Hard Times in the Snow ~ Mike Russell The Sussex Wildlife Trust ~ www.sussexwt.org.uk



This time last year I was extolling the virtues of the snow that had descended upon us and low and behold as I write this we have just had another blanket covering; and to think when I arrived in Sussex in 1985 I was emphatically told that it never snows here!

Birdwatchers get very excited in this sort of weather though for the birds themselves it makes life far from exciting. Birds start to do unusual things; they become disorientated and have to start moving about more to look for food, therefore increasing the chance of something unfamiliar turning up in your garden. This winter everyone has been hoping that waxwings, Viking invaders from Scandinavia that came into Northern Britain in October and November will, over the coming months. make their way south, feasting on the remaining berries as they go. As I write they have yet to reach Sussex in any numbers, but by the time you read this they may be here in force.

Another colourful northern winter migrant is the brambling which started to appear before Christmas, with reports coming in from gardens in Henfield and Worthing. Bramblings are finches and are similar in appearance to chaffinches but are more orange in colour than pink and if you see one on your bird table you will realise that you are looking at something a bit different to your usual birds.

Birds that readily come to gardens and visit bird feeders are able to survive these cold, snowy winters better than other species. During the cold spell before Christmas many people were reporting seeing snipe and woodcock even in the most suburban of gardens. Sadly, many of them were starving and there were some reports of dead birds. They are waders with very long beaks which they use to probe deep into mud and grass to look for food, so when the ground becomes frozen and covered in snow, finding something to eat becomes more difficult. They then have to expend even more energy travelling longer distances in the search for food. If they are unsuccessful they end up exhausted, emaciated and soon die.

Searching for food can cause what are known as 'cold weather movements' when vast number of birds are pushed further southwards or westwards and it is not unusual to look up in the skies and see flocks of birds heading in that direction. Lapwings are particularly noticeable for this behaviour - they seem to know that food will be easier to find. In such conditions Southern Ireland has large influxes of birds as it tends to stay warmer throughout the winter, but should it experience a really cold prolonged spell then the birds are in real trouble as there is really nowhere else to go.

Cold weather then provides a quandary for birdwatchers. You do get a chance to see species that are rare; but then you know that these birds are really struggling to survive. It is of course part of the natural cycle, our bird species have evolved to cope with fluctuations in climate but as life generally gets more difficult for them to cope, these prolonged cold spells can be more of a problem than they once used to be.

Allotment News Judith Dean

The first four months of the Pett Allotments has seen the site transformed from a ploughed field into 22 productive plots. A variety of garden strategies are to be seen – from green compost to manure heaps, raised beds to traditional plots and a variety of compost bins, water butts, fruit cages and benches. Cabbages, onions, garlic and beans are already growing in some plots. In addition, the allotments have done wonders for the 'social cohesion' of the village.

The site is rather quiet at the moment but I know plotters wander up from time to time to look at their plots and to enjoy the tranquillity. It is amazing how even digging doesn't seem such a chore there (speaking personally - not everyone might agree!)

The parish council continue to be very supportive. In addition to providing us with a container to use as a communal shed, they have agreed to lay a central path so that plot holders can access their plots more easily. This should have been done by the time you read this, weather permitting. They are also providing the money for a second-hand rotivator which will help us keep unused plots in order as well as being available to the rest of the plotters.

PETT PARISH COUNCIL - 21st DECEMBER 2010 reported by Mary Saint

At the Pett Parish Council meeting held on 21st December Council members heard from Councillor Patten that whilst he was unable to give details about the Pett Parish Precept, he could confirm that Rother District Council would have to reduce its budget by 17% in 2011/12 and 12-13% the following year. He explained that the reductions in the first year would be manageable but those for the following year would be harder. When asked about reserves. Councillor Patten replied that the reserves were mainly for capital projects that had already been agreed.

'Exception Site' policy for affordable housing - 15 sites had been identified to which the agreed criteria had been applied and as a result 6 sites were considered possible. The next part of the process was to approach the relevant landowners to see if they would be interested in selling the land. If any were, then further work would be done and the matter would be brought back to the Parish Council. major presentation would be made at the Annual Parish Meeting where everyone could give their views before any decisions were made.

Little Cheyne Wind Farm Community Fund – Pett had now been included in the area of benefit and local groups could make applications for grants from between £1,000 and £5,000 for a

wide range of projects such as church hall refurbishment, cricket clubs and farmers' markets.

Concern was expressed at the meeting by members of the public about the building of a new pavilion by Pett Bowls Club and possible breaches of planning approval. The matter was discussed by the Council and it was agreed that the matter would be investigated as a matter of urgency.

Church Flower Festival from Cathy Norris

At a recent meeting it was proposed to hold our 6th annual church flower festival on the weekend of September 17th & 18th 2011. Over the last 5 years the flower festival has proved very successful, so with a lot of thought we have come up with a theme of "Favourite Poems". We also thought it was a good idea to ask local people what their favourite poem is, we would then hopefully incorporate it into the flower festival (bearing in mind that we have to interpret it in flowers!)

Nature Notes ~ Avril Thurley

In a field off Pannel Lane something was being mobbed by a small group of jackdaws. As I drew nearer I could see that it was a rabbit. The jackdaws were taking turns to beat it up swooping very low over its back and shouting in its flattened ears. The rabbit visibly cringed at each aerial attack and eventually made a break for the cover of the hedge, harried all the way by the birds. Jackdaws to not kill rabbits, so what were they doing? Many birds mob their predators (I once saw a pair of Little Owls drive off a fox which had approached their nest too closely), but a rabbit is neither predator nor, to a jackdaw, prey. Judging by their general air of excitement and the way they seemed to be taking turns to terrorise the rabbit, I am inclined to think that they were simply tormenting it for fun, kike a gang of playground bullies. Corvids are amongst the most intelligent, and therefore playful, of

birds. We have eight species in Britain: rook, jackdaw, jay, magple, raven, carrion crow, hooded crow and chough. Although you are unlikely to see wither of the last two in Pett.

For the first time I can remember, my witch hazel was not in flower at Christmas. The first delicious yellow blooms didn't appear until January 3rd. No doubt the delay was caused by the very cold weather in November and December.

Also on 3rd January I had a pied wagtail on the feeders. Pied wagtails are not themselves rare, indeed there are often large flocks of them in the surrounding countryside, but they very rarely visit my back garden because it is too small and too enclosed. I noticed that my resident robin was very wary of it, and gave it best on the bird table; they have either had a dust-up or the wagtails' reputation has gone before it.

ROYAL OAK - Pett Village ~ John Taylor

Though it is known that the Two Sawyers was an alehouse from 1781, I have no knowledge about when the Royal Oak started to sell ale.

Between 1851 and 1867 it is known that George Hills was the publican and was also a "Carrier" to Hastings.

In the 1881 Census Thomas Hills was the publican and Shelsmith was his wife – aged 51 at the time. She was still alive - and it looks like was still living at the Oak when she was 82 – 1911 or 1912.

Both the Royal Oak and the Two Sawyers had their licences revoked by Florentia Lucas Shadwell in the early 1890s, and the Royal Oak became a Temperance Inn and also catered for picnics and other parties. (There are three stories why this was done – I could write an article about it!!)

From 1894 to 1899 Henry (Horace) Screes was the publican (see 1901 cencus below.

In 1905 the Royal Oak was run by Richard Moon (from Kelly's Directory)

Between 1923 and 1930 A.J. Morris ran the pub and also owned the 20 seater DY 6194 Leyland Badger bus that ran a service to and from Hastings in 1930 after the first bus in 1923.

In the 1960s the pub was empty for several years and in November 1967 there was a petition to preserve the inn. In February 1969 enquiries were made regarding the ownership. It was purchased by Rother Council and the banning of the sale of alcohol was annulled. Between December 1970 and February 1974 the completion of the lease to new tenants – Mr and Mrs S Lorenz took place.

There are gaps in the tenancy of the Royal Oak and perhaps other folk in Pett may have the answers.

The Schwarberts took over from Sid Lorenz and Jasmine from them.

Smoked Haddock & Leek Risotto ~ Sarah Adams

Serves 4



small knob of butter
1 large leek, thinly sliced
300g risotto rice, such as arborio or carnaroli
700ml fish or vegetable stock
200ml full-fat milk
375g smoked haddock, skinned and cut into large
chunks

3 tbsp creme fraiche 100g baby spinach

Heat oven to 200C/ 180C fan/ gas 6. Heat the butter in a large ovenproof dish over a medium heat. Cook the leek for 4-5 mins, stirring regularly until just tender/. Add the rice and stir for a further 2 mins.

Add the stock and milk, bring to the boil and bubble for 5 mins before sitting the haddock on top. Cover with a lid or foil and bake in the oven for 18 mins until the rice is tender.

Fold in the creme fraiche and spinach, season with plenty of black pepper, then cover the pan again and leave to rest out of the oven for 3 mins before serving - the steam will soften the spinach.
