Crab & asparagus salad with real salad cream

10 asparagus spears FOR THE SALAD DRESSING

100g broad beans

1 large egg

100g crabmeat

2 tsp Dijon mustard

11/2 tsp caster sugar

1 tbsp lemon juice

1 tbsp virgin olive oil

3 tbsp double cream or crème fraiche

Boil the asparagus and beans in salted water for 2 mins, drain well, then cool quickly under cold running water. Slip the outer skins from the beans.

For the salad cream, put the egg into a pan of boiling water, then boil for 5 mins. Cool quickly under running water, then peel. Cut the egg carefully in half, then scoop the yolk into a bowl. Whisk in the mustard, sugar, lemon juice and seasoning. Whisk in the oil and cream.

Arrange the watercress, asparagus and beans over two plates. Pile the crab in the centre, then drizzle with the dressing. Serve with fresh brown bread.



DO YOU KNOW? ~ John Taylor

Do you know about our Marsh Frog. If you walk down Pett Road on a Spring or early Summer evening near the Roundels you can hear a noise that sounds very much like ducks quacking. Sometimes this can be quite loud, but it is not any kind of bird – it is the serenading of the Marsh Frog. In 1935 the wife of Edward Percy Smith, MP for Ashford and playwright, wanted to

surprise him with some edible French frogs to put in their garden pond.

Unfortunately edible frogs were unavailable so she bought some large Hungarian frogs (Rana Ridibunda) instead. Mr Smith was very pleased. The frogs thrived, bred and then escaped from their garden pond in Stone-in-Oxney and spread across the ditches of the Marsh with much success; colonising the entire Romney Marsh area by the 1960s. By 2007 the most northerly colonies were at



Humberside. They are becoming widespread and many can be found in Surrey. On Pett Level the Pett Pools (particularly the Scrape) are a good breeding place and they have spread up into the village and can be seen – and heard – at the Roundels. Marsh Frogs are the largest frogs in Europe and can be found from central Europe and the Balkan Peninsula to East and Central Asia.. It is not well suited to cooler climes but as the global climate warms it may well extend its range.

Female Marsh Frogs grow up to 17cm in length and the males are smaller – about 12cm. There is a large variation of colour and pattern ranging from dark green to brown or grey. Large dorsal spots vary considerably in size, number and pattern. They hibernate from September/October to the spring; sometimes in the mud at the bottom of a pond or in rodent burrows, even holes in river banks. Occasionally they remain active in winter. Usually gregarious, very active at night and frequently found some distance from water.

Breeding starts soon after the frog's spring appearance. After mating the female may produce up to 16,000 eggs. The tadpoles hatch after about a week and are quite large (up to 185mm). They turn into frogs in the next spring. The diet of the Marsh Frog varies and they are voracious, eating almost anything. They eat mainly dragonflies and other insects, spiders, earthworms and slugs but will also eat small fish, other amphibians, small reptiles and even small birds and rodents. They have been known to be cannibalistic and it has been said that 'if it will fit in its mouth it will eat it'.

At night, especially in the month of May, the raucous croaking of the Marsh Frogs can fill the evening air. The sound can be eerie and very repetitive and travels some distance – as much as a half a mile. When calling they inflate vocal sacs on either side of the head. The calls are most prevalent during the mating season and the courting antics are very entertaining. They move with surprising speed over surface weed on the water seeming to change colour as they move from light to shade.



Being larger the Marsh Frog will devour the tadpoles of Common Frog at every opportunity and can be the cause of a reduction in the local population. However, if you want to see one of these 'frog monsters' be very careful as you will have to creep up stealthilly to catch sight of one as they are quick to sense the presence of people and all you will notice is the 'plop' sound it makes as it dives into the water.



The Sky is Buzzing ~ Mike Russell

Right, it's time for a good news wildlife story; buzzards are back in Sussex and if you spend a morning or afternoon out and about in the county there is a good chance that you will see one or more. Quite often it is their cat-like 'mewing' that catches your attention, so cast your eyes to the skies and you may seem some dark bird-shaped silhouettes circling high above your head and if you do, then they might be buzzards.

On my arrival in Sussex 27 years ago, common buzzards were a rare sight, with just a handful breeding in the country, but since then they have spread and now can be found right across Sussex in numbers that are now close to 300. So what has precipitated this rise in population? For much of the last two centuries buzzards were persecuted landowners, as were most birds with a hooked beak and talons and were virtually shot out of existence in much of the UK. They survived in the western and northern areas of Britain where agriculture was less intensive and in the wilder uplands.

Throughout the 20th century game keeping declined, though it wasn't until the past few decades that buzzard numbers began to recover nationwide. One main reason was that they became a protected species, though sadly some still are killed illegally, but there was also a recovery in the rabbit population, their main source of food, following the devastation caused by myxomatosis in the 1950s.

In spring, the population becomes more mobile as they look to re-establish their breeding territories and last year's youngsters have to move away and find their own range and mate. They take advantage of the warming up of the air which creates thermals on which they 'hitch a ride' with their wings outstretched and slightly tilted upwards.

sometimes reaching heights that are too high for us to see them. This way they can cover huge distances with very little effort.

Sussex

Towards the end of March there was almost a competition to see who had the biggest count of these thermals of circling buzzards; we had nine at one time over Woods Mill, but this was eclipsed many times by people seeing numbers in double figures, and while on the Downs above Arundel someone reported seeing over 20 altogether. Sometimes they will be joined by other birds of prey that also take advantage of these thermals. Our Woods Mill circle was joined by a peregrine falcon for a while and quite often sparrowhawks will join in the fun.

Increasingly in Sussex you can now see red kites flying with the buzzards, another conservation success story, so it becomes a challenge to identify these dark silhouettes. Kites are generally bigger with longer wings and they have a forked tail which quite often, though not always, is the critical identification factor.

Rather depressingly, there are a tiny minority of voices bemoaning the number of buzzards and are calling for their removal from the protected list of birds, but the overwhelming view of many, and not just birdwatchers, are delighted that we now live in a society that celebrates the fact that these magnificent birds are now back in our Sussex skies.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK May 13-19th

Two weeks ago I attended a fund raising event for Christian Aid and was inspired by the stories of one of the Christian Aid workers. David had recently visited Sierra Leone and told me of the things he had seen. It took 8 hours for them to travel to the area of Ghap and this was only 60 miles from the airport. Sierra Leone has only one reasonably good tarmac road, the rest are mud, and as the country is rain forest and therefore very wet the sand roads are in a very poor state of repair. Ghap is an area in the South West of Sierra Leone and is one of the poorest areas in one of the poorest countries in the world. David described the difficult lives that women lead and how Christian Aid is helping to improve them. These, as always with Christian Aid, hinge on enabling people to become more self sufficient. Co-operative working makes a huge difference and encouragement to share land and work the crops together produces a much higher yield. This not only feeds the local families better, but allows extra to be sold at market to help pay for school fees for the children of the villages. Recently a new hut was constructed to be used both as a school and a church as the existing one had collapsed. Women are now involved in the decision making of the village and the whole community is working together.

The other area of co-operative work was in fishing. David showed us pictures of the small dug-out canoes that the men had previously used. These only held 2 men and could not go far out into deep water. One simple fishing boat has been provided and the fishermen can now work in deeper water and with nets and this produces far greater yields. The women prepare, salt and dry the fish and this lasts them much longer. These small changes make a huge difference to people who want the basics for their families – freedom from starvation, education for the children and medical care for all.

Please be a part of Christian Aid Week this year: if, together, we take small actions we can give people the tools to make big change happen.



Nature Notes ~ Avril Thurley

While working at the allotment early one morning I was entertained by a pair of squirrels who were using my raised beds and fruit cage as an adventure playground. They appeared to be playing "IT", and kept appearing round the corners of the beds, the wooden edges being just the right height for hide-and-seek. Yes, I know they are undesirable aliens, a pest damagingly species, and destructive but they are also engagingly attractive little creatures. I have various squirrel-proof bird feeders, but I always leave at least one feeder accessible to them.

Every season has its special delights, and perhaps early spring is the most heart-lifting. I love to see the tiny new buds on the hedges and trees, and the little green shoots of perennials popping up through the bare earth. If you see me wandering round my garden apparently talking to myself, I am probably offering praise and encouragement to these little green sparks of life. (I also shout at the radio when some politician says something more than usually stupid!).

As I write there is a pesky collared dove perched on the telephone cable outside my window saying "Raphael is Dead!" over and over again. I wish he would take himself off to the funeral;. Oddly enough the woodpigeon's repetitive "You too Daddy" doesn't bother me at all, perhaps because it is not so mournful. The woodpigeon often takes a bath in my stone birdbath, but the other day he was sitting in it fast asleep.

Keep an eve on the bank opposite the Methodist Church which will be awash with spotted orchids in May. If you have a steeply sloping bank outside your house it would be worthwhile leaving it uncut in spring - there used to be green-winged orchids right through Pett. It is a waste of time trying to encourage wildflowers on flat grass verges as they will assuredly be destroyed by having cars parked on them.

District Councillor's Report ~ Robin Patter

You will have seen in the Budget announcements that provisional approval has been given for the building of the Link Road. This approval is provisional as it is pending on the decision on the CPO (compulsory purchase order) which is expected in the next 3 to 4 weeks. Assuming the decision on the CPO is affirmative there is then a 6 week period allowed for legal challenges but only entertained on limited grounds. The County Council will then seek final funding approval which will cover the various points highlighted in the latest and most recent decision. When granted the County can then enter the land covered by the CPO and can expect to be on site for the necessary ecological and archaeological works by July. Planning Officers are now starting a new phase of discussions with the landowners and developers with a view to bringing forward the allocated land in North East Bexhill with particular attention to the early release of the employment land. The main contract is still due to start on site in January with completion in December 2014.

Leading on from this decision the recent publication of the National Planning Policy Framework may well generate further interest in Neighbourhood Planning as provided

for in the Localism Act. However the Link Road decision should enable the Council to submit its Core Strategy essentially as drafted and as a result will allow the Council to continue identifying suitable sites without having to increase allocations in other towns or villages. Whilst any Neighbourhood Plan must accord with the Core Strategy and cannot be used as a means of frustrating development, Planning Officers will be contacting Parish Councils imminently where development is envisaged and to work in partnership to identify reasonable options for local consultation. This should ensure an effective and resource efficient way of making local needs and priorities fully reflected in emerging ideas.

Finally Election time is upon us again with Hastings Borough and the London Mayor making the headlines! These will be interesting and undoubtedly 'competitive'. But I would like to mention the next election coming down the track which is for the Police Commissioner which will be in November and on which I would like to return to in more detail nearer the time. The person elected for this post will have the responsibility and effectively sole charge of all police matters not only in East Sussex, our County Council,

but also for West Sussex and the Unitary Authority Brighton and Hove and as such will be responsible for all financial matters and essentially how the budget should be spent. Amongst the many questions that will need resolving are who will be the candidates, can they represent the whole of Sussex, what will their budget and spending plans be and how will they use the bodies that are already in place (the Safer Rother Partnership for instance). They will be accountable to the electorate and will set the strategic policing priorities consulting and involving one would hope the public. As always it will be imperative to elect the best person as potentially they will have a huge effect on all our lives holding the Police to account through the Chief Constable.

Parishes can prepare their own Plan but need to be aware that there is a necessity for a referendum as well as not insignificant costs for the Parish Council.

- urging the Government to address fuel poverty;
- requesting the Government to employ more midwives:
- urging the Government to give British Sign Language (BSL) the same legal status and protection as other regional and minority languages (e.g. Welsh and Gaelic); and finally, urging the Government to make the wearing of helmets when cycling a legal requirement.

FLICKS IN THEVILLAGE FILM SOCIETY ~ Chris Saint

On the 3rd May we will be screening The Iron Lady. Phyllida Lloyd, who directed Meryl Streep in Mamma Mial, takes a less exuberant tack in this unexpectedly poignant biopic. The film depicts the elderly Dame Thatcher (Streep in a thoroughly convincing performance) as a frail figure replaying key moments in her life while her mind still continues to function. Her trajectory begins with grocer Alfred Roberts (Downton Abbey's lain Glen), who became the mayor of Grantham, instilling in his daughter, Margaret (Alexandra Roach), a passion for politics. After graduating from Oxford, she felt ready to enter the fray, at which point she met Denis Thatcher (Harry Lloyd), who cheered her along on the road from Parliament to 10 Downing Street, where they lived during her time as Britain's first female prime minister (Jim Broadbent portrays the grey-haired and ghostly Denis).

While closing mines, dodging IRA hits, and overseeing a war, the blue-clad titan built alliances with Airey Neave (Nicholas Farrell) and Geoffrey Howe (Anthony Head), but she would lose them both. If her will was strong, she had no time for feminine niceties like conciliation and forgiveness. The film goes on to suggest that she never cultivated the kinds of female friendships that might have sustained her in retirement, though her daughter (Tyrannosaur's Olivia Colman) did what she could. Instead, Denis remained her closest confidante until his departure, after which she had nothing but fading memories. The upshot is an uneasy combination of admiration for her leadership qualities and disappointment in her interpersonal skills.
