We set off on a tour of the many areas in the garden from the extensive vegetable plot to flower borders with details of the planned meadow and spring bulb planting being explained by William and Tara. This enabled us to appreciate just how much the garden has developed over the last few years. All the planting is looking very well established and now looks as though it has been in place for many years. As the wind was rather chilly this was all followed by some nibbles and liquid refreshment with a chance for everyone to share their thoughts and admiration of the garden.



Pett Exception Site Project ~ Reported by Mary Saint

Around 65 people came to the Public Meeting held on September 8 to consult further on the Exception Site Project. The meeting was chaired by Councillor Mrs. Mary Varrall, Chairman of Etchingham Parish Council. After a short presentation by Tom Warder, Action in Rural Sussex and a few words from Pett Parish Council Chairman, Andrew Duniop, the meeting was then opened for questions.

There were several on whether the initial development of 9 dwellings would be expanded. Jane Gallifent, Hastoe Housing, explained that this would be highly unlikely and could only be done at the instigation of the Parish Council and the community.

There were concerns expressed about the fact that tenants would have full succession rights, particularly as this was an area that the government was

currently looking at. Jane Gallifent said that Hastoe Housing did not agree that tenants should have to move if their circumstances significantly improved and confirmed that succession rights would be for tenants' dependants.

Of the 9 dwellings it was proposed that 7 would be rented and 2 would be available for shared ownership. Tenants would start off with a 30% equity stake, which could be increased in 5% increments to a maximum of 80%, although this was extremely rare.

Questions were asked about the safeguards in place to ensure that when such a property was offered for sale, the purchaser met the selection criteria for affordable housing. Jane Gallifent stated that there would be a restricted covenant on the land and if there was no one in Pett to buy the property, it would be offered to neighbouring parishes cascaded further afield necessary. All purchasers would have to work through the housing association. In the event that the property was left to someone in a will, Hastoe Housing would buy it back if it was financially viable to do

There were a number of questions on tenant selection. Jane Gallifent confirmed that both living in the village or working in the village would constitute a local connection, although these would not be ranked and that the housing would be open to both employed people and those on benefits. Shared rental would be available and the housing would not be restricted to young people, it would

be open to all who met the selection criteria, whatever their age.

The issue of how much weight Rother District Council would give to the Parish Council's view was dealt with by Kieran O'Leary from RDC, who stated that if the Parish Council decided not to support the scheme, it would not happen. He also confirmed that RDC would only consider the specific site and that normal planning rules would apply to the rest of the Sawyers Field. In response to a direct question, Jane Gallifent and Tom Warder categorically denied that any undertaking had been given to the landowner about allowing private development on other green belt land in return for the sale of the exception site.

Kieran O'Leary addressed the matter of want versus need by saying that if people want to live in the village, have a local connection and are in housing need, then that justifies an exception site project.

Survey details: The survey will consist of a simple question and will have been delivered to every household in the parish by September 18. The forms have to be returned by October 10 and the results will be published in the November edition of Pett Parish News. The decision on whether to support the project will be taken by the Parish Council at the meeting on November 15.



Nature Notes ~ Avril Thurley

I have had more birds than ever on the feeders this summer, in spite of the on-going building work behind my cottage, now well into its second year. The only noticeable absentees so far are the starlings, though I don't expect to see any redwings or field fares this winter now that the little orchard has been grubbed out.

An unknown night time visitor took quite a lot of fruit from my greengage tree and broke a couple of small branches in the process. Who could it have been? Someone suggested rats (of the two-legged variety) but they could have stolen the fruit without breaking the branches. Any suggestions?

Reliable witnesses have reported seeina deer in Guestling Wood and also in Pannel Lane. One may have been a farmed deer from the Wetland Trust, but the other was a Roe Deer, which is a British native. They can jump almost any garden fence and have a reputation for doing a lot of damage in gardens. I wonder whether they greengages. Roe deer are certainly one of our most beautiful wild mammal species.

I nearly put my foot on an Elephant Hawk Moth caterpillar which was making its way across my grass. When I picked it up it lashed its head about most alarmingly, making it easy to see what a good defence strategy this is; any small predator might well

think better of tackling such a fearsome-looking creature.

If you survived experimenting with potassium cyanide last month, here is another suggestion from my little book of ancient wisdom, this time for 'The Spraying of Fruit Trees' "Dissolve half a pound of arsonate of lead in 10 gallons of water, and spray until the leaves are well covered." Yes, well.


SEASONAL CHEER ! ~ Ray Taylor

Technology Rules OK? ~ By Mike Russell www.sussexwt.org.uk

Struggling as I do with the overwhelming amount of e-mails I get, the sheer volume of information I think I need from the internet and the general vice-like grip that modern technology has over my life, I seek refuge outside whenever I can, clutching my binoculars and just looking at the real world. It is cathartic, calming and links me back to what is real. Just the other day I desperately needed a break from the screen so went out onto the nature reserve at Woods Mill when a familiar sound caught my ear. Sure enough, sitting on a low branch over the lake, was a kingfisher; how good was that!

Actually I think I'm probably over playing the hard done-by bit too much. I freely admit that I am in a very privileged position having access to a wonderful nature reserve and I do spend quite a bit of my time in wonderful places looking at wonderful wildlife. But you probably get the gist; technology plays a significant part in nearly all the work and leisure aspects of our lives. How much we embrace that is very much down to the individual.

Having given the impression that technology is the antithesis of wildlife, in reality it can and does contribute enormously to wildlife conservation. The range of equipment now readily available has stimulated a lot of interest in the natural world; people are now going out to look at wildlife and have new ways of finding out what they are looking at, and if they are still not sure then they can soon find someone who will know.

Digital cameras have made wildlife photographers out of everyone. You can take some excellent photographs now with even the most compact of cameras and you can very quickly upload the pictures to a specialist website, log onto the Open University ispot or, best of all, contact our WildCall Officer Jess Price who will

be happy to help you identify what you have seen.

You can download



apps for the new Smartphones to enhance your wildlife experience. Best of these has to be the ibat which enables you to identify the bat you are looking at by uploading the sounds to a website. Bats are extremely difficult to identify in flight, but now technology has made this possible. Sussex Wildlife Trust has now produced its own app for visitors to the Woods Mill nature reserve at Henfield— visit www.sussexwt.org.uk for download details.

In September last year, I wrote about how satellite tagging tracked a nightingale to its wintering grounds in West Africa and how that one bird delivered more information nightingale migration than all those previously given a leg ring. This year five cuckoos have been given satellite tags by the British Trust for Ornithology and I have just read that all five of them have made it to Africa. With the information received from the satellite we now know the route they take, where they stop to feed, how long it takes them and their final destination in Africa. All this information helps us to know what is needed to help conserve this fast declining species.

Technology has given a new stimulus to the amateur naturalist and is really just a new phase in what is a long and honourable tradition in the UK, an interest in and curiosity about the natural world. In the past we would have gone out with a shotgun then a net or more recently binoculars and an expensive camera. Now we can take a Smartphone. But the results are just the same - contact and often a thrilling experience with the natural world - something that never changes.

DO YOU KNOW? ~ John Taylor

Do you know about the plague here in the 14th century? In the early 1330s an outbreak of the bubonic plague occurred in China. By October 1837 Italian merchant ships carried the plague to Italy where it spread into Europe. By the summer of 1438 the plague reached England, where it was known as the Black Death because of black pustules forming on the skin. Within weeks people were dying in unprecedented numbers as the disease spread throughout the land.

The Black Death was a bacteria called *yernsina pestis* whose main carriers were fleas who had fed off dying bodies; the fleas lived on the black rat and humans and their effect was horrific. During the next five years, one third of the population of Europe was dead. The main spread of the disease was from the ports and in this part of Sussex the Cinque Ports were the main starting point

and the plague radiated out along the main trade routes. This was possibly due in part by fleas being trapped in bundles of cloth from the continent in addition to people carrying the fleas or the sickness. It is also likely that smugglers who were exporting wool (made illegal in the early 1300s by Edward 1) from the Romney marshes to Europe brought the plague back with them from one of their expeditions. It did not matter whether you were a lord or a peasant, a cleric or a soldier, a man,

woman or child – the plague struck everywhere and many of those who died were cast into communal graves "from which arose such a stench that it was barely possible to go past a churchyard". It was reckoned that over England as a whole one fifth of men, women and children were "carried to the grave".

A number of the local villages in this area have their churches some distance from the village centres. This is believed to be caused by the survivors not wanting to live near the burial places of so many plague victims. Beckley, Sandhurst, Peasmarsh, Westfield

and, of course, Guestling are thought to be in this category. Names of some roads in the area, such as Deadman's Lane, are also believed to be originally where plague victims were buried. Later these areas were used to bury the dead from raids by the French during the Hundred years War.

The Black Death was seasonal and seemed to disappear in the winter. This was felt to be due to the fleas lying dormant and then emerging with the warmer spring weather. Some people were naturally immune to the disease and as time went by resistance to it grew. However it was believed that the spring re-emergence of the plague was due in part by the poor diet many folk had to endure during harsh winters. The five years from 1348 to 1353 were the worst, and then the outbreaks of the disease grew less. The Black Death did not release its grip on England and returned regularly, first in 1361 and then in the 1370s and 1380s as an increasingly urban disease. It reappeared right through until the Great Plague of 1665 in London. But by around 1670 it disappeared from England for over two centuries until a number of outbreaks occurred either side of 1900. It was not until these modern outbreaks that the bacillus was identified and the connection between fleas, rats and plague was discovered. The best mean of defence against the Black Death in the 1300s was to run away from it – and that was not easy.

Though Guestling certainly has association with the Black Death, Fairlight and Pett have no records about it and that is probably because these two villages were so very rural in the 14th century with much of the surrounding area being woodland. If the earth in this locality could talk to us there would be some very sad tales of the Black Death causing suffering to families in this small area of the land.

Sweetcorn fritters with smoked salmon and avocado salsa

READY IN 25-35 MINUTES SERVES 4-6 (Easy)

140g/5oz self-raising flour

¼ tsp paprika

1 tbsp sugar

2 eggs

125ml/4fl oz milk

175g/6oz fresh sweetcorn kernels (cut from 2 corn-on-the-cobs), or a 326g

can sweetcorn, drained

3 spring onions, sliced

large handful each chopped coriander and parsley

4 tbsp vegetable oil

FOR THE AVOCADO SALSA

2 avocados, halved, stoned and peeled, cut into large chunks small handful coriander leaves juice 1 lime

TO SERVE

200g/8oz smoked salmon slices large bunch watercress, washed

1 Mix the flour, paprika and a pinch of salt in a large bowl, stir in the sugar and make a well in the centre. In a separate bowl, mix together the eggs and milk. Gradually whisk the egg mixture into the dry ingredients until you have a smooth, lump-free batter, which will be quite stiff.

2 Mix all the ingredients for the salsa in a bowl with a little salt and pepper

and put to one side.

3 Mix the corn, spring onions and herbs into the batter. Heat 2 tbsp vegetable oil in a non-stick frying pan over a medium high heat and drop in 1 tbsp of batter per fritter. Cook four fritters at a time for 2 minutes on each side, or until golden. Keep warm on a plate while cooking the remaining fritters in the rest of the oil.

4 Serve 2-3 fritters for each person, top with the smoked salmon, watercress and the Avocado salsa.

District Councillor's Report ~ Clir: Robin Patten

Council's Rother District Community Grant Scheme does as its title suggests and has been created to support the development of community facilities. Applications to the scheme are welcomed for capital rather than revenue projects from properly constituted organisations serving their community. These should show that there is substantial local support for the particular project and that it is sustainable, that it may be in the local Action Plan and that significant funding has or will be obtained from other sources including the Parish Council.

Despite the current pressure budgets the Council determined that this budget would not be cut and currently there is some £159,000 available. The method of assessment is by a Grants Panel made up Councillors. Officers and representatives from RALC and the RVA that meets twice a year to consider the applications that have been made and recommend to Cabinet the amounts to be awarded.

Cabinet has just decided on recommendations in Round 1 and it is with considerable pleasure I can report that all three Parishes in the Marsham Ward, Pett, Fairlight and Guestling. made successful applications. With regards to the Pett Parish, the Pett Level Rescue Association has been Boat awarded £5000 for the extension of their existing Rescue Boathouse. This decision was influenced by their contribution to the local

community and their involvement with younger people together with the extensive and successful fund raising already carried out by the organisation. It is hoped that the Parish Council will also make a significant contribution to this scheme when they consider their 2012 budget.

The Cabinet also agreed to allocate £20,000 from this year's Community Grants Scheme to be ring fenced for grants to be made as part of commemorative celebrations for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. These grants will be offered to community groups, Parish Councils or groups set up to organise Jubilee events within the District.

Finally, and on a completely different matter, may I recommend that you to visit the De la Warr Pavilion to see the Andy Warhol exhibition. Whether one approves of modern art or not it is the real and exceptional opportunity to see for oneself and at first hand original work done by an iconic 21st century artist. The exhibition opened on 27st September and will close on the 26th February 2012.
