## NATURE NOTES ~ Avril Thurley

Cleaning up my greenhouse cacti is a pleasant job for a wet day. I use tweezers to pick off insects which the plants have "caught", and I am always intrigued that different types on cactus catch different insects. and that they do so even when not is flower. A cactus with long, sharp spines is relatively easy to handle, and if you do get spiked it's like being pricked with a needle. Some of the "furry" cacti are much more difficult, because each strand of fur has a tiny hook on the end, and woe betide you if you get one under your skin. They are almost impossible to remove, and are highly irritant. It is the latter type which catches most insects.

I don't feed the birds during the summer, as I like to think they might spend more time eating garden nasties such as aphids, so when I put out a nice selection of goodies in September it is always a pleasure to welcome back the different species. Doing without them for while serves to make them more welcome when they return - a bit like eating only fruit which is in season. Anyway, I have now been offering a good range of food for six weeks, and have welcomed back most of my regulars, but I have yet to see a starling. I know they are on the RSPB's list of birds at risk, but surely they are not going the same way as the bullfinches, tree sparrows, house martins and spotted flycatchers, all of which once bred in my garden here in Pett, but none of which apart from the occasional martin I even see now. True, Pett is not the rural village it once was, but starlings are supposed to be widespread in suburbia, so where have they gone?

Whatever the weather there are always winners and loser, and the winners this year have been the slugs and snails - and rhubarb. I was still pulling sweet tender rhubarb until the beginning of September, when the stalks started to get stringy. The plants are now more than five feet across and still growing. The other huge success story was my cucumbers; I ended up with more than 60 from three plants and in the end I was stopping unsuspecting strangers in the street and begging them to take some off my hands.



## Help!

Pett Village Hall Needs You ~ Ray Barden

The Village Hall is a huge asset for Pett since being built in 2001. Most people that use it, or attend functions or clubs held in the hall, are probably unaware of the amount of money needed to maintain and keep the hall to a high standard.

In the past, revenue has kept pace with the running costs needed, but the hall is now 11 years old and some of the fixtures and fittings need to be replaced. The highest cost for the near future involves replacement of the wooden floor in the main hall. Over the last couple of years there has been a leak in the under floor heating system which cannot be located and this has resulted in the floor lifting. Once the leak has been isolated we can think about replacing the floor, but the quote has come in at £13.000.00 + VAT.

Also other substantial costs have been paid were for:

- Sewage pumps £475.00
- 2 new central heating boilers £2188.00
- Replacement gas pipe to upgrade the heating system £1145.00
- Sanding and polishing of floor £3110.00

 Outside £2452.00

 Lowering main hall lights £1703.00

We are also looking to replace the urn/water boiler which will cost £400.00 and that is on top of the cost of the utilities which, as we all know, seem to be more expensive each year.

At the moment the hall accounts are in the black **BUT** some of the work which needs to be done would wipe it out completely as we are looking at needing to raise at least £20,000.00 plus VAT.

Please can you help keep the Village Hall solvent otherwise there is a grave concern it might have to be closed.

The management committee would like to hear from you with any ideas you may have for fundraising events etc.

The committee meetings are held on the first Monday of the month and we are looking for fresh ideas and faces to come along and take part in the worthwhile job of running Pett Village Hall.

And if you would just like to make a donation to the Village Hall all money received will make a difference as to whether Pett has a Village Hall or not.

#### Seafood Lasagne ~ serves 4

#### Serves 4

400 g cubed fish such as salmon and cod 1 large onion, very finely sliced

3 garlic cloves, crushed

12 dried or fresh lasagne sheets

2 hard boiled eggs, sliced

50 g parmesan cheese, grated

50 g plain flour Salt and pepper 200 g prawns 1 leek, shredded 150 ml white wine Spinach, wilted 2 tbsp tarragon, chopped

50 g unsalted butter

700 ml milk

#### Preheat the oven to 200C/Gas 6.

Cook the onion, leek and garlic in some oil for 5 minutes until softened, add the wine and cook for a further 2 minutes. Place the spinach in a large pan with a splash of water, place a lid on and cook for 1-2 minutes, squeeze out any excess water and season.

Meanwhile to make the béchamel sauce, melt the butter over a medium heat, then whisk in the flour, cook for 1-2 minutes, gradually pour in the warmed milk and continue whisking until you have a smooth sauce, reduce heat, then add the onion mixture, tarragon and season.

Assemble the lasagne in a greased oven dish by layering the béchamel, pasta, fish, spinach and eggs alternatively, finishing with the béchamel, add the grated parmesan and cook in the oven for 40 minutes.

Serve with the rocket salad and some ciabatta bread.

#### Courgette and red onion cakes with avocado salsa ~ makes 12

plain flour 200g milk 200ml red onion 1 halved and thinly sliced avocado 1 large, chopped coriander a small bunch, chopped soured cream to serve

egg 1 courgettes 2, grated olive oil lemon juice 1 tbsp spring onions 4, sliced

To make the batter, put the flour in a large bowl and make a well in the centre. Beat the egg with the milk and then pour into the well in the flour and whisk to make a thick, smooth batter. Add the courgette and red onion. Add some seasoning and stir.

Heat the oven 120C/fan 100C/gas 1/2. Heat a little oil in a wide non-stick frying pan. Add a large spoonful of the batter and fry for 3 minutes on each side or until golden and cooked through. Cook 3-4 cakes at a time (keep the cooked ones warm on a baking sheet in the oven while you cook the rest).

Mix the avocado with the lemon juice, coriander, spring onions and some seasoning. Serve the cakes with the salsa and some soured cream on the side.

#### Do you know? ~ John Taylor

Do you know about 'Selling Wives'?


After being married for 56 plus years, I have no intention of 'getting rid' of my wife: We've got used to each after all this time, and marrying her was the wisest thing I have ever done!

However the practice of selling wives was quite common at one time. In the late 17th century wife selling was a way of ending an unsatisfactory marriage by mutual agreement, when divorce was a practical impossibility for all but the very wealthy. There is an account from 1302 of someone who granted his wife to another man', and until the passing of the Marriage Act of 1753, a formal ceremony of marriage was not a legal requirement as marriages were unregistered (though recorded in Parish registers). All that was required was for both parties to agree to the union, as long as they had reached the legal age of consent, which was 12 for girls and 14 for boys. Women were completely subordinate to their husbands after marriage. Married women could not own

property in their own right and were themselves the property of their husbands. For many women, their sale was the only way out of anunhappy marriage. Some of these sales embodied a deed of separation and in many cases the purchaser was the wife's lover. After parading his wife with a halter round her neck, arm or waist, a husbandpublicly auction her to the highest bidder (guite often at the local

market or tavern). This had no basis in law but became fairly common from the end of the 17th century right through to the early 20th century. One of the last recorded cases is that of a wife being sold to her husband's workmate for £1 in 1913.

Prices paid for wives varied enormously, from a high of £100





Local papers often reported the sale of wives and the following are recorded in the Sussex Weekly Advertiser. In November 1790 a man sold his wife one evening for half a pint of gin, duly handed her over next morning in a halter, but changed his mind and bought her back 'at an advanced price'. At Lewes in July 1797 a blacksmith sold his wife to one of his journeymen 'agreeably to an engagement drawn up by an attorney for that purpose'. In Brighton in February 1799 a man named Staines 'sold his wife by private contract, for 5s and eight pots of beer, to one James Marten of the same place'. In about 1820 a woman named Smart was sold at Horsham for 3s. 6d. to a man named Steere, and lived with him at Billingshurst. Steere afterwards discovered that Smart had sold her because she had 'qualities which he could'

no longer endure', and Steere, discovering the same qualities himself, sold her to another man named Greenfield. This man put up with her (and her qualities) till he died.

So if you feel that it is about time you thought about 'selling' your wife, I'm afraid you are living in the wrong century. More's the pity? I think not!!

## Allotment News ~ Mike Wilkins, Chair

We are coming to the end of what has been a very difficult season for us. beset by drought in the early weeks and then cool and monsoon-like weather more latterly. Many of us made false starts, encouraged initially by the early warm dry weather, but we still achieved creditable results and ubiquitous gluts. I see that that a Professor Rowan Sutton concludes that our increasingly wetter summers are caused by a warming of the North Atlantic towards the end of the last century. He also predicts that the pattern may revert to drier summers very quickly. I also note that the professor does not guarantee his prediction, and does not predict when this is likely to happen. Given that anything can happen at any time we on the allotments are learning to build on experience and live by our wits. Whatever happens next year we will be better prepared onwards and upwards as I am sure somebody once said. November is the month for soil preparation. The purpose is to get nutrients back into the soil and to start the breakdown of compacted soil in readiness for preparing the fine tilth required for growing. This is also an opportunity to get rid of any persistent weeds and, for those digging the soil, expose pests which may be hiding under the surface to a certain death at beak birds. Typically the soil is dug and turned over to maybe one spit, or spade depth. At the same time manure or compost can be turned into the soil, or alternatively can be left until after digging and spread over the surface. Some subscribe to the 'no-dig' method

whereby, after weeding, manure or compost is laid over the soil leaving the worms and weather to break down the soil. To dig or not to dig? As with most things allotment there is no right or wrong way. The best way is whatever works for you. As one plot holder said to me — "I subscribe to the no dig method — my partner does all the digging!".



We do have plots available, and if you are interested in taking one over then please give me a call.

## High-Flying Bird Scares Local Fish! ~ Mike Russell of the Sussex Wildlife Trusts

There was high excitement around the Shoreham area during late August and September when a migrating osprey decided to hang around the area. This particular individual was a young bird thought to be from Scotland and likely to be on its way to



the shores off West Africa where most European born ospreys spend the winter. It was spotted a number of times and at various different places in the area and some lucky people even saw it dive into the River Adur on occasions and come up grasping a mullet. We saw it a few times over the nature reserve at Woods Mill and I managed to get most of my colleagues out to see it the first time as it circled fairly lowly over the lake, undoubtedly eying up the plentiful carp below. The enclosed nature of our lake and the fact that it was the school holidays, which meant the reserve had quite a few visitors at the time, probably dissuaded the osprey from plunging for the fish, but I hoped it might come back another time.

One consequence of the osprey's visit to Woods Mill was the effect it had on a visiting family. Mark Taylor, his wife and three young children were quietly sitting by the lake when they were suddenly surrounded by lots of people pointing at the sky and jostling for a view through the pairs of binoculars being passed around. When the bird appeared overhead Mark, who happened to have a pretty impressive camera with him, took some photographs of the bird, and by now was realising there was something a bit special going on. When the osprey passed over for the third time, his eldest daughter was really getting into the swing of it and was jumping up and down with excitement shouting 'There it is, there it is!'

I'm sure she will remember this for many years to come, if not all her life and who knows, it might have kick-started a life-long passion for wildlife. We did receive this lovely e-mail from Mark:

'I am pleased that at least I could provide an image that could be of some use even though I was not set up for bird photography. For me it was good to share the excitement that the staff at the reserve showed and indeed this was evident by the ever increasing buzz around my little family as we ate our lunch. This sort of passion for the environment and what creatures live with us is what I would like my children to inherit so well done for the encouragement and providing somewhere that they can see nature in its glory and in this case "rare" glory'.

Close encounters with such spectacular creatures can have a profound effect on people of any age and a close-up view of an osprey such as this would stay in the memory for a long time. As for 'our' osprey, it is, by the time you read this, probably somewhere in the Mediterranean area or even may have reached Africa. But the good news is, unless you are a fish of course, they are doing pretty well at the moment. Numbers and sightings are increasing now and the likelihood of you seeing an osprey in Sussex grows every year. It is not out the realms of possibility that they might even breed in the county in the not too distant future.

Now that would be a good reason to jump up and down with excitement.

#### District Councillor's Report ~ Clir. Robin Patten

The election for the Police and Crime is Commissioner (PCC) fast approaching. Judging from the reaction I have had in the village there is not much enthusiasm for it but it is important to remember just how much the person in this position all of affect The PCC will be elected for a four year term and the Home Office describes their role as cutting crime and delivering effective and efficient policing and meeting community needs as effectively as possible and also working in partnership across a range of agencies at local and national level to ensure there is a unified approach to preventing and reducing crime. They will be responsible for appointing the Chief Constable and holding him to account for the running of their force; producing a five year Police and Crime plan, following consultation with the public, victims of crime and the Police and Crime Panel, a formal body of local authority and lay members who will be able both to challenge and support the PCC; setting the policing budget and making crime and disorder reduction grants to other organisations such as community safety partnerships. The PCC will not run the Police as their role is to be the voice of the people and hold the Chief Constable to account. One also needs to be aware that the PCC will have control over a large budget distributing central policing grants from

government and for setting the precept raised through our Council Tax.

From a purely personal point of view

regret that the selection of candidates has been largely and inevitably 'politicised' and all the main parties have named their candidates. To me the concern is how the successful candidate will relate to and meet with our concerns whether we live in East Sussex. West Sussex or Brighton and Hove. However it is an important election, the door mongers are forecasting a minimal poll but I would urge you to read the respective manifestos and vote for the candidate who will be having a very significant impact on lives. our At the recent Parish Council meeting there was some confusion as to the impact and effect on residents from the Government's decision to abolish Council Tax Benefits (CTB) and require us to devise our own new local Council Tax Support scheme (CTS). In essence, commencing in April 2013 Central Government will cut nearly £9m (10%) of our funding in the Rother area as part of their ongoing deficit reduction plan and require Rother District Council and East Sussex County Council to make up the shortfall. As far as Rother is concerned the cupboard is getting just a bit bare as we have already found some 30% saving as well as taking on various other cost saving initiatives most recently being the

Waste Joint contract. The Council intends to take advantage of the Governments proposals to reduce the periods that people are entitled to for specific discounts or exemptions on their Council Tax. This focuses primarily on classes A and C which relate to properties in need of structural repair and properties left empty. The additional income this brings will be used to help meet part of the £9m loss of funding but it will not bridge whole amount needed. in designing our scheme the stated Government have that pensioners must be protected from any reduction and that they will continue to receive the same level of support as they do under the current CTB scheme. As a result any reduction in support has to come from those of working age. The draft CTS scheme that we have produced and which has been out to public consultation. endeavours encourage people into work yet protect the most vuinerable. However it is not possible to provide the current amount of financial support towards Council Tax bills for all working age residents on low incomes. This means that working age people who currently do not pay anything towards Council Tax will have to do so from April 2013. The final scheme will have to be agreed and decided upon by full Council in January and the results of the consultation will be taken into account for that determination.
