet at regular intervals, cutting right through to the skin a about a 45 degree angle.

Place 1 leaf of mint into each incision.

Melt the butter/ oil and use a little to grease the grilling tray.

Place the fillets on this, season and brush with melted butter/ oil.

Place the fish under a hot grill. As it cooks, baste with the butter/ oil and the juices as they run off. The fillets will only take 4 to 5 minutes to cook.

When cooked, remove them onto a serving dish and keep warm

Bring the wine/ stock to the boil and swill out the grill tray with it, strain, reduce slightly over a high heat and our over the fish

Serve with fresh local asparagus and new potatoes.

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The Parish Assembly took place on 21st March at Guestling Village Hall.

Mr Nick Morgan gave a most interesting talk about the work of the Woodland Trust. He commenced by giving a brief history of the English woodlands, which were here long before mammals appeared in the world and how necessary they were to support the world as they developed. However, humans started to clear woods to pursue agriculture and subsequently for towns and housing, as well as other industrial ventures. The Woodland Trust, having realised the consequences of the loss of ancient trees and other floral and fauna, in an attempt to control this loss, is purchasing (sometimes alone and sometimes in conjunction with other Trusts such as The National Trust) ancient woodlands to preserve them for the future (an encient woodland is one which is over 300 years old).

The Woodland Trust, founded in 1972, has 300,000 supporters and 1,200 sites. 85% is not protected legally and only 2% of ancient woodland remains. Currently, the Trust is negotiating to purchase Sediescombe Wood which will be one of the largest in the country.

Guestling Parish Council had contributed £1000 towards the purchase of the remaining unsecured half of Guestling Wood so the talk was topical and of interest.

The Assembly was reminded that the Parish had spent the last four years replacing defective wooden Heritage signs throughout the Parish and that

project was now completed. Any new signs should last 50 years before needing replacement!

The Parish is also in the process of considering a replacement sports pavilion as the present one has seen better days. That will now be a matter to be taken forward by the new Council. The local football club "Guestling Rangers" now has 80 youngsters playing regular football during the season on the playing field, which is one of the reasons why there is considered to be the need for a better facility on the site.

Heavy traffic through Three Oaks to reach The Ridge and industrial estate continue to cause anxiety to the residents of Three Oaks and Chowns Hill. The drivers of these large HGV's appear to be following instructions of their Sat. Nav systems which have no regard to the restrictive nature of the carriageway and the weight restrictions in place on Three Oaks railway bridge.

Parishioners also expressed concern at the Annual Assembly about work being carried out at Coghurst Caravan Park with the felling of trees and clearing of areas of woodland.

With the onset of Spring, Guestling Parish locks lovely with it's bluebells, woodland, wide open countryside and scattered dwellings.

PETT CHURCHYARD

The more observant of you will have noticed the pink planning application outside Pett Church. Don't worry; the church isn't being converted into a block of flats. Not yet! Pett churchyard is now full and in order to continue with burials, it will be necessary to move into the adjoining 'twitten'. This involves getting planning permission, home office approval and consecrating the new area. A certain amount of clearance was needed but this has been kept to a minimum in order to preserve the native bluebells. In order to keep down costs some of the maintenance of the churchyard, as a whole, is done by voluntary labour, and the church council is most grateful to Pett Parish Council for giving us a payment of £500 towards the cost of the extra work: in addition to £750 as an annual payment towards the maintenance of the churchyard.

The council is also grateful to Carol Pecorini for having a native hedge planted along the southern boundary of the churchyard in memory of her husband, John.

LIFE ON THE LEVEL - APRIL

Was alone in feeling slightly smug on seeing the newspaper picture of a lone sunbather on Torremolinos beach next to the one of Brighton beach which was absolutely heaving with people? Homes certainly been best for weather recently.

We had our fair share of visitors to The Level over the Easter. 'Grockles' is the local name for them, which I hadn't come across until I arrived here. Paul Merton was given this word to describe in the radio show 'Just a Minute' and I was alert as to what he was going to say when the telephone rang and responding as one of Pavlov's Dogs I was driven to answer it, thereby missing what I am sure was a very amusing description. dictionary says " it is an English West Country dialect word used to describe a visitor or tourist. It is a derogatory term by which local residents refer to the perceived hordes of tourists, particularly during the Summer months." Personally I hope any 'grockles' arriving at Pett Level are given a very warm welcome as without these seasonal visitors some local businesses would find it difficult to make a living.

Friday 13th saw the annual presentation of a cheque to the Hastings Life Boat by members of The New Beach Club. Money is raised from the 'Harvest Home' sale which was started in 1951 when the nation was saddened by the loss of

a Hull trawfer with all hands. A small bring and buy sale was organised by the New Beach Club which at that time was housed in what is now 'The Smuggler' public house. This sale raised approximately £8.00 which was forwarded to the Mayor of Hull and the Appeal Organisers.

The following year (1952) the club decided to hold a similar event with proceeds to be donated to local branches of the R.N.L.I.

In 1954 the lease from the Gostic Estate was terminated and the Club moved into a small temporary prefabricated building on the site which has now become its permanent home, but in spite of the difficulties the 'Harvest Home' was held as usual. On 10th June 1955 the opening of the new building was celebrated.

Since then the 'Harvest Home' has raised thousands of pounds for the R.N.L.I due to the dedication and determination of members of The New Beach Club with Hastings and Rye Life Boats receiving £1,000 each this year.

I will keep you informed of the date for this years sale later on and hope for your support. It's a good evening, great fun and you never know what you might be taking home with you.

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CHRISTIAN AID WEEK - 13-19 May



"Isn't the blossom lovely this year?"
Yes, each Spring we say it again,
marvel at the beautiful display, and
look forward hopefully to the crop of
juicy fruit which we expect to follow in
due course.

It's not quite as straightforward in some countries. In northern Senegal drought and deforestation have turned fertile land into desert. Poor communities are struggling to survive. To tackle this, one of Christian Aid's partners is encouraging people to plant fruit trees, which will restore the arid land, and help the community to improve their standard of living.

Mairam Djiby Diallo is one of those being trained to show their neighbours how to plant saplings. As she says "Mango trees would be great because you can sell the fruit, and eat it too!" Amazingly, just £8.50 could provide mango trees for ten people in her village.

Senegal isn't the only place where Christian Aid's partners make a difference, of course. There are more than 600 of them, in over 50 countries. And a lot of financial help comes through Christian Aid Week, which last year raised £15 million.

Could you give your support again this year? Last year here in Pett we hit a record total - £1,328 - and it would be marvellous if we could equal, or even exceed that in 2007. We are planning to pop our red envelopes into as many of our village letterboxes as we can, and we hope people will feel able to give them back to our house-to-house

collectors with money inside, and if possible signed to say (if they are income-tax payers) that they would like their donation to be Gift-alded. Nationally that added £1 million to donations last year.

We'll be starting off with our usual Coffee Morning at Paxstead, Pett Road (opp Recreation Ground) on Saturday May 12, 10am – 12 noon, with cakes, plants, bring and buy, raffle, and sale of Traidcraft goods. The entrance fee of 50p provides tea, coffee, cold drinks and biscuits – and hopefully a nice sociable morning. Please do come if you can, and bring your friends.

Then on Sunday May 13 there will be a special Christian Aid service in the Methodist Church at 10.45am, at which everyone will be most welcome, to start the Week off well.

Thank you so much for whatever support you can give: you really will be helping Christian Aid to live up to its motto, "We believe in life before death."

DO YOU KNOW

Do you know that there are many notable dates associated with Pett, Pett Level and this area?

Over the next couple of months it might be interesting to look back at some of the dates that could have affected the lives of the people of Pett. So we'll start way back in the thirteenth century.

- 1250

 1 October: Old Winchelsea was hit by a devastating storm. 300 houses, some churches, bridges and mills were destroyed; the coastline was altered and the old town was buried under the sea. A further great storm in 1257 changed the course of the River Rother.
- 1295 The earliest mention of a church in Pett.
- in the reign of Edward III,
 Stephen Alard of Winchelsea
 sold 13 acres of land in Pett
 to Sampson Stonlynk and his wife
 Denise.
- 1360 15 March: Winchelsea sacked by the French. They struck before dawn, met with little resistance and killed many men, women and children before setting fire to the town.
- In the 25th year of Henry VI's reign, Nicholas Stokkere of Pett stole a pair of trays (worth 1d) from Robert Farnham, and was fined at the Guestling Hundred Court for the sum of 4d.
- 1545 In a will dated 7 March, Elizabeth Firlow, gives the dedication of Pett church as St. Stephen.
- 1573 Queen Elizabeth I visited Winchelsea
- 1586 16 February: Sussex told to prepare for the defence of the south coast against the Spanish Armada. The order required the

county to provide 800 men, 4,800 lbs of gunpowder and a similar amount of lead, six pieces of cast iron ordinance and six hundredweight of "corne powder for the said ordinance."


- 1588 Orders came to stand down the Sussex forces mustered to meet the threatened invasion from Spain after 129 ships of the Armada were scattered by Drake's fireships.
- 1597 1 November: Great storm washed away Hastings harbour.
- 1634 Rev. Peter Theobald, 'Parson of Pett', gave 6s 8d. to St. Paul's Cathedral in London to help repair the spire. Work began in 1638 and the Great Fire of London destroyed much of it in 1666.
- 1676 The Compton Census, carried out for the Archbishop of Canterbury, recorded that there were 49 conformists in Pett, with no nonconformists or papists (Fairlight had 5 papists)
- 1690 The Anne, a 70 ton ship of the line was beached off Pett Level on the 1st July after being seriously damaged in the battle against the French off Beachy Head.
- 1723 Earliest surviving Pett Poor Book records local information.
- 1729 A tornado cut a swathe of devastation through East Sussex from Bexhill to Newenden. It came ashore at 9pm and hit Newenden, 20 miles away, 20 minutes later. Houses, barns,trees and crops in its path were destroyed much at Pett and Pett Level.
- 1782 2 September: Highwaymen George and Joseph Weston ended their lives on the gallows. To their neighbours in Winchelsea, they appeared as upright citizens. It.

came as a shock, when the Sheriff and his men arrested the brothers as they left church one Sunday morning.

- 1784 11 September: a belloon, 112 feet in diameter and gold in colour, was found in a field at Guestling. It had been launched from Ware, Hertfordshire the previous day, and a label on it offered a reward of two guineas to the finder.
- 1799 30 October: A small French privateer was seen from the shore to capture a Hastings fishing boat that was trawling for sole off Fairlight.

Next time we will take a look at some dates of interest from the last two hundred years.

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FLICKS IN THE VILLAGE

Local author Christopher Priest opens Flicks!

We are delighted to let you know that on Thursday 3 May at 7.30pm Flicks in the Village proudly presents The Prestige (12A). Not only that, but the author of the book on which this star-studded Hollywood film is based has kindly agreed to open the proceedings for us.

Set in a world of top hats, cravats and disappearing bunnies. The Prestige is a superb puzzle-box thriller. Christian Bale and Hugh Jackman star as magicians in turn-of-the-century London, locked in a bitter feud after the death of an assistant in an illusion gone wrong. Directed by Christopher Nolan, this adaptation has more than a few tricks up its sleeve. You'll leave thrilled but perplexed, asking: how did they do that?

It's a film that's deliberately designed to pull the wool over your eyes. The fragmented story is full of flashbacks, often told via diary entries that prove distinctly untrustworthy. You know you're being misdirected by cinematic sleight of hand, but you can't avoid being sucked in. The two leads excel as the rival conjurors: Jackman aristocratic, Bale with a cheeky, borderline-panto cockney patols. It's an epic tale of professional rivalry that ends with some fantastically impossible hocuspocus, moment when the crowd (confused, amazed and thrilled) applaud in disbellef. Nolan's now you see it, now you don't magic trick delivers prestige by the bucket-load. In fact, it brings the house down. Abracadabral

Supporting turns from Michael Caine (excellent) Scarlett Johnasson and David Bowie add a touch of class; yet in the end the real magician here is Nolan. Caine's retired conjuror tells us that "the prestige" is the third and final part of a magician's act, the in conclusion, may I remind all members that May the 3rd is a "Vote and View" night and we will be sharing the hall facilities with the Polling Station.
