Nature Notes ~ Avril Thurley

From time to time I have to rescue birds from the greenhouse, usually blackbirds or starlings. Recently I had an unusual "captive" for which I donned gloves – a magpie. I've already been told that I should have wrung its neck, but I'm no good at killing things.

It is fairly well known that foxes will bury eggs which they have found and which are surplus to immediate requirements. The egg which I was shown buried in a planter at Hilden Cottage was far too big to be either a hen's or a duck's. Who in that area keeps geese?

Some eggs which escaped the attention of Mr Fox were those laid under an azalea in the garden of Glebe Hose.

The mallard duck brought off twelve ducklings, which were totally enchanting. She eventually took them off to the pond at The Roundels, accompanied by anxious human escorts to make sure they didn't get run over on the way.

My garden is awash with baby blue tits, now rapidly becoming expert at using the nut feeders. There tiny bundles of feathers must weigh almost nothing, yet they don't appear to be in the least inconvenienced by the strong winds we've been having. You'd think that they would blow away like thistledown. Isn't nature wonderful?

I have a field mouse who is a fairly regular visitor to the feeders. When he is there, the birds all keep away. I can understand them avoiding the squirrel, who would not be averse to making a meal of them, but why be afraid of a mouse? Even the starlings give him a wide berth, and they could probably kill him without much difficulty.

My most exciting wildlife experience for May was being shown the inside of a beehive – quite unforgettable. There is so much more to keeping bees than one might think, and it is certainly not something to be undertaken without proper training from an expert.

Cliff Top Capers With a Jackdaw ~ Dee Rampling

This time of year brings us many wonderful encounters with wildlife and I read with amusement Avril Thurley's account of her run in with a disgruntled robin. Shortly afterwards we were to be plunged into the world of close up bird encounters ourselves.

I had seen a fledgling Jackdaw on the cliff path but had decided to leave it as the parents are often around to guide their

young after they have just flown the nest. However, a couple of days later my husband came home cupping the very same Jackdaw in his hands, it could hardly keep awake and was in a sorry state.

The children busied themselves with boxes of straw and concoctions of ground up mealworms and wet seeded bread and it wasn't long before the pink gaping chasm of a beak started to screech for more. Within a couple of hours the Jackdaw was bouncing around, clambering onto our shoulders and searching expectantly for livestock in the children's hair (thankfully he was disappointed).

For the rest of the day rarely a moment went by without someone in the family walking by with a Jackdaw roosting on them. Great shrieks of disgusted delight were to be heard as globby streaks were shot down backs, arms and heads followed shortly afterwards

by wide-mouthed screeches and frantic feather rustling in a desperate attempt to signal more food is required NOW! I soon appreciated why the parent birds threw this one from the nest.

The Jackdaw ingratiated itself into our lives. A quick learner, he would swoop onto our outstretched arms when we called "Jaaaaack" in best jackdaw mimic. He would join us for tea on the patio, striding

across the table to investigate anything enticing and to feverishly peck at shiny object such as tea spoons (shiny things, it soon became clear, were his passion). He would land on your shoulder to nibble at

your ear or investigate your nose or any jewellery with great enthusiasm.

Having a gentle snooze in the sun? The Jackdaw would swoop over to snuggle down next to you for some chill out time. It would nonchalantly flit around the kitchen squawking for more grub if the humans were not coming up with the goods frequently enough. Most endearingly, it loved being with the children and tolerated all sorts of handling, even sitting on the edge of the trampoline or a bicycle's handlebars to be part of the action.

The dog, Quercus, did not escape the bird's attentions either; as he sauntered by the Jackdaw

would swoop down and land on his back and once a decent hold was established would snuggle down contentedly until shaken indignantly off. Quercus, it has to be said, has the facial expression throughout of a dog who finds the whole experience utterly undignified and humiliating and given half a chance, were the humans not watching with so much amusement, he'd probably sort the situation with one swift snap of the jaw.

Jack seems to want to stay at present, despite having the free run of the trees in the garden and on the cliff. He has been practising his aeronautical skills that, at present, leave a lot to be desired. He'll launch himself from a tree when you call him but at the last minute you never quite know which one of you he is going to land on as he tends to wobble and swerve last minute, feet flailing as he tries to figure out how his brakes work. We have started to decrease his dependence on us and he has quickly learnt to feed himself, pecking at insects, etc. At night he takes himself off to roost in the oaks on the cliff path but by 6 am he's tapping on the bedroom windows seeking human company.

One day he'll be on his way but in the mean time, for those of you who walk on the cliff path, should you suddenly find yourself with an over friendly Jackdaw landing on your head, he's neither lost nor abandoned....but do check your jewellery afterwards!

District Councillor's Report ~ Cllr Robin Patten

Not surprisingly one of the main issues raised at the Election in May was the highly controversial one of Exception Sites. The key areas to be resolved are that there is a proven demand for them, the number of affordable houses to be built, the system to be used for nomination and the siting of the development.

The 2010 Housing Survey identified 19 local households in housing need. The proposal to build 10 houses meets only half that need. The planning permission for the development will be subject to a legal agreement (Section 106 agreement) ensuring that the accommodation remains available to meet the purposes for which it was permitted. The Parish Council would be involved in drafting the section 106 and the wording in the clauses will meet their specific requirements. It will be imperative to get that agreement right.

It will be guaranteed that the scheme will be local with applicants requiring a verified local connection authenticated by Councillors. The first lets will be 100% ours with the Housing Association having 25% thereafter. However the Housing Association do not use their 25% nomination rights as they do not hold the Register of people waiting to be housed and they would have to come to us to help. They would also be bound by the local connection section 106 agreement and they would not be allowed to let the vacant home to anyone who did not fulfill the local connection rule in the agreement. The safeguard also is that the demand/need for this housing always outstrips the supply.

The location of the site and the size of the development will always be controversial as by their very nature exception sites are outside the normal village development boundary. However the Rural Exception Site policy is in statute and has been in operation for some 15 years but can only be implemented where there is a proven demand and local community support.

For the scheme to progress the Parish Council will need to be satisfied there is a proven and established local need and after their consultation with the Village the proposed number and type of affordable housing is viable and that the nomination process absolutely guarantees the local and ongoing local occupation of these dwellings.

PETT W.I. ~ Heather Godwin

Last month the Pett WI discuss the Resolutions which our representative would, on our behalf, vote for at the NFWI AGM in Liverpool. The members gave Secretary Ellen Catt, their views on the closure of local libraries and the introduction of mega farms and left it to her discretion to vote on these issues.

At the AGM, according to the Chair of the NFWI's blog: "after much discussion and insight from expert speakers, no vote was taken on the issue of granting planning permission for large-scale factory farms. This means that the WI has no mandate on which to act so there will not be a campaign. What it does mean is that the whole area of factory farming, mega farms, environment and animal welfare. not to mention future food security. is now on the nation's agenda. The membership, represented by 4,587 individual members at the AGM in the Liverpool Echo Arena, clearly saw that this is a subject that needs further discussion and wider debate." The vote to save local libraries was passed with a 97% majority.

Closer to home the Group meeting, held in June at Pett Village Hall had, as their speaker, Joy Funnell, who showed members from Pett and St Helen's WI in Hastings, and guests from the newly-formed



newly-formed evening WI in Ore Village, how to make beautiful jewelry.

The speaker for the monthly meeting in June was from Raystede Centre for Animal Welfare in Ringmer, near Lewes. The centre. founded 60 years ago, aims to prevent and relieve cruelty to animals and protect them from unnecessary suffering. Over 1500 unwanted and abandoned animals arrive at the centre annually. Dogs. cats and other companion animals are found new caring homes while others remain in Raystede's care for the rest of their days. There are at present over 1000 animals enjoying a happy and peaceful life at the centre. These include horses. donkeys, goats, sheep, rabbits, chipmunks, tortoises, terrapins, many different exotic birds and there is also a wildfowl sanctuary with several lakes for ducks, geese and moorhens. The Raystede Centre is a charity and relies totally on voluntary support.

The next meeting is on Friday July 15th at 2.30pm when Sue Hollings will be talking on "My Life as a Couture Dressmaker".

If you have not tried the WI do come along for an interesting afternoon and a delicious tea.

DO YOU KNOW ? ~ John Taylor

Do you know about the Royal Navy Tot of Rum?

Being an ex Navy man, I have very happy memories

partaking my daily ration of rum during my time in the

senior service. But why was rum issued? Where did

the tradition originate and why has the Navy given up

the 'tot'?

Originally sailors in the Royal Navy were given beer to drink as it was difficult to keep water fresh for drinking on board

ships. In the seventeenth century the quality of the beer served on ships was referred to by one captain as 'stinking' and in 1655, after the British fleet captured the island of Jamaica the daily ration of liquor given to seamen was changed from French brandy to

rum. This had been produced in the Caribbean for some time.

Prior to 1740, rum was issued to the men neat, that is without water. They received 1/2-pint twice daily! Admiral Vernon, the hero of Portobello and the Commander-in-Chief, West Indies Station was very much concerned with what he called the swinish vice of drunkenness which he believed was caused by the men drinking their daily allowance of rum neat. He believed that if the same amount of rum was mixed with water, and then consumed that it would reduce drunkenness and discipline problems for which the punishment could be brutal. Thus he issued his infamous 'Order to Captains No. 349" on August 21, 1740. His order stated that the daily allowance of rum "be every day mixed with the proportion of a quart of water to a half pint of rum, to be mixed in a scuttled butt kept for that purpose, and to be done upon the deck, and in the presence of the

Lieutenant of the Watch who is to take particular care to see that the men are not defrauded in having their full allowance of rum.... and let those that are good husband men receive extra lime juice and sugar that it be made more palalable to them."

The sailors nicknamed Admiral Vernon "Old Grog" from the grogram cloak he often wore on the quarter deck. The watered rum gave great offence to the men and soon they referred to it as 'Grog', and this term was still being used until the daily ration ceased. The ration —

or 'tot' - was later increased to two parts of water and one part of rum, and in 1756 the daily ration increased to one pint a day per man. You can quess the result In 1824, concerned at habitual the drunkenness in the fleet Admiral Lord Keith

reduced the issue to one gill (one eighth of a pint), again to which were added two parts of water. This was issued to every member of the ship's company who were "over 20 years of age and who were not temperant". The "scuttle butt" in Vernon's order eventually became the "Grog Tub" from which the daily grog was issued. Petty Officers received their rum 'neat' directly from the Spirit Room at 1100 hours daily when the bosun piped "Up Spirits" to herald the event. The issue to the rest of the sailors followed one hour later.

Then, on the 31st July 1970 the last issue of rum to naval personnel was made. This sad day was celebrated with mock funerals and the wearing of black armbands and is now known universally as "Black Tot Day". The Admiralty Board, in their wisdom, decreed in 1970 that there was no place in a modern navy for the daily issue of rum. So ended one of the longest and unbroken traditions in

seafaring history and all round the world on that day in July glasses were raised in the final salute, "The Queen". Many a strong man shed a tear at the passing.

One final story about rum. After the Battle of Trafalgar, Horatio Nelson's body was preserved in a cask of rum to allow it to be transported back to England. However, when arriving home it was found to be empty when opened. The pickled body was removed and on inspection it was discovered that the sailors had drilled a hole in the bottom of the cask and drunk all the rum. This gave rise to the term "Nelson's Blood".

Mind you there are other versions of the story, but the one here makes it more interesting.

Toenail cutting is not something that springs readily to mind as a volunteering opportunity. However, our volunteers find it really rewarding for a number of reasons including:

- Acquiring a new skill
- · Further developing the skills they already have
- · They are volunteering for something "different" can be quite a "talking point"
- · Gets them involved in their community
- Providing valuable help and support to local people
- · They meet and make new friends, both clients and other volunteers

All new volunteers are given a course of instruction in the art of simple nail cutting by the county Primary Care Trusts podiatry departments, and are supported by AgeUK in their volunteering, with regular social events taking place.

On the 7th July we will be screening The Social Network which was written by Aaron Sorkin and directed by David Fincher.

This breathless picture is a fast and witty creation myth about how Facebook grew from Zuckerberg's insecure geek-at-Harvard days into a phenomenon with 500 million users. Sorkin frames the movie around two lawsuits aimed at the lofty but brilliant Zuckerberg (deftly played by Adventureland's Jesse Eisenberg): a claim that he stole the idea from lvy League classmates, and a suit by his original, now slighted, business partner (Andrew Garfield).

The movie follows a familiar rise-and-fall pattern, with temptation in the form of a sunny California Beelzebub (an expert Justin Timberlake as former Napster founder Sean Parker) and an increasingly tangled legal mess. Fincher's command of pacing and his eye for the clean spaces of Aughts-era America are bracing, and he can't resist the technical trickery involved in turning actor Armie Hammer into privileged Harvard twins (Hammer is letter-perfect). Even with its flaws, *The Social Network* is a galloping piece of entertainment, a smart ride with smart people... who sometimes do dumb things.

Unfortunately we will not be holding a film show during the month of August because traditionally previous audience numbers for August have been low. Faced with the continual rise in our costs, we cannot afford to risk making a loss even on one film show. It may be worth mentioning that on average the cost of hiring the film and hall is about £140 per showing and with the entrance fee being £4.00 / £4.50 per person we must have an expectation of at least 32 folks attending.

Sowing the Seeds of a Life-long Passion By Mike Russell, Sussex Wildlife Trust ~ www.sussexwt.org.uk



When one gets to a stage in life when there is more of your life behind you than there is in front, there can be a tendency to get a bit reflective, thinking back on how things were when you were young and for some of us at the Trust, how we became interested in wildlife.

Being brought up in South London, although it was strictly Kent when I was young, you would have thought there was not much wildlife around to take your interest, but my formative years were full of encounters with birds, insects and flowers that were the spark for me, though I probably didn't realise it at the time.

I do distinctly remember my interest in birds was initiated by two incongruous and unrelated factors - tea and mumps! In the 1950s a certain brand of tea that relied heavily on primates for its advertising contained some wonderful cards of birds illustrated by Charles Tunnicliffe for which you could buy an album, and I lovingly collected and pasted them in, all the time encouraging my mum and dad to drink copious amounts of tea. A regal peregrine falcon sitting on the edge of a cliff surrounded by wisps of thrift stands out in the memory, along with the red-billed chough, an exotic crow that I never had any expectations of seeing.

Sadly. I lost the album but a couple of years ago, a guardian angel in the name of Amanda Solomon, the Trust Publicity Manager, found an album of the original series in a book sale and presented me with it. My heart rose to the height of a singing skylark! The mumps link is that when I was stricken with this old-fashioned childhood disease my mum gave me a copy of the Observer's Book of Birds, first edition, which kept me quiet for hours, well that and copious amounts of Lucozade. These are both still easy to get hold of and again this beautiful book and many others in the same series were an inspiration to many 50s children.

Although we lived no more than 12 miles from the centre of London we had a large, fairly wild garden and a very vivid memory for me was my brother and I collecting stag beetles, 25 I seem to remember we had at one time, and then proceeded to have gladiatorial battles with the heavily antiered males, something which we frown at now. But we did learn a lot about them while doing this. It was a great joy to find out that, on moving to Henfield, there was a good population of these wonderful insects. Another beetle we used to collect avidly and put in tanks was a devil's coach horse, a long, thin beetle that when annoyed would curl its back and emit a nasty smell - obviously something that would amuse a little boy.

Later in life I discovered the joys of 'The Antiquities and Natural History of Selbourne' by Gilbert White, first published in 1798, a man regarded by all conservationists, ecologists and wildlife enthusiasts as the father of natural history. His observations on the natural world around Selbourne are a sheer delight and the advancement of knowledge from those observations set the standard for wildlife recording that is still in practice today. It may sound ridiculous today, but in Gilbert White's time there was a strong belief that birds such as swifts, swallows and house martins hibernated during the winter at the bottom of a pond, due to their habit of flying low over water in the autumn picking up low flying insects in preparation for migration. He dispelled this theory as well as sowing the idea of migration.

Books have always been a source of inspiration in any field and whatever your interest you can usually trace it back to something you read as a child. Perhaps nowadays there are other forms of media that take their place, but no less inspirational for that, but for a generation past, coming into possession of a book or album that can lead to a life-long passion is one of the greatest gifts a child can be given.
