Smoked Haddock Chowder

- · 3 leeks, sliced
- 1 onion, sliced
- butter
- 3 medium potatoes, diced
- 400ml milk
- vegetable stock, fresh, cubes or concentrate, made up to 400ml
- 500g skinless smoked haddock, cut into bite sized pieces
- 200g cooked, peeled prawns
- · 1 small bunch parsley, roughly chopped



Cook the leek and onion in a large pot with a knob of butter for about 5 minutes until they start to soften. Add the potatoes, milk and vegetable stock. Bring to the boil then reduce to a simmer, cover and cook gently for about 10-15 minutes or until the potatoes are tender.

Drop in the haddock and prawns and simmer for a further 2-3 minutes to cook the haddock and heat the prawns. Season, add the chopped parsley and serve with crusty bread.

We're sad to say good-bye to the older children who leave us to start school in


September, but hope that lots of new children will be coming along to take their places.

DO YOU KNOW ? ~ John Taylor

Do you know about the legend of the Brede Giant? Goddard Oxenbridge was born about 1478. He was the son of Sir Robert Oxenbridge the owner of a property then known

as Forde, that was later known as Brede Place. Goddard was reputed to have been seven feet tall and very strong. He was created a knight by Henry VIII in 1509, was a devout man and a benefactor of the Church; yet the story about the Ogre of Brede has persisted for 400 years.



The legend is believed to have originated after several children went missing from the village. Sir Goddard was said to be a giant cannibal with superhuman strength and mystical powers who could not be slain by ordinary weapons. He had crow as a familiar and roamed around the countryside eating children. Due to his wealth and power plus his gifts to the church the people of Brede didn't believe the stories that were circulating

in the area. Eventually all the children of Sussex got together (or just the children of his neighbours, depending which story you hear) and got him drunk on an enormous vat of beer. Then they took their revenge and sawed him in half with a wooden saw on a bridge called Groaning Bridge in Stubbs Lane. One story has it that the children of East Sussex were on one end of the wooden saw and those from West Sussex on the other end.

The stories about the Sussex Ogre or the Brede Giant continued to grow. One reason was that, at the time of Henry VIII, Goddard Oxenbridge was Catholic while most of Sussex supported the Reformation. A good way of 'getting at the Popery' was to make up malicious stories about them. Later the tale was added to by smugglers who were known to have used Brede Place to hide their cargo. So they told stories about the ghost of the Brede Giant appearing to folk in the locality of Brede Place, the Groaning Bridge and the Church. There are still some who remain convinced that Goddard still walks within the walls of Brede Place.

However, the fact remains that Sir Goddard Oxenbridge died in 1531 and his tomb lies in St. George's Church Brede. His daughter Elizabeth married well and also had close links with the Royal family. She was Lady in

Waiting to Queen Catherine Parr and later to

Princess Elizabeth.

It is strange that this mythical story about a very good and honest man has survived as a cautionary tale to children for several centuries. Yet they do say, over in Brede, that the childeating ogre's ghost, in the form of a sawn tree trunk, still haunts Brede Park and the nearby Groaning Bridge.

Being a birdy sort of person, I'm often asked what my favourite bird is and, being a birdy sort of person, that's impossible to answer: I like them all. Nevertheless there is one family of birds in the UK I have an extra soft spot for and they are woodpeckers, two of which are doing well, one disastrously declining and the other, a former breeding species, now relegated to a very scarce migrant.

The ones you are more likely to encounter, as they are increasingly seen in gardens, are the great spotted and green woodpeckers. The good thing about both these species is that they are striking in appearance so given a good view they are not too difficult to identify.

Great spotted woodpeckers are indeed great: they are strikingly bold, they like to be seen and they often come into gardens to feed on peanuts and you might be lucky enough to have the adults bring their youngsters to your feeding station. They are a woodland species, one of the only ones that are doing well at the moment, and are perfectly adapted to that environment.

About the size of a blackbird, great spotted woodpeckers have built-in features that help them thrive in their woodland habitat. Many years ago while I was taking a school party around Woods Mill at Smalldole we were lucky enough to see a great spotted woodpecker 'drumming' at the top of a dead tree. 'Drumming' is the term used for the rapid beating of their beak against the tree, up to 14 beats per second, which acts as their song to try and entice a mate. One of the children asked the perfectly question reasonable 'Does woodpecker ever get a headache?' to which the answer is no. They have a specially adapted muscle in their head which acts as a shock absorber; otherwise they would forever be reaching for the aspirin! Other adaptations include a very long, sticky, prehensile tongue used to search for grubs and other insects in crevices in the trees which, when not in use, they keep rolled up and

tucked away behind their brain. Unlike other birds, these woodpeckers have

two claws pointing forward and two backwards to give them extra leverage when drumming while clinging to the side of a tree. One last special quality is that their short tail feathers are much stiffer than other birds, again helping them to be more stable when drumming. Just brilliant birds!

Many of you will remember from your childhood, or watching with your children, a programme called 'Bagpuss' in which there was a character called Professor Yaffle who was based on a green woodpecker. 'Yaffle' is an old country name for this bird on account of its laughter-like call. Green woodpeckers prefer woodland edges and open areas and are likely to be seen on your lawn feeding on the ground where they will be searching for ants. Bigger than great spotted woodpeckers, their bright green plumage with flashes of yellow makes them an exotic looking bird and they do seem to becoming more comfortable in a semi-urban environment.

the lesser Sadly. spotted woodpecker is, in terms of numbers, going in the opposite direction to its larger cousin. Even more strikingly marked than the great spotted, this is a much smaller bird, not much bigger than a sparrow. It too is a bird of the woodlands, behaves in a similar way but for reasons not yet fully understood they are not doing well at all. There is some thought that the great spotted woodpeckers might be out competing the smaller birds for the diminishing habitat and nesting sites. Whatever the reason, they are now a rare sight in Sussex.

Finally we come to the wryneck, a really strange bird that is a woodpecker but looks nothing like one. It used to be a common breeding species in England but declined throughout the 20th century to the extent that it disappeared about 40 years ago and now turns up occasionally as a migrant on its way to northern

Europe where it still breeds. The size of a starling, this strange bird gets its name from the habit of moving its head slowly around to an almost alarming radius. Unlike the other three that are residents, it spends the winter in Africa but can turn up here if blown off course during its epic journey.

There you have it, four wonderful birds experiencing very mixed fortunes in this changing world. Keep a look out in your garden and local patch as if the great spotted or green woodpeckers are around, they are likely to make their presence known.



Turning now to our next three month programme, we have great pleasure in showing The Ghost on September 1st This film is based on a novel by Robert Harris who also wrote the screenplay, concerns a public figure accused of being a war criminal, much of whose time is spent bunkered in a chalet working on an autobiography that he hopes will salvage what's left of his reputation.

The Ghost is a brooding thriller whose moods – a black spectrum ranging from cynical and conspiratorial to powerless and despairing – have come to dominate contemporary political drama. **Ewan McGregor** plays an unnamed ghostwriter who bags himself a commission to complete the memoirs of former PM Adam Lang (**Pierce Brosnan**), currently in freefall after being accused of giving the CIA free rein to kidnap and torture four Pakistani terror suspects.

Lang's wife Ruth is played by Olivia Williams. The latter, said to be styled after if not exactly modeled on Cherie Blair, staggers and seethes with the weary bitterness of an alcoholic who's exhausted her last bottle of the night. Her hold on power is slipping. What next? It's a question the ghost keeps asking, too. The memoir is full of holes and inconsistencies. He finds strange photographs. A potential source, a professor played with characteristically cruel avuncularity by Tom Wilkinson, proves to have his own dark agenda.

On 6 October we will be showing The Adjustment Bureau (12), a film written for the screen and directed by George Nolfi (writer of Ocean's Twelve, co-writer of The Bourne Ultimatum). It is based on a short story by Philip K. Dick (Total Recall, Minority Report and Blade Runner).

On the brink of winning a seat in the U.S. Senate, ambitious politician David Norris (Matt Damon) meets beautiful contemporary ballet dancer Elise Sellas (Emily Blunt) - a woman like none he's ever known. But just as he realizes he's falling for her, mysterious men conspire to keep the two apart. David learns he is up against the agents of Fate itself—the men of The Adjustment Bureau—who will do everything in their considerable power to prevent David and Elise from being together. In the face of overwhelming odds, he must either let her go and accept a predetermined path...or risk everything to defy Fate and be with her.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT ~ Clir Robin Patten

Following on from my last month's report progress continues to be made with the Council's resetting programme. Currently the following areas of business are being scrutinised as priority targets for savings/additional income.

The Grounds Maintenance contract will be amalgamated with Hastings Borough Council who will manage the total contract on our behalf. The new contract will be performance based and Rother are looking to achieve savings of £200,000, mainly by looking carefully at where we can reduce the contract specification. The start date of the new contract will be October 2012.

Car Park operations are being reviewed, and with pricing and enforcement, income is to be increased by a further £60,000 per annum.

By March 2012 Rother will remove all their administration and costs of Allotment provision by transferring their management to Allotment Societies or devolve them to Town or Parish Councils for them to manage on their own behalf. This will find savings of some £40,000.

By relocating the offices and archive centre from Beeching Road to the Town Hall it will be possible to sell or let the property. Negotiations are currently at an advanced stage with a potential user and savings of £50,000 are expected.

We have also agreed formally with Wealden DC to look at areas where both Councils can work together to improve services and reduce costs. So far discussions are well advanced with Internal Audit, Legal and Environmental Health with a view to operating a shared service between the two Councils.

Finally I would like to return to the ongoing debate about our possible Exception site. There have been several allegations ranging from Rother will pull the plug because they cannot afford it to Rother have already made up their mind to push the scheme through regardless of local opinions. Needless to say neither of these statements is remotely true.

The position remains entirely as before. The decision to go ahead rests with our Parish Council. If, after their full consultation with the village, using the process which they have outlined, they decide against the scheme it will not go ahead; if they decide in favour, having taken into account all the caveats, Rother will give total support to their decision and the scheme and its implementation.

A Message from your local Community Safety Partnership

Cold Callers and Roque Traders ...

We need your help. We are concerned about regue-traders and cold callers touting for home improvement business, such as roof

repairs, tarmacing and gardening, in your local area. During the past month East Sussex County Council Trading Standards and Sussex Police have received several complaints from people who have dealt with reofers and termacers calling at their door, uninvited, in some cases residents, like your self, have paid large sums of money over for shoddy, substandard and over priced work.

East Sussex County Council Senior Trading Standards Officer, Roger Cohen has said; "The Police and Local Authority are working closely together to target these individuals and would ask all residents to follow the simple steps below and report any suspicious people in their area".

DO take your time when you hear someone at the door - a genuine caller will wait, and this gives you opportunity to look and see who is there, using a door viewer or a window.

DO fit and use a security chain every time you open the door.

DO always ask for identification, that you can verify by ringing his/ her employer. Use the telephone number from your local telephone book. It is not a good idea to ring the telephone number the caller gives you, as this may not be a genuine number!

DO keep a list of numbers of your credit cards and important documents in case of

DO consult with the East Sussex County Council 'Buy with Confidence' Scheme when you want any trade work done.

Do NOT let the caller into your house until you have verified identification.

Do NOT agree for anyone to carry out work in your house until you get a second opinion as to whether you actually need the work done.

Do NOT agree to any work where the caller says We are only in the area today".

Do NOT keep large sums of money in the house and keep purses out of sight, not near the door.

If you are considering having home improvement works done, East Sussex Trading Standards Service can provide a directory of

approved businesses, with over 270 members, reviewed weakly, covering a diverse range of trades, from home improvements through to professional services

Rother Neighbourhood Police Inspector James Scott says; "If you look after someone who is elderly or vulnerable, or have neighbours that are elderly or vulnerable please could we ask you to do all you can to reinforce those messages. We would ask that everyone is vigilant and contacts the Police at the time if they have suspicious callors at their address, or see any suspicious people in their neighbourhoods."
