SCALLOPS

Scallops are a popular type of shellfish in both Eastern and Western cooking. They are characterised by having two types of meat in one shell: the adductor muscle, called "scallop" which is white and meaty, and the roe, called "coral", which is red or white and soft.

The scallop shell is the traditional emblem of Saint James the Greater, and is popular with pilgrims on the 'Way of St James' to the apostle's shrine at Santiago de Compostela in Spain. Medieval Christians making the pilgrimage to his shrine often wore a scallop shell symbol on their hat or clothes. The pilgrim carried a scallop shell with him and would present himself at churches, castles and abbeys where he could expect to be given as much sustenance as he could pick up with one scoop. Probably he would be given oats, barley, and perhaps beer or wine. Thus even the poorest household could give charity without being overburdened. The scallop symbol identified the pilgrims as harmless and allowed them to move unmolested through wars and civil unrest. Another legend of the Way of St. James holds that the route was seen as a sort of fertility pilgrimage, undertaken when a young couple desired to bear offspring. The scallop shell is believed to have originally been carried therefore by pagans as a symbol of fertility. The shell symbol found its way into heraldry as a badge of those who had been on the pilgrimage to Compostela, although later it became a symbol of pilgrimage in general. Winston Churchill's family coat of arms includes a scallop, as does John Wesley's (the reason why the scallop shell is used as an emblem of Methodism).

The familiar world-wide symbol of the Shell Group (scallop) is called the "pecten". The pecten became the symbol of the Royal Dutch/Shell Group because co-founder Marcus Samuel made his earliest fortune importing knick-knacks made from exotic sea shells from the Far East. When Samuel's "Shell" Transport and Trading Company merged with Royal Dutch Petroleum Company in 1907, a shell was adopted as the company's symbol and trademark. If public recognition of a company's trademark is worth money, then the Shell Group should be prosperous for many years. A recent study indicated that with the exception of Santa Claus, the Shell pecten is the most recognized symbol in the world.

Recipe for Pan-grilled scallops with baby spinach and pine nut salad follows on the next page

Pan-grilled scallops with baby spinach and pine nut salad

8 Scallops, with their corals

1 tbsp Olive oil

75g baby Spinach

25g pine nuts, toasted until golden in a dry frying pan or in the oven

1/2 tsp lemon zest, finely grated

3 tbsp Olive oil

1 tbsp lemon juice

Wash and dry the scallops and cut off the corals. Slice the scallops in half horizontally and add to the corals. Keep chilled until needed.

To make the dressing, mix the olive oil and lemon juice in a bowl and season. Heat a grill pan or frying pan, (non-stick if possible) until very hot. Drizzle the scallops with the olive oil and toss, then season with a small pinch of salt and pepper. Place on the hot grill pan or frying pan and cook until golden on each side, about 2 minutes.

Place the spinach in a bowl and drizzle with just enough dressing to coat lightly and place on serving plates.

Take the pan off the heat and transfer the scallops to sit on or beside the spinach. Sprinkle with the toasted pine nuts and the lemon zest, and serve straightaway.

5oz(175g unsalted butter (softened) 10oz(350g) icing sugar


1 level tblspn instant coffee dissolved in hot water.

NATURE NOTES

The nesting season is well under way and the Blue Tits are whizzing in and out their beaks full of little green If there were no caterpillars. caterpillars there would be a shortage of Blue Tits. If there were no Blue Tits the garden would be eaten bare by caterpillars. Left alone, nature maintains a balance, but when we start spraying pesticide around we cause all sort of unexpected and unwanted results.

One very good piece of news is that Marsh Harriers have been seen down on the Level carrying nesting materials. Let's hope they are successful.

Foxes also are feeding their families, and they have taken several baby lambs. One took a lamb in broad daylight while the farmer was in the same field; he saw it happen but was too far away to prevent it. Foxes usually target ewes with twins. They separate the lambs and then grab one while the mother defends the other. Foxes are highly intelligent and very agile, which is why they are the most widespread carnivore in the world. thriving everywhere from the arctic to the tropics, in deserts, forests, grassland and cities. Their natural prey is rabbits and rodents, and no doubt they see lambs as a much easier option.

Since coming the Pett in 1975 I have kept a note of the first date each year when I heard the cuckoo. This is the first year when I have not heard one before the end of April.

It was lovely to see that the daffodils throughout the village were not vandalised this year. Keep a look out for marigolds ~ you might be surprised where they pop up!

Do you know that the 'twitten' at Pett was consecrated for burials recently?

On St. George's day [23rd April] this year the Bishop of Lewes, the Rt. Rev. Wallace Benn, came to Pett to consecrate the piece of land adjacent to Pett church for the purpose of burials. This was quite an historic occasion as it is rare



these days to be able to witness such an event. The last time this occurred at St. Mary & St. Peter church was in 1907 [one hundred and one years ago] after William Lucas-Shadwell made a gift to the church of a piece of land to the south side of the building.

Since then, more than 300 folk have been buried in the churchyard and it was known, many years ago that the time would come when more land was needed. It was in 1950 that Mr Jones of Mill Cottage gave the twitten, on the east side of the existing churchyard as an additional place for burial when it was needed. That time has now arrived and the process of obtaining planning permission, clearing the area and making the necessary arrangements with the Diocese began more than a year ago.

So it was on a sunny spring afternoon, after earlier showers, that about thirty Pett people stood at the church-side entrance to the twitten. The blossom on the trees and the singing birds made for an enchanting setting. The Bishop, the Rural Dean [the Rev. Hugh Mosely], the Rector [the Rev. Bernard Crosby] and the Diocesan Registrar carried out the official reading and signing of the 'Instrument of Consecration' and then the Bishop led a short and moving service entitled "The Order Consecration of a Churchyard". This was followed by tasty refreshments some verv enjoyed by everyone in the church. which people had the during



opportunity to chat about what they had witnessed and been a part of.

Pett Church has been a focus in the village for hundreds of years and more than one church has stood on the site. Burials have taken place there for more years than there are records for and the earliest recorded is around 1530. It is good to think that the good people of the village have been laid to rest in this quite magic place and it is equally good to realise that the church site will serve the village for many years to come.

FLICKS FILM SOCIETY

On the 5th June our show will be the film titled : And When Did You Last See Your Father? Rated as a 12A. The storyline is about a writer seeking to bury the hatchet with his terminally ill dad. In this powerful drama both Colin Firth. and especially Broadbent. enthral US wonderfully vivid performances. As the teenage version of Firth's grumpy scribe, cheeky up-andcomer Matthew Beard is also one to watch. Past and present are skilfully entwined from the memoirs of Blake Morrison revealing a complex tangle of emotions. Visiting dad for what he knows is the final time. Blake tries to come to with their history. In flashbacks, Arthur is an exuberant but very tactless father. Humiliating the boy in front of prospective girlfriends is bad enough, but his affair with aunt Beaty (Sarah Lancashire) guarantees his son's diligent loathing. And yet with age comes wisdom.

It's easy to see why the offended parties, including Arthur's long-suffering wife (the brilliant *Juliet Stevenson*), couldn't stay angry with him for long. Broadbent strikes the perfect balance between infuriating old sod and endearing 'little boy lost'. He also benefits from a finely crafted script. Arthur's inbred reluctance to show any emotion means that even the

vaguest gesture of compassion has a devastating effect. Tucker's direction is similarly toned down, getting in close to the actors and conveying their unspoken feelings without becoming bogged down in syrupy sentiment. Arthur's blinkered approach to fatherhood raises a good few laughs as well, like forcing Blake to test out his selfmade 'waterproof' tent on a compulsory camping trip. Clichés are in evidence (e.g. a driving lesson on the beach serves as one happy memory), but there can be no doubting the film's sincerity. And for all the heartbreak, you will be left with good memories.

In order to give you some advance information, the award winning film La Vie En Rose will be screened on July 3rd and as usual, all are welcome to join the Society and enjoy an evening watching a film for as little as £4.00 per show with likeminded people in the local environment of Pett Village Hall. 
