AS I REMEMBER PETT IN 1941

When I moved to Pett in 1941, I had just married a local man, Henry John Griffen (known to everyone as Jack), he was a soldier at the time.

To me Pett seemed a lovely little village where people were friendly and considerate to each other as they went about their dally business, it had few houses and lots of green fields that edged the road, the amenities were good.

The East Kent bus service ran 8 times daily, the first out of Pett was at 8am, the last back was at 10.50pm. The drivers were always very helpful. My mother-in-law used to go into Hastings about once a month. If she had lots of shopping bags and no one met the bus the driver would carry her shopping to her gate, (she lived in Oak Cottage - the first house on the right in Elm Lane). This was done out of respect for a lady. When an urgent prescription was needed you could stop the bus. explain to the driver your need to get medication and he would willingly take the prescription, get it made up and drop it off on his next journey through the village. All this came at no charge, just friendship and respect for others.

The Look Out at the top of Chick Hill was used as the Beach Club, because Pett Level was a restricted area. You had to have a special pass to go down there. The Hundreds was on Chick Hill near the top. Mr. Banger grew and sold the most delicious tomatoes I have ever tasted. I grow my own and have tried over the years to match them but to date haven't found his secret.

At No. 1 Lunsford Cottages Mr. Fred Harmer sold freshly caught fish.

Along the road on the left at The Roundels you could buy tomatoes and fresh free range eggs.

The Royal Oak was run by Mrs Morris. It was her home but two rooms were open for public use, the one on the right was the shop selling sweets, tobacco, dry groceries, vegetables and fruit when available. The room on the left was used by Mr. Hanley to run Library every Monday afternoon. A clinic was also held there by the District Nurses so that babies and young children could be weighed and receive immunizations. Mothers could also collect their allowance of cod-liveroil and orange juice.

At the top of Panel Lane was the lovely old Vicarage. Once a year a Jumble Sale would be held there in the stables, also in the summer the village. Fete where the children would have horse rides in the grounds.

Then, of course, the Beautiful Church with its unlocked doors

welcoming anyone and everyone. The Churchyard was neatly kept by Mr. Spencer Glazier. It was such a lovely place to spend time.

Next to the Church was the Post Office. Mrs. Colegate was the Post Mistress. In those days a Post Office only dealt with Post Office business.

Alongside was Seetmans Grocery Store. This sold sweets, cigarettes, tobacco, vegetables and fruit, when available, wines, spirits and beer.

Just along the road on the right was the village hall built in the memory of a soldier that was killed in the 1914-1918 war. This hall was the centre of the villagers' social life. On Monday evening from the 2nd week in January the men would go along and pay their Tong Tide money (like a Christmas club today). On the 2nd week in December they would draw it out. This was run by Mr. Spencer Glazier. Every Tuesday and Friday evening a men's club was held, on Wednesday evenings the whist drive took place. Once a month, on a Friday afternoon, the W.I. met. Every school day the children would come to the hall for a cooked meal and a dessert. This would be served by Mrs. Dorothy (Dolly) Butler and Mrs. Milly Cloke.

A few yards along on the same side was the School. There was a house for the teacher and two classrooms where children aged 5 years - 14 years had their lessons. It had a playground and out door toilets.

Just a few yards further along the road in the same place that it stands today was the Methodist Chapel.

Going a little way along on the left was the garage selling fuel. Next to that three Sussex Cottages marked the end of Pett Village. The left side of the road was in Fairlight, the right was in Guestling.

On the right was, as it is today, the Two Sawyers. Back then it was a country club. You had to be a member to be able to drink there. In the forecourt was a big wooden shed used as the butchers shop, Mr Robert (Bob) Whiteman was the butcher.

Then there was the village forge and all the local horses were taken there to be shod. This later became a brewery.

Still on the right, the dairy was owned by Miss Hills. She would sell you milk from there but also delivered milk daily with her horse and cart.

Nearing Watermill Lane you could find Mr. J Barden, the local builder and decorator, and Mr. T.Barden the local undertaker and carpenter.

Just down Watermill Lane at No 3 Milly Cloke's sitting room was used as the Doctors surgery and her kitchen as the walting room on Tuesday and Friday mornings.

Back to the main road, a few yards along on the left, next to Rose Cottage, was a long tin shed that served as Mr. Mercer's Haberdashery shop. If you needed it, he sold it!

How Pett has changed over the years.

DENIS GLENN 1936 - 2007

It was with much sadness that I heard of the passing of Denis Glenn who died on April 24th after a short illness. If you are not sure who Denis was I would not be surprised, for he was a quiet, unassuming, gentle man but was always busy helping others without seeking recognition or thanks...

Denis was born in Ireland, where work was hard to find and so, in his teens he joined the RAF. This became his life, in fact he spent more than half his life serving his country. When he married local girl Hilary Webb, she became a RAF wife and travelled the world with him. They had two children, Julia and Andrew, who now lives in Canada.

Throughout their married life Denis and Hilary were regular visitors to Pett, returning to Hilary's family home, Rose Cottage. On his retirement they naturally made this their home, Denis loved Pett almost as much as Ireland. He and Hilary kept up the family tradition of gardening (The Cecil Webb Memorial Cup being a coveted trophy at the Annual Flower Show). Denis could be seen in all weathers tending to this wonderful flowers and vegetables, despite an on-going battle with badgers, which he never entirely won! They were also keen walkers, Denis, Hilary and Julia could often be spotted on the highways and byways around the village.

Although he was such a quiet, family man, Denis will actually be missed by a great number of us. He was always willing to help anyone who had a problem. He could turn his hand to anything, whether it was fixing a telephone, sorting electrical faults, or even mending gas cookers. Denis would methodically work through the problem (his military training?) and never gave up! As well as helping those of us in Pett he recently spent much of his time working alongside adults with learning difficulties and he was on the Executive Committee of Hastings and Bexhill MENCAP.

His kindness and patience will be missed by us all. I, like many of you feel privileged to have known him. He was a wonderful husband and devoted father. Our thoughts are with Hilary, Julia and Andrew at this sad time.

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FISH RECIPE OF THE MONTH

There exists a belief that shellfish is harmful to health and can cause high cholesterol. It is true that a small amount of dietary cholesterol is found in shellfish However, this will not affect your cholesterol level so it is safe to enjoy shellfish as part of a balanced diet 2 –3 times a week. More information on this subject is available from Heart UK (www.heartuk.org.uk) or the British Dietetic Association (www.bda.uk.com).

This months recipe therefore is a healthy and tasty addition to the BBQ season. Prawns are a low fat food and combined with this walnut pesto, provide a lot of omega-3 fats which have a protective effect on the heart.

KING PRAWN SKEWERS WITH WALNUT PESTO

This is an unusual starter or main course which can be prepared in advance and kept in the fridge until you are ready to cook.

12 – 16 large, raw, shell on prawns
50g/ 2oz/ ½ cup walnut pieces
60ml / 4 tbsp chopped fresh flat-leafed parsley
60ml / 4 tbsp chopped fresh basil
2 gloves garlic
45ml/ 3 tbsp grated fresh parmesan cheese
30ml/ 2 tbsp olive oil
30ml/ 2 tbsp walnut oil
salt and freshly ground pepper

Peel the prawns, removing the head but leaving the tail, and put in a large mixing bowl.

To make the pesto, place the walnuts, parsley, garlic, cheese and oils in a food processor and process until finely chopped. Season.

Add half the pesto to the prawns in the bowl, toss them well, then cover and chill in the fridge for a minimum of I hour, or leave overnight.

Thread the prawns on to skewers and cook them on a hot BBQ for 1 - 2 minutes each side, when the prawns will change from grey to an orange/ pink colour.

Serve with remaining pesto, fresh crusty bread and a green salad.

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NATURE NOTES

The most unusual report in April was of a dormouse on a nut feeder in Cliff End Lane. I get woodmice regularly, and once I had a very good view of a vellow-necked mouse, but never a dormouse. It would certainly be difficult to mistake any other sort of mouse for a dormouse in view of the latter's furry tail.

It's all very well having my tame



blackbird come into the cottage, but it has its disadvantages for both of us. For me. the downside is that Mr. Blackbird is not

housetrained. For him, he has spent the morning shut indoors because I didn't notice him when I went out. Each time when I opened the door he shot out past me, complaining loudly about false imprisonment. but he seems incapable of learning from his experiences.

For the benefit of those who asked. offer without comment the description of Monkshood given in my wildflower book:-"Although Monkshood had been medicinally to treat neuralgia, gout, arthritis, rheumatism and measles, it is extremely poisonous. Only a small amount may cause death within a very short time." I have some in my garden if anyone wants some seedheads - not to be grown where puppies play!

The new nest box which I put up last year, and which was boycotted last summer, is now being used by Great Tits. As usual, Blue Tits are nesting in the box by my back door. and Starlings under the porch roof. The latter are extremely noisy, especially in the evenings, and they are lucky that their nest is securely fortified as they must have advertised their presence to every passing cat. Once again I have no Martins, and I haven't even seen a Spotted Flycatcher.

The apple trees have carried so much blossom this year that the leaves were hardly visible. doubt we shall all be giving each other apples in September.

LIFE ON THE LEVEL - MAY

What a Spring! The Level and its surrounding countryside looked unbelievably beautiful with everything seeming to bloom in unison.

The backlash of this lovely weather was brought home rather sharply when we attended the annual meeting of the Pett Level Preservation Trust where the speaker was Jonathan Hunter the Environment Agency's South Eastern Flood Risk Officer. No longer known as Flood Defence it is now Flood Risk Management as the decision has been taken to allow nature to take its course in future as it will be 'economically impossible to defend all locations'.

As I understand it, and it's a big subject to take in, instead of attempting to hold the sea back against the threat of rising sea levels, they will employ controlled flooding of areas where least damage will be incurred, thereby minimising the effects to heavily developed areas. Defence schemes will continue to be maintained in vital and heavily populated areas. How long for, one wonders? I believe the talk was designed to reassure but I think quite a few returned home rather subdued. I trust the residents of Pett Village have contingency plans in place to accommodate residents from the Level as we surge up the hill seeking refuge?

We have an interesting historical vehicle here on The Level. It's an

old Sheffield bus dating back to 1922 and currently lived in by its now owner, who it has to be said is obsessive about it and its history. Get him talking about it and it's difficult to stop him! These buses had a very short lifespan of only about five years, due to the harsh terrain of Sheffleld at that time, and about twenty of them were bought by a farmer in Ashford who had the idea of converting them into horse drawn caravans. The horses then took them to their final destinations where they were used as holiday homes and in some cases for more permanent residences. Some years later the Council, in an attempt to 'clean up' the area known as Marsham flatland. insisted that these old vehicles must be destroyed when they were replaced by newer caravans/chalets etc. in the village Plan drawn up in the early 1970's the Council wrote 'The Marsham flatland area between Chick Hill and Royal Military Canal is lowlying and is occupied by a range of dwelling types including holiday accommodation. Most of the are of substandard dwellings construction including converted bus bodies which are considered detrimental to the pleasant nature of the area'. But one remained "Caravelle" being lovingly restored and can be found if you care to take a stroll around that fascinating area behind the canal.

- Meet with local businesses, communities and groups such as Neighbourhood Watch, Parish Councils and other Local Action Teams.

I would like to encourage everyone to report all incidents to the police, for non-emergencies call 0845 60 70 999 and emergencies call 999.

If incidents are not reported to the police and not stopped they can escalate. Please report all incidents to stop them from happening again, and causing alarm or harassment or distress to someone else. If we are

not told then we do not know and cannot help.

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DO YOU KNOW?

- Do you know some of Pett's notable dates since 1800? Continuing from last month:-
- 1801 Population of Pett was 185.
- 1801 Lists were prepared for every village, including Pett, of people, animals, wagons, arms, tools, windmills, crops, etc., and their possible use in the defence of the realm against the threat of Napoleon Bonaparte and the French.
- 1804 The Royal Military Canal (from Shorncliffe, Kent, to Cliff End) was started. It was completed in 1809 at a cost of over £200,000.
- 1805 Martello Towers were being built along the coast. By 1808 seventy-three had been completed eight of them along the Pett and Winchelsea beaches. By the end of the century all the local Martello Towers had either been eroded by the sea or blown up.
- 1829 One of the many smuggling runs occurred between Watch House and Cliff End.
- 1833- Three men were sentenced
 1837 to be transported to Australia
 for crimes committed in Pett.
 George Fowler (age 16) for 7
 years, Robert Collier (age
 31) for 7 years and George

- Sawyer (age 31) for 10 years.
- 1864 New Church, St.Mary & St.Peter, built at Pett for £1,600. It was dedicated by the Bishop of Chichester, Rt. Rev. A.T.Gilbert on the 29th December.
- 1880's Fiorentina Lucas Shadwell withdrew the licence of the Royal Oak Public House.
- 1910 First Parish Magazine published.
- 1917 16th/17th March; Zeppelin L39 dropped bombs on Pett, causing £163 of damage to two houses. Later on the 17th, the L39 was shot down over France. All 17 members of the crew were killed.
- 1917 24 November. Auction of 3,680 acres of Fairlight Hall estate, which included much of Pett and Pett Level was held in Hastings.
- 1920's First Pett Bus operated.
 This was a converted van run by Mr. Morris of the Royal Oak.
- 1923 Old Village Hall built on a site presented to the village by Mr. Dennett in memory of his son Preston, who was killed during the First World War.

- 1929 Pett church first fitted with electric light.
- 1930 31 July: Amy Johnson gives flights in her Gipsy Moth plane (named Jason), to people from Pett for 10/- a go. The plane landed in a field near Fairlight Hall.
- 1939–Second World War: 54 high
 1945 explosive bombs, 10
 unexploded H.E. bombs, 13
 flying bombs (V1s) and 3
 unexploded shells fell on
 Pett and Pett Level. 9 of the
 V1s fell in the sea or close to
 the land. There were also 3
 machine gun attacks from
 the air.
- 1940 29 May: Pett Level marshland flooded as part of S.E. England defences.
- 1947 New Sea Wall built on Pett Level. Much work done on the sea wall since.
- 1963 Pett Sports Association inaugurated.
- 1972 Pett Level Naturalists Society started.
- 1978 2 June: United Benefice of Pett and Guestling formed.
- 1980 July: Pett Parish boundaries enlarged to include a strip of land that was formerly in Fairlight.
- 1987 15/16 October: Hurricane.
 Winds up to 108 mph,
 barometric pressure 958
 millibars and in four hours 15
 million trees were lost in

- Sussex; lorries overturned; church steeples crashed to the ground; cars were crushed and 3,000 miles of telephone lines came down.
- 1994 8 September: United Benefice of Fairlight, Guestling and Pett formed.
- 2002 The new Pett Village Hall was opened by the comedian Paul Merton.

I am sure that some other notable dates have been missed off this list. If you know of any glaring omissions please tell the Parish News Editor, or me, and perhaps they could be added on.

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
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PETT TENNIS CLUB

The reason that Football club reports have dried up in recent months is that the pitches didn't. The incredibly wet December and January threatened to result in abandonment of the season something that had previously occurred only once in over a century. Thankfully, though, the weather relented and this did not happen. The upshot, however, was a backlog of fixtures which saw the season extended into the second week of May (when cricket demands were also competing) and a host of midweek fixtures - which at one point saw the 2nd XI playing 4 times in the space of 8 days.

The season has now – finally – ended, and the enforced mid-season break did the Club no harm at all. The start of December saw both teams struggling in their respective divisions (both then occupied relegation places), but in the final analysis the 1st team finished a highly creditable fourth in East Sussex League Division 1, whilst the 2nd XI achieved a respectable mid-table position in Division 5.

Highlights for the 1st XI included league doubles over Firehills, Sandhurst and Northiam (including a 7-3 home victory in which Phil Badrock scored 5 times). Once again, the bulk of their goals were scored by Badrock (23) and Sean Baker (14). Although the backbone of the team is an ageing one, younger players such as Greg Palmer, Sam and George Richardson, Dan Marsh and Tim

Linch have all established themselves as regulars this season.

The Second XI were rarely able to field a settled team but relied on strength in depth, fielding no less than 48 players over the season. Too often, the team was unable to defend a lead and lost too many games by the odd goal. Highlights were defeating Heathfied Hotspur both home and away, and winning 4 and drawing 1 of the last 6 matches (a run which included victory over Cinque Points and a draw against Panako, the two teams that secured promotion). Goals were shared out more equally than was the case with the first team: Janek Zysemil led the way with 12; the versatile Jon Fitton chipped in with 8; and Dale Glazier scored 7

FLICKS FILM CLUB

On the 7th June at 7.30pm in Pett Village Hall, we will be screening the film, THE HISTORY BOYS rated at a 15. The story line is about a school day nostalgia trip and the film won endless awards when it hit The National Theatre. Cut'n'pasted to the big screen - same director, same cast - it's kept all its probing, comic smarts. Richard Griffiths plays inspired and inspiring English teacher Hector, who clashes with young supply teacher Invin (Stephen Campbell Moore) while coaching Sixth Formers for Oxbridge entrance exams. As stuffy tradition meets modern technique, lessons will be learned

The clash of the masters is academic; at least until Hector's caught groping one of the boys (hands on teaching perhaps?) and Bennett's classroom drama is suddenly laced with dark longing and sexual desire. Think Grange Hill rewritten by WH Auden: slightly fusty but wickedly witty.

Little is gained by uprooting this play from the stage, but nothing's lost either. The young cast get top marks for battling Bennett's improbably middle aged dialogue while Richard Griffiths - once Uncle Monty in Withnail & I - gives Hector gravitas (and a 60 inch waistline). Elsewhere, Frances de la Tour plays a deadpan history teacher ("How depressing it is to teach five centuries of masculine ineptitude") and Clive Merrison pitches his conniving headmaster somewhere between Golium and Mr Burns from The Simpsons. It's a mark of how high this movie sets the bar that these

actors can't steal the show. Like the Oxbridge entrance exams the pupils sit, such excellence is expected, not exceptional.
