These date from 1951 to 1977 and give guite a bit of social village history as to who was winning, judging and opening shows at that time, and where. The early shows were staged in the Beach Club (now the Smuggler) and on the field opposite and were know as the Pett and Fairlight

Flower Show, held in August, moving up to the Recreation ground in 1954. Advertisers included Two Sawyers Country Club; The Royal Oak Temperance Inn: Pett Garage and the White Hart Inn. We had The Market Stores on Pett Level. Sweatmans Stores and Barden & Sons, Builders, Decorators and Funeral Directors, to name just a few.

We do hope you all enjoy this year's special Diamond show and all the attractions that accompany it. There are all the old favourites of course like the Raffle, Produce. Plants and Bowl for a Pig. Books, Puzzles, Coconut shy and Tombola and some of the newer ones are Pimms Bar, Birds of Prey and the BBQ. For the Dads this year we are introducing a Beer Tent (best not visited before you take part in the Children's/parents Sports events ~ although!) The Memorabilia tent will be a must with a 'Guess Who' section and will your dog take a prize this year in the Fun Dog Show? NATURE NOTES

A fox cub poked his head out from under a bush, watching the big wide world with bright, inquisitive eyes. One of the tegs grazed her way towards him. Cautiously he came right out into the open, half crouching. unsure whether to approach this strange woolly creature or whether to run away. The teg ignored him completely and just kept coming. When she was

only a few feet from him, the cub's

nerve broke and he turned and

scuttled back under the bush.

Later on the same round I saw a Little Owl perched on a tree stump. When he saw me he stretched his neck and turned his head in that quaint way which owls have. before flying off unhurried manner. There are little families of swans, mallards and moorhens in the ditches, marsh frogs everywhere singing their love songs, and wild flowers all along the margins of the watercourses. Pett Level is indeed a magical

I was delighted to see a juvenile Nuthatch on the feeder, which obviously means that they have bred somewhere close by. I've also had a lot of pleasure watching the young Blue Tits learning to use the nut feeders.

place.

In the space of a few weeks there have been three badgers killed on the same stretch of road near Lunsford Farm. They are territorial, and young males are elected from the sett to go and set up their territories elsewhere. but in this area they have

reached saturation

point. Badgers have natural predators, and because they are omnivores their numbers are not limited by the availability of their prey. Because there are no spare territories to be had, the young males are either killed by adult territory-holders, or run over on the roads. From the badgers' point of view there would be a lot less suffering if they could be humanely and selectively culled - a solution which would at present be illegal. The alternative, as with all species including humans which breed out of control, is likely to be disease epidemics or starvation or both.

I have been given a very interesting account of a cormorant which caught an eel and flew away with it. only to be dive-bombed by a heron and made to drop it. behaviour is quite common with skuas and the larger gulls, but I have never seen a heron do it. Do let me know of any interesting or unusual sightings - I am always interested and if there is space I will put them in the Notes.

DO YOU KNOW?

Do you know where Lunsford Farm gets its name? Actually the farm takes its name from William Lunsford. who in his described a 'gentleman'. William was a man of substance, owning farms and land around Fairlight, Ore and Battle as well as Pett. He and his wife Eleanor acquired much of their land in the 1670s. In 1672 he bought eighteen acres of land in Pett, which included eight acres, called 'Le Two year later he Stench'. acquired a barn and sixty acres called Keales Farm, near Shellies Green. He bought this for £260 from John Back of Battle. In 1676 Lunsford bought a house with six acres in Fairlight called 'Smale Sports' from Elizabeth Winter of Hastings. In 1716 it was referred to as 'Sports Land. In 1680 he was expanding again, buying a house and six pieces of land containing sixteen acres in Fairlight from Thomas and Priscilla Odiarne of Beckley for £82.

Though William and Eleanor prospered they suffered frequent deaths of their children. In 1677 they lost their eighteen-month-old daughter, Judith. In 1682 they gave the same name to another girl, but she died when she was only four. Another daughter Mary, born in 1674, died at the age of twelve. Their eldest son, Herbert, died in 1675, only seventeen and the younger son – another William – died in 1707. Their youngest

daughter Elizabeth survived, but little is known about her.

The name Lunsford was once common in this part of Sussex. In 1535 a John Lunsford owned 'Wykham' Farm and left money in his will to repair the road between 'panell brigge and Wykham Roke' in addition to sums of money for the poor people of 'Geslynge, Pett and Farleygh' (Fairlight). William Lunsford is thought to have been a kinsman of Colonel Thomas Lunsford, who fought on the Royalist side in the Civil War and was on trial in 1637 for shooting his relative, Sir Nicholas Pelham.

The Lunsford's lived on the farm in Pett Road, but William died when he was only middle aged in 1691. His wife Eleanor kept the farm going and lived on until 1736, well into her nineties - an extraordinary age for that time. In 1724 it is known that she was paying three shillings Land Tax on some of the land around the farm. It is quite likely that Elizabeth married because Eleanor's granddaughter, Mary Marten and her husband Thomas took on the farm after the Lunsfords. After Eleanor died there were no more Lunsfords in Pett: now few have the name in East Sussex at all. William, Eleanor and five of their six children are buried in the churchyard of St. Mary & St. Peter, Pett.

The farm has changed hands several times since then and has changed in size as fields have been bought and sold over the years. In 1851 it was being farmed by the Skinners and in 1888 the Dunlop family became tenants. Andrew Dunlop of Church Farm, Hendon (in Middlesex) took on the lease for his son Robert. Robert died in 1894 and his younger brother Thomas took over the tenancy. Thomas bought the farm in 1917 when the Fairlight Hall Estate was sold, and when he died in 1958, his son Andy took over. The Dunlops continue to farm the land with Andrew, Andy's son carrying on the long tradition begun by William Lunsford.

It would be very interesting to know if William Lunsford actually did farm the land in Pett. It is quite likely that he hired others to carry out the work as he certainly spent much time dealing with his other properties. In his will, Herbert was to inherit the house and farm at Pett. William was to receive land in Battle and Ore and the house and farm at Fairlight - but, sadly neither of them lived to enjoy their inheritance. Elizabeth, on the other hand did inherit not merely a house and other buildings in Guestling, but the then large sum of £500 at the age of twenty-one, or on her marriage should that come earlier. We do not know which came first!

We do know that while farming continues in Pett, the name Lunsford will be well known to all the local inhabitants.

The High Weald Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) is a nationally important landscape. It was designated by Government in 1983 to conserve and enhance its historic character of rolling hills draped with small irregular fields, abundant woods and hedges, scattered farmsteads and sunken lanes.

The High Weald covers parts of 4 counties - East Sussex, West Sussex, Kent and Surrey, With an area of 570 square miles (1,457 sq km) it is the 4th largest AONB in the UK. It is also the largest AONB in South East England.

The story of the High Weald's landscape is inseparably tied to the people who lived in it. The future conservation and evolution of this landscape is dependent upon safeguarding the traditional interactions between people and nature.

The Story of the High Weald's Woodland

Seventy percent of the woodland in your parish is probably 'ancient'!

Trees and woodland cover over one third of this distinctive landscape - with its pattern of steep, wooded ravines (called gills), small woods and copses separating the fields.

The woods of the High Weald were relatively slow to be cleared because they were a valued human resource, yielding wood for timber and fuel plus acorns and beech mast for animal food (particularly pigs). Although heavily exploited, High Weald woods were rarely destroyed. While the surrounding lands (and indeed much of England) were being permanently settled and farmed, the High Weald remained relatively uncultivated: by Domesday (1086) it was the most densely wooded area remaining in England.

Even when agricultural clearance did begin in the High Weald, much of the woodland was retained. Field boundaries were formed by leaving strips of the original woodland between the fields. The many woods on steep-sided gills would not have yielded useful agricultural land anyway. The remaining woodland continued to provide valuable resources, particularly for the iron industry.

Much of today's High Weald woodland has probably never been cleared. Today, over 70% of the High Weald's woodland is classed as ancient - having existed continuously since at least 1600AD. (Nationally, only about 19% of woodland is ancient.)

Having existed for hundreds of years, ancient woodlands are very important habitats for certain woodland plants that can only colonise very slowly. Ancient woodlands also contain a wealth of archaeological features - for example the remains of iron workings.

High Weald woodlands were managed for centuries by skilled workers, using a rotational coppice system. This ensured that a renewable supply of wood was always available especially for fuel and building materials.

Woodlands need to be worked: without management, they become derelict and wildlife species that depend upon working woodland as a habitat suffer. Coppice woodland, in particular, is an important habitat because many British flowering plants, mammals and insects thrive under this rotational system - often the rarer species are now only found in working coppice.


