PARISH COUNCIL NEWS - SEPTEMBER 2007

This report covers the Pett Parish Council meetings held on Tuesday 18th September and Tuesday 16th October at Pett Village Hall. The Council recorded their thanks to the Village Hall Management Committee for agreeing to re-locate the Waste Recycling Bins. Council noted that the new site appeared to be well kept and the previous problems of overflowing bins and fly tipping were no longer a problem. The Council have asked the Village Hall Management Committee if they would consider a more permanent arrangement, subject to agreeing a suitable service agreement with Rother DC.

The Parish Council are considering establishing a Parish Emergency Plan, as recommended by Rother District Council and the County Emergency Planning Team. The object of such a Plan is to provide the Emergency Planning Team with detailed information about local resources in the event of a major emergency which was beyond the remit of the usual emergency services response. If you have any particular expertise that you think might be useful, e.g. medical qualification or counselling skills or you have resources which could be made available, e.g. chain saw, lifting equipment, boat etc. then please send details to the Parish Clerk by post or e-mail or telephone the clerk with the information.

The County Councillor Carl Maynard and District Councillors Robin Patten and Roger Bird are regular attendees at Parish Council meetings and provide the latest information on discussions at County and District level with particular relevance to Pett and Pett Level. The October Council had detailed information on the proposed Government funding for next year which will directly impact on the level of Council Tax. Rother District Council have established a Working Group to look at how support can be given to local village shops and post offices, the future of whi9ch is of considerable concern at present. Rother District Council has also established the Rother Residents Consultation which is open to anyone over 16 living in Rother. The Council has received a number of concerns about the proposed reduction in services by Eurostar from Ashford International and agreed to write to Eurostar requesting a review of the proposals. Members hope to receive a

presentation on Parish Plans at the November meeting. If you would like more information about such Plans or are interested in helping prepare a Plan, please contact the Parish Clerk.

The Parish Council agreed a donation of £150 to the Rural Rother Trust which provides help for a wide variety of deserving cases in the rural area.

The Parish Council considered the following Planning applications and agreed to support the proposals on each application:-

RR/2007/2440/L - ivy Cottage, Pett Road, Pett - Change colour of external doors and porch to farrow & ball period colour castle grey

RR/2007/2495/P — The Royal Oak PH, Pett Road, Pett — formation of 3 bed & breakfast units in existing lock-ups with small extension + office/store unit in garden.

The Parish Council objected to the following application as it was considered to be over development of the site; the Council were also concerned about access, drainage and the loss of privacy of other dwellings.

Notification of the decisions on previous Planning applications were noted as follows:-

RR/2007/1802/P The Hundreds Chick Hill, Pett Level (erection of ground floor extensions and alterations)

Granted

RR/2007/1808/P 6 Old Coastguard Cottages Pett Level (rebuilding of existing dwelling including associated extensions, dormers and rooflights)

Granted

RR/2007/1975/P 1 Rose Cottage, land adjacent Pett Road, Pett (Outline; erection of a pair of semi-detached chalet bungalows and formation of new vehicular access)

Refused

RR/2007/2190/P Fairlight Wood Caravan Club Site Watermill Lane, Pett (provision of 10 additional all weather caravanpitches)

Granted

RR/2007/2075/P Mulberry Cottage, Toot Rock, Pett Level (part demolition of existing bunker and erection of single storey extension)

Granted

Finally, the Parish Council was informed of the sudden death of Mr. Philip Dowling and recorded their deep sadness at the news.

The Parish Council meets on the 3rd Tuesday of each month and all meetings are open to the public. You are most welcome to attend and there is always an opportunity in 'Public Time' for you to address Council or ask questions. If you would like any more information

VISIT OF THE CHRISTIAN AID DIRECTOR:

Thanks to the Catharine Hollman and her family - and - all the people who helped so much, the visit of the World Wide Director of Christian Aid on the 30th of September was a resounding success.

The Director of Christian Aid, Dr. Daleep Mukarji was the guest speaker at a special service held at St. Andrews Church, Fairlight, on Sunday 30th September. Dr. Mukarji spoke eloquently and passionately about the work of Christian Aid, and praised the local done work by representatives in Pett, Guestling and Fairlight, emphasising the value, not only of fund-raising, but also of prayer, and support on campaigning issues.

The focus of Christian Aid has always been the relief of people around the world who are living in poverty, but the organisation recognises that the root causes of poverty often lie in decisions taken by governments, and that major issues such as global warming have the most damaging

effects on the poorest and most vulnerable.

Dr. Mukarji expanded further on the subject after lunch at Pett Village Hall, and expertly fielded a number of questions on subjects such as the danger of becoming too political, and the measures taken by Christian Aid to minimise the impact of corruption (a problem which he pointed out is not confined to third world countries).

Audiences at both venues were very much impressed by Dr. Mukarji's message, including his challenge to "Live more simply, so that others may simply live".

FLICKS FILM SOCIETY

Firstly, may I just confirm the bad news I announced at our five year celebrations in September. In order to ensure that the club continues to stay financially viable. We now need to increase the membership price from £10 to £12 to view three films. This will be the first increase in the annual membership fee since we started in 2002 and considering film hire costs have risen from £65 to £110 per film during this period, this will give some indication why it has been necessary to add the extra two pounds. The monthly membership will also increase from the current £3.75 to £4.50 for viewing one film with effect from November 07. The Flicks Team still feel joining the film club represents good value and providing the membership and attendances continue to grow, I see no reason why we should not have another successful five years of fun.

Turning now to good news, our 1st November show (not as incorrectly stated in my last newsletter the 8th) we will be screening. AMAZING GRACE. starring loan Gruffudd as the 18thcentury abolitionist William Wilberforce. Charting the long battle to end Britain's slave trade with spirit and wit, it's also cast to nines, from young pups (Benedict Cumberbatch) to old pros (Albert Finney as reformed slaver John Newton, author of the eponymous hymn).

Happily, Gruffudd isn't upstaged by the formidable support, which also includes Michael Gambon and Rufus Sewell as wily allies opposite Ciaran Hinds and Toby Jones as hateful opponents

At regular turns the film seeks to deflate its preachy potential ("Is that some kind of heavy-handed metaphorical advice?" guips Pitt). On the other hand, there is something made-for-schools about Amazing Grace, whether it's the sexless romance between Wilberforce and his wife (Romola Garai) or the avoidance of anything too nasty involving slavery. Still, accessibility is one of the movie's virtues: without dumbing down, it makes the workings of Parliament seem as gripping as a good suspense thriller.

Our last show of the year on December 6th we will be presenting THE HOLIDAY, a seasonal film starring Kate Winslet and Cameron Diaz, and Jude Law and Jack Black. More about this program in the December magazine.

Hopefully we will see you all at one or both these films here in Pett Village Hall starting at 7.30 pm with refreshments served from 7.00pm.

I am writing this early in the month as I am taking a short break in Cornwall. The weather is trying to make amends for its earlier poor efforts and I hope that it has continued this way by the time your magazine is delivered.

We have had one or two 'hopping' mornings recently, but the ones I remember from my youth, when I lived further inland, were never accompanied by the doleful sound of the foghorn out at sea that we get here. It was more the doleful shout of "All to Work" that I remember as I was usually late and two fields away from my half bin at that early hour of the morning. We were allowed our own bin when we were considered strong enough to move it ourselves, which in my case was when I was eleven. There I was expected to pick enough hops to pay for my new school uniform and hopefully be allowed a few shillings of my own by the end of the three weeks that hop-picking usually lasted. Pulling the first bine was the worst as it would be heavy with dew and you got a good soaking to start the day off, but as the sun warmed up and spirits rose the hop gardens were a lovely place to be.

Back on The Level there was a Fishing Competition on September 30th with five boats and ten anglers taking part. There was an east to north east breeze blowing of 8-10

making uncomfortable as the boats tend to lie across the tide, but the sporting action apparently more than made up for the conditions. At the end of the day the winner had 55lbs of mainly codling but included a 9lb.8oz cod, second place caught 35lb.I5oz and included the best cod of the day weighing 10lb,9oz, and third place had 3lib.14oz. anglers enjoyed one of the best trips for a number of years and are looking forward to their competition on Sunday October. It's always interesting to watch them as they come in with their haul.

It was an early start on Saturday
6th for all the volunteers helping
with the house to house collection
and those sorting out all the items
so generously given for
the annual

Harvest Home Auction in aid of the

Rye and Hastings
Lifeboats. At 7.30p.m. the Beach
Club was packed with people
anxious to part with their money
and pick up a bargain and they
certainly weren't disappointed.

Three Auctioneers took it in turns throughout the evening. One of them had been doing it for 38 years and the 'rookie' only three, but what a marvellous job they did between them. Members of

the local Coastguards did the portering, some of them having done the job for over thirty years. People came and went, bearing off their bargains, but most stayed the course and enjoyed the entertainment and the excitement of searching through their "mystery box of assorted 'antique' china and 'crystal' glass' usually with a couple of very acceptable bottles of wine to go with it! The hammer came

down on the last lot at 11.45p.m. swiftly followed by the raffle, and at the end of the evening the fantastic amount of just over £1,900.00 was raised! Well done all those who work so hard to make it such a successful event and to all the people who manage to find something at the back of the cupboard or shed to give each year.
























The kingfisher would be included on most people's list of favourite birds. They are such beautiful and spectacular little birds. One of the best places to see them locally is Pannel Bridge. I should think I see one on average about every third time I go there. A few years ago I saw two together, fishing near the bridge. Kingfishers dig a tunnel in the river bank to make their nest, where they may raise five or six young.

Now is the time to look out for field mushrooms. Some years they are so numerous that you can collect enough to freeze for the winter, when they make a tasty addition to soups and stews. It need hardly be said that you should not eat any wild fungus (or berry) unless you are sure what it is, as some are polsonous.

This is a good year for rose hips. If you freeze them, you will find that when they thaw they are soft. This makes them much easier to prepare for syrup or jelly, and if you prefer to put them out for the birds they are much easier for the birds to manage.

I watched a weasel hunting in and around a rabbit warren. He must have seen me, as I made no attempt to conceal myself, but he completely ignored

me. Weasels are considerably smaller than stoats, and their short tails do not have a black tip. They also have incredibly savage little faces, whereas stoats just look alert and intelligent. Both are extremely efficient killers.

Keep a look out for the redwings and fieldfares, especially where there is fallen fruit. These the thrush members of family are winter visitors. often appearing quite large flocks. Also. look out for flocks of mixed finches looking for seeds and berries along the hedgerows.

DO YOU KNOW ?

Do you know the origin of the Sussex Bonfire Societies? Following the capture of Guy Fawkes on the 5th November 1605 and the arrest of his fellow conspirators. the Government responded immedediately to this attempt to blow up the King and Parliament. An Act entitled "An Acte for a publique Thancksgiving to Almighty God everie year of the Fifte day of November" was passed in January 1606. This proclaimed the discovery of the Gunpowder Plot should 'be held in a perpetual Remembrance' and that the day be 'a holiday for ever in thankfulness to God for the deliverance and detestation of the Papists'. This annual remembrance was to be marked by a morning service in every parish church at which a special prayer of thanksgiving was to be offered up.

The origin of the Sussex Bonfire Societies is undoubtedly rooted in this Act. They also commemorate the burning of 17 Protestant martyrs in Lewes High Street from 1555 to 1557, during the reign of Mary Tudor. And, in Mayfield, on the 24th September 1556, a further four Protestant martyrs were put to death in the village. It was not until the late 1670s that records show that anti papal processions took place in Lewes and by the eighteenth century events in Lewes on the "Fifth" were being recorded in the local press. By the early 1800s the celebrations went into decline leading the local press to comment in 1814 the 'we scarcely remember our streets to have been so free from annoyance of squibs, other fireworks" Enthusiasm for the 'Fifth' was rekindled during the 1820's and annual that time the celebrations have been lively with large bonfires being built. Some years the celebrations became very unruly and dangerous. By 1850 it was recognised that some of the riotous proceedings would not be further tolerated so the 'bonfire boys' formed themselves into Bonfire Societies.

Traditionally, Guy Fawkes' night in England was remembered by large communal bonfires and general public celebrations, but in most parts of the country this withered to family bonfires and large public fireworks displays. No one really knows why the tradition has remained so strong in Sussex, but it is the highlight of the year in many towns and villages, with not only fires, but also parades and festivals. The Bonfire Societies also collect money for various The complexity of charities. organising such a festival has led the societies to band together and take part in each other's bonfires Currently there are something like six Bonfire Societies in Lewes and nearly thirty in the East Sussex towns and villages

This is certainly one tradition that the Sussex folk have constantly upheld and now people from all over the world come to share in the fantastic celebrations.

SKATE

Skate is a member of the ray family and are kite shaped fish which have a flat body and two wings. The wings are the only part of the fish that is consumed. Skates, like sharks excrete urea through their skin and if not handled carefully after capture, will smell of ammonia. Skate is a large fish and often exceeds 100lbs. When buying skate, look for meat that has already been skinned, as skinning the wings yourself can be extremely difficult. The wings should smell sweet and fresh. Beware of flesh that smells strongly of ammonia, which usually indicates that the fish has been sitting too long in the shop. Traditionally skate is poached or served with a butter based sauce (raie au buerre noir is a French favourite), however this month the recipe offers an alternative way to serve this popular fish.

Roast Skate Wings with Bacon, Chervil and Capers

4 x Skate wings on the bone
2 tbsp plain flour
25g unsalted butter
2 tsp chopped parsley
juice 1 lemon
150 ml red wine
6 x rashers streaky bacon, chopped
125g capers
2 tbsp chervil, chopped
salt and pepper to taste

Preheat the oven to 2000/ 400F/ gas mark 6.

Season the skate wings and lightly dust with flour.

Heat a large pan and odd the butter. Place the fish into the hot pan (presentation side down first) and cook until golden brown, turn over.

Scatter the chopped bacon over the fish, squeeze over the lemon and capers and place in the oven for around 10 - 12 minutes. Once cooked, remove the fish from the pan and keep warm.

Return the pan back to the heat and add the red wine, chopped chervil and parsiey. Reduce and adjust the seasoning.

Add a knob of butter to enrich the sauce if required. Place the skate on to a plate and pour over the juices.

Serve with sautéed potatoes and vegetables of your choice.


JUMBLE SALE
