

April's meeting was truly interesting. An excellent speaker from the Kent,

Surrey and Sussex Air Ambulance, Heather Woodward, kept us fascinated with facts and figures about this essential service, which helps save hundreds of lives each year.

Did you know, for example, that apart from road traffic accidents. where surrounding traffic often makes it impossible for roadbased emergency services to get to and from the scene quickly, one of the more frequent emergencies is on the numerous golf courses in the area. Heart attacks on a golf course, often miles away from the club-house. means that the Air Ambulance comes into its own in being able to land near the patient and transport them to the nearest appropriate hospital. The Air Ambulance aims to get to the scene of any accident within 15 minutes of being called, in whichever of the three counties it is required. This essential service costs £1.7 million each year and with no government, National Lottery or NHS support. It is entirely funded by the community it serves.

May's meeting will have consisted of debating the 2011 resolutions, including the closure of local libraries and proposed mega-farms but, in June, we will have a speaker from the Raystede Centre for Animal Welfare.

Meetings are held on the third Friday in the month at 2.30pm in Pett village hall. Why not come along and see if it is your cup of tea, speaking of which - there are always excellent sandwiches and cakes to finish!

#### FLICKS IN THE VILLAGE ~ Chris Saint and the Flicks Team

At long last we are able to confirm that we will have secured a copy of the Oscar-winning film **The King's Speech** and will be offering two opportunities to view it on the **2nd June**, either at **2.30 pm** or at our normal time of **7.30** 



pm. The afternoon matinee will be principally aimed at older folk to enjoy the film at a special price of £1 and be able to return home, before night time. However, all are welcome. As you may well be aware *The King's Speech* is the tale of Elizabeth II's father, George VI (Colin Firth) and his remarkable friendship with maverick speech therapist Lionel Logue (Geoffrey Rush). Fascinating, moving and often humorous it charts

the personal relationship that developed between England's reluctant King George VI, plagued by a nervous stammer, and his irreverent Australian speech therapist. As the second son of George V, Prince Albert "Bertie" was not expected to ascend to the throne, but when his brother Edward abdicates to marry American Wallis Simpson, Bertie, as his successor, is crowned King. George becomes King as radio is taking off as a mass medium and the Second World War looms. Thrust into the international spotlight he must speak not only to the nation but to the people of the British Empire, across the world. His wife, Queen Elizabeth (Helena Bonham-Carter) - the future Queen Mother - is tireless in her belief in him. Having tried all the traditional doctors she engages unorthodox outsider, Logue, to help him find a voice that can inspire a nation on the brink of war.

On the 7<sup>th</sup> July we will be screening The Social Network which was written by Aaron Sorkin and directed by David Fincher's. This breathless picture is a

YOU DON'T GET TO 500 MILLION FRIENDS WITHOUT LAKING A FEW ENEMIES fast and witty creation myth about how Facebook grew from Zuckerberg's insecure geek-at-Harvard days into a phenomenon with 500 million users. Sorkin frames the movie around two lawsuits aimed at the lofty but brilliant Zuckerberg (deftly played by Adventureland's Jesse Eisenberg): a claim that he stole the idea from lvy League classmates, and a suit by his original, now slighted, business partner (Andrew Garfield). The movie follows a familiar rise-and-fall pattern, with temptation in the form of a sunny California Beelzebub (an expert Justin Timberlake as former Napster founder Sean Parker) and an increasingly tangled legal

mess. Fincher's command of pacing and his eye for the clean spaces of Aughts-era America are bracing, and he can't resist the technical trickery involved in turning actor Armie Hammer into privileged Harvard twins (Hammer is letter-perfect). Even with its flaws, *The Social Network* is a galloping piece of entertainment, a smart ride with smart people... who sometimes do dumb things.



#### Trout

4 trout fillets 50g breadcrumbs 1 tbsp butter, softened 1 small bunch parsley, chopped zest and juice of 1 lemon, plus lemon wedges to serve 25g pine nuts, toasted and half roughly

chopped

1 tbsp olive oil



Heat the grill to high.

Lay the fillets, skin side down, on an oiled baking tray.

Mix together the breadcrumbs, butter, parsley, lemon zest and juice, and half the pine nuts.

Scatter the mixture in a thin layer over the fillets, drizzle with the oil and place under the grill for 5 mins.

Sprinkle over the remaining pine nuts, then serve with the lemon wedges and a potato salad.

#### Pett Older People's Project (POPP) - What is it all about?

#### Our Aim

To develop a social community centre for older and isolated people living in Pett, Pett Level, and the surrounding villages of Guestling, Icklesham, Three Oaks, Winchelsea Beach and Fairlight.

The centre would provide a day away from home for people that are 60 plus and would benefit from meeting other people who may be isolated or lonely and in need of reaching the local community.

The centre is intended to be a community hub providing support services and facilities, giving information and guidance, and will include visits and speakers who specialise in Pensions, Citizens Advice Bureau, Health Information, Podiatry and other health services, Benefits, Travelling shops, Exercise and Social Activities.

The centre would meet one day a week (possibly a Tuesday or Thursday) from 10.30am – 2.30/3pm. It would include a nutritious lunch, refreshments, social activities and advice at a reasonable cost of £5.00 for the day, and transport can also be provided for a further £2.00.

#### What We Need To Do

- Carry out a survey of the people in the area to ascertain the need for this service.
  - o How many people will come and use the centre.
  - What the people of Pett and surrounding villages want in their community.
- · We will also need:
  - o Committee members, volunteers and helpers
  - o Volunteer drivers.
  - o fund raising, and to secure grant funding to start up the project

If there is enough response to the survey the results will be used in our application for funding and grants. Once funds are raised, the project will be able to start. We would really like the centre to be up and running by the end of the summer.

Please support us in getting this project off the ground and bringing this lovely facility into Pett

Please note this Project is <u>not</u> affiliated to MOPP at Fairlight. It will be run as a separate group, and any members of MOPP who live in Pett and surrounding villages are still very welcome to attend either or both centres.

It is hoped that POPPs will be starting in Pett, sometime in September, but before then a summer buffet and fundraiser will be organised for the 9th July in the Village Hall.

In the mean time if anyone you know is having a clear out or perhaps you can help with any of these items, please let us know. Even if it's just one item; one plate or pudding bowl or a surplus cruet set, it all helps.



### Water Saving Tips in the Home

Check your home for leaks. Hidden water leaks can be wasting water without you even being aware of it. If your property is metered, a good way to check for leaks is to read your meter, not use any water for a couple of hours and go back to check that the meter reads exactly the same. If it does not, there is a

leak.

Turn off tap while cleaning your teeth, shaving or washing your face. You can waste up to 9 litres a minute by just letting the water pour down the sink.





Take a short shower rather than a bath could save you up to 400 litres a week. If you do have baths, just half fill them.

Fix any dripping tap, you can waste 90 litres a week which will cost a lot more than what might just be the price of a new washer.





Don't overfill the kettle when making a cup of tea. Only fill and boil what you need, this will save you money on your energy costs too.

Only use the washing machine and the dishwasher when you can put on a full load. It wastes both water and energy to run only a half full machine.



Keep cool water in the fridge so that you do not need to run water down the sink to have a cold drink.

Fit water saving device in your cistern to save when flushing, this can save you 3 litres a flush. Think before throwing used water down the drain, eg water in a pan after cooking, this could be reused for watering plants around the house when cooled down, or in the garden.

#### DO YOU KNOW?

More about Martello's! - Do you know about Martello Tower No. 37?

Of the eight Martello Towers on the beach between Dogs Hill Road at Winchelsea Beach and and Pett Level, tower No. 37 stood on the beach opposite the turning into Toot Rock. It was eventually blown up by the Royal Engineers in 1866. However, earlier in that year it was used for a rather strange experiment.

In the first half of the 19th century there had been some large accidental explosions involving gunpowder and causing several deaths. Much thought was given to the safe handling of the explosive powder and in 1865 James Gale offered the War Office a solution. Mr Gale was a blind 30 year old chemist who had the idea that if an inert substance was added to the powder it would fill the spaces between the grains and so prevent any rapid burning, making the whole safe until needed. He proposed the use of



powdered glass for this purpose and by using a sieve; the glass could be easily removed leaving the gunpowder unaffected. His experiments showed that the best results were obtained by adding 1 part of gunpowder to 4 parts of glass.



There were objections to this proposal involving cost and weight, even though the glass was reusable.

But, James Gale argued well and demonstrated his glass mixed with raw gunpowder by plunging a red hot poker into the mixture with complete safety. He even gave a personal demonstration at Windsor Castle to Queen Victoria and some of the Royal children.

The military authorities wondered if the performance of the gunpowder would deteriorate in any way during the mixing and sieving processes. They tested it before and after by using it on canons. They also loaded barrels of the mixture on carts and drove them 200 miles to see if there were any problems due to friction between the different materials.

Eventually on the 21 June 1866 5 tons of gunpowder was mixed with 20 tons of glass powder and packed in 338 wooden barrels. 100 of these barrels were placed in the basement of Martello Tower No. 37 and the remaining barrels placed on the upper floor. Detonators were placed in the barrels and connected to Tower No. 38 (near the present "Smuggler"). When fired there was at first no visible effect. Later the wooden floor was set afire and although dense smoke appeared there was no explosion. The fire burnt for several days and was left to go out by itself. Many of the barrels in the basement were found not to have been affected at all by the experiment and the gunpowder did not explode.

The experiment was said to have been a great success both by James Gale and the press. The inside of the Martello Tower was a total mess but the tower still stood defiant to the last. The Royal Engineers had to use a considerable amount of the glass free gunpowder to finally destroy the tower. So the Towers built to repel Napoleon's invasion of this island served a different purpose and No. 37 provided a good host for James Gale's big experiment.

# Nature Notes ~ Avril Thurley

I was gardening under a big variegated holly when I felt a light scratchy sensation on the top of my head. I assumed it was a falling holly leaf, and got on with my work. A few minutes later it happened again. Puzzled I looked for the leaf but there was nothing to be found. The third time it happened I caught a glimpse of a robin flying away. Surely not! But I kept an eye on him



and sure enough some minutes later he attacked me again, his little claws actually making contact with my

head. Clearly he was defending his nest in the holly, so in deference to his courage and determination I took myself off to garden elsewhere. But what an extraordinary experience! Has anyone else ever been physically attacked by a robin?

The huge beech tree in the garden of Wythenden, next door to my cottage, was for many years the biggest tree in Pett, and could be seen from literally miles around. Some years back it died from a beech fungal disease and the crown was removed for safety's sake, but the trunk and part of the branches were left as a beautiful architectural sculpture. The rising sun used to catch it, turning it pink. At Easter it finally fell, demolishing the shed but

doing no other serious damage. Thus passes another Pett landmark. but at least there are other big trees in Brigitte and Jim's lovely garden.



When I was given a report of a Spotless Starling in a local garden I must have looked somewhat blank, because I had never heard of such a bird. My Guide to Birds of Britain and Europe says "Replaces Starling in southwestern most Europe.

plumages, in
summer
without white
sports. Nests

colonially. Song resembles that of Starling but is more powerful." So now we know. Presumably it had heard about the wonderful weather we were having, and had popped over for its holidays.





### The Fantastic World of the Cuckoo ~ Mike Russell of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

Every now and again something on the radio catches your attention and you just have to stop what you are doing and listen to it. Such a programme was broadcast last week although by the time you read this it will have been about six weeks ago!

For many people, the sound of the cuckoo means that spring has arrived and though not everyone has heard



the call, and even less have actually seen one, they know about the bird; it is deeply embedded in our aural and cultural heritage. This programme on Radio 4 looked into the fascinating world of this mysterious bird and was presented by Professor Nick Davies of Cambridge University who has been studying the cuckoo for many years at Wickham Fen National Nature Reserve in Cambridgeshire.

Even if you are not interested in birds the majority of people know that the cuckoo is a parasite; it gets other

species to raise its young. Knowledge of their behaviour has been known for generations, but it is only in 1922 that the first photographic evidence was published and since then, and particularly through Professor Davies's studies and observations at Wickham Fen, we now far more about their fascinating ecology.

This relationship between the parasite and host is constantly changing and developing and the research shows that they are now embroiled in an ecological 'arms race' with the cuckoo evolving ever more sophisticated ways of mimicking the hosts birds eggs while they are also evolving new ways of detecting the cuckoo's eggs. A female cuckoo effectively has a territory and, having mated, watches that territory to observe the smaller birds in whose nest she will lay her eggs. In the case of the Wickham Fen. study the cuckoos were parasiting on reed warblers so her eggs will have to resemble reed warbler eggs. If she was laying in a wren's nest they would have to look like those eggs.

How does the cuckoo get away with it? Well the female watches over her territory and notices when the reed warblers start laying and then in a process that lasts no more than 10 seconds the cuckoo will fly in, remove one of the host's eggs and replaces it with hers. For a bird the size of a dove she lays an egg to the equivalent size of a warbler and she will do this in a number of reed warbler's nests, as many as 25 visits have actually been recorded by one individual female cuckoo. The embryo within the egg is now known to develop faster than other birds which then gives the cuckoo chick an advantage in that it will hatch out first and will immediately push all the other eggs out the nest. It is able to do this because it has an almost flat disc on its back which makes the eggs more stable as it shoves them out!

The feeding of the single chick is another story in itself, but the final question the programme asked was 'How does a cuckoo know it's a cuckoo?' By the time the young cuckoo has fledged and ready to leave the nest, its parents have long been back in Africa, so it has no references to other adult birds. Well, the researchers answer was that they didn't know but the cuckoo just does! It knows it has to go somewhere else in winter and therefore as soon as it is ready will fly south to Africa probably individually rather than in a flock. If it makes it to Africa then it will catch up with the adult cuckoos and the process of learning how to be a cuckoo is completed. Basically it just knows it is one, it has all the basic attributes and then fine tunes itself over the winter ready to migrate back to Europe in the spring.

To hear a cuckoo is a wonderful sound, part of the soundscape of our natural world, but to know a little bit of the story behind this mysterious bird just enhances that experience so much more. Sadly cuckoos have been declining in numbers for a few years now, let's just hope that such a sound doesn't disappear from the landscape forever.

"As many of you will know, Sussex Police has been reviewing how the public use our police stations and has asked local people how they want to contact us in the future. People were directly engaged through telephone surveys, local face to face surveys in every district and through surveys of callers to police stations.

Sussex Police understands how important neighbourhood policing is to

our communities and we have promised to protect this despite the need to make at savings of £52 million 2015. by foremost priority is to

Our keep our police officers out on the streets and working with their local

communities so we are examining every aspect of how we currently operate to see what changes we can make that will save money but protect the service we provide.

We recognise that some of our current buildings and processes were designed decades ago to serve an incredibly different world and the way people want to contact us is changing. Most people contact us over the phone rather than by visiting a front office. The majority of visitors to police stations at the times that we are reducing hours are related to custody, bail or lost property. Many of our front counters have, on average, less than one visitor an hour.

Considerable research consultation with the public suggests that most people do not currently know the opening hours of their local police station front office and are willing to use alternative ways to get in touch with us.

Many would prefer to make an appointment rather than just "drop in". When asked their preferences for opening hours, the majority preferred office hours. The conclusion of our review is that there are alternative ways that people can contact us that would be more convenient for them and less expensive to run. The total cost of current front office arrangements is £4.2 million each year. By changing opening hours of front offices at times that they are not well used by the public we will save over £2 million per year. Making savings here will mean we can protect policing in local communities.

From May 9th we will be reducing the hours that people can just drop into front offices and offering more pre-planned appointments instead. In the future people will be able to book these online as well as over the phone. although this service is not yet available.

Please be reassured that even when the front counter service is not open, the police station is still staffed and functioning normally. In an emergency you will always be able to contact us quickly through our 999 number. We have one of the best records of all forces in the country at answering these calls quickly. Your policing service is provided by many people working from a number of different locations, which includes but is not limited to, your local police station. For example, officers do not respond to 999 calls from police stations, but are aiready out on patrol across Sussex. People who have been arrested are

taken to centralised custody centres. not a local station. We are confident that the overall service you receive will not change.

#### Save energy, save cash; get a monitor from your library ~ East Sussex County Council

Every East Sussex resident can now keep a close eye on their electricity usage at home by borrowing an energy monitor from their local



library.

Following successful pilot schemes in Eastbourne, Hastings, Bexhill and Lewes, energy monitors are now available to borrow, free, from all East Sussex public libraries across the county. So far, more than 800 residents have tried them out.

The monitors show how much electricity a householder is using at



any given moment. how much money this costs and an estimate of carbon the

dioxide produced in generating the electricity. You can see immediately the effect on your consumption when you switch off something that is on stand-by, or turn something on, and identify where savings can be made.

The easy-to-fit monitor features a sensor that clips around a domestic incoming supply cable, usually close to the property's meter. This plugs into a transmitter that sends realtime electricity consumption data to a portable display monitor that you can carry around your house or flat. Energy monitors are can be borrowed for an initial three-week loan with the option to renew them for a further three weeks. There is no cost for borrowing a monitor.

If you are not already a registered East Sussex library user, our library staff will be happy to arrange membership for you. It only takes a minute, and anyone who lives or works in East Sussex qualifies.

Councillor Matthew Lock, Lead Cabinet Member for Transport and Environment said "At a time when we're all trying to save cash, saving energy makes sense. portable meters are really easy to use and can show you your 'energy devils' - those gadgets that are using electricity on stand-by appliances that are much more energy-hungry than you thought." # My memories of Pett ~ Tony Turner, Nutfield, Surrey

During the 1939-1946 times in and around the Pett Village area, we children would live a child's life when situations allowed us to, even to the extent of playing in the fields near and far from home. Some of our lessons at Pett School were very odd in comparison to to-days lessons. One good lesson, I for one have never forgotten and never will is [1] Jump in a ditch and [2] If no ditch available, run towards it if a plane comes towards you with guns blazing trying to kill you. What a school day memory, so when a plane was heard and seen nearby, up went the call it's 'One of Ours' on most occasions.

Now, back to 'Save the Pilot'. On one occasion Vic, Ching and I were mucking about in fields down Pannell Lane when Vic spotted a plane zoom low past Pett Church steeple and it banked slightly towards us. It came even closer to us and in fact it came down in a copse very near to us. Up went the cry 'Save the Pilot', so off we set as fast as our little legs would carry us. Once on the lane we were confronted by a police man pedaling his bike rather fast like a 'Keystone Cop'. "Clear off you boys" he cried. which with one sentence ended our 'Save the Pilot' act. When we managed to have a somewhat distant view we saw in fact it was a 'Doodle Bug' and it had not exploded, so we could have not anyone. saved maybe just ourselves. Later the machine was

taken away mostly in one piece by the R.A.F.

The End and maybe The Beginning.

#### Footnote

For interest the map reference of the 'Doodle Bug' crash site is approximately, TQ 872 145. When the R.A.F took it away we were in school. We heard the large vehicle passing the school so to have a quick look the boys stood up to have a peek, it was the only way because the window height prevented us seeing out from the sitting position. I do not remember being told off for standing up.
