Some people feel that the grass in the Churchyard should all be cut short; others feel that the priority should be the nurturing of wildlife. As in so much of life, a balance is what is needed.

All of us who have been involved in the care of the Churchyard over the years have done our best. I am always amazed that some of the critics can be quite so unpleasant to us.

The main things I have learned are:

- 1 Churchyards provide such wonderful habitats for plants and wildlife because they have not been affected by herbicides, fertilisers and pesticides.
- 2 In order to preserve and encourage the habitats you need to plan very carefully the management of the Churchyard.

What we need is a patchwork of sites within the Churchyard which may need cutting and care at different times during the year. We have been fortunate in having John Osborn to mow the Churchyard over many years but I now propose that we need to manage the Churchyard. What is recommended is as follows:

(a) survey

(b) management plan

(c) explanation and consultation

(d) review of management plan

There may be a European grant (of coursel) available for an attractive information noticeboard in the Churchyard.

While all this is under way, Joan Medlock and I plan to summon an ongoing Churchyard Working Party. We will meet every Saturday starting on 5 January at 9.30am. Even if we pay for help (with the generous assistance of the Parish Council) there will still be plenty to do.

Please do let me have your constructive views on any of the above.

NATURE NOTES

January is named for the Roman god Janus, who guards the gate or door. He is usually depicted as having two faces, one looking backwards and one forwards - which is what most of us do at the start of a new year. If anyone is short of an idea for a new year resolution, why not make one to spend more time enjoying our beautiful local countryside? If you are unable to get out and about you can give yourself endless entertainment by setting up a bird feeding station outside your window.

Some friends on the Level saw a large white bird flying amongst several Grey Herons. It was as big as the Herons, and a similar shape. I wonder whether this could have been a Spoonbill, or the White Stork which was in the area around mid-October. Another interesting sighting was of swallows flying around the Royal Oak on 10th November.

There have been some spectacular sunrises and sunsets lately, and also some wonderful cloud formations. Early on 30th November there were three distinct layers of cloud, giving the sky a curiously 3-D effect, as though one were looking at the carved interior of an inverted bowl. The nearest clouds seemed to be moving in the opposite direction to those further away, which added to the impression. I thought that if it started snowing it would be like being inside one of those glass paperweights which produce a snowstorm when you upend them.

Mistletoe was believed by the Druids to be a gift from the gods, and the tree on which it was found - usually an apple or an oak - was sacred. It was a symbol of fertility and was also believed to have healing powers. The berries are poisonous.

By the time you read this we shall have passed the Winter Solstice. Commonly called the "shortest day", it is actually the longest night - 21-22 December. After that, although sunrise still gets later until after Christmas, the evenings start to get lighter. Rejoice and be glad!!

Extracts from my grandfather's diary for December 1898.

"Thursday 1st - Will took 70 bushels mangels to Mr Wadman. Got up litter from Hopgarden, thorns from Upper Chick Hill & Ellasfield, & litter from 5 acres... Drove Mr Harman to Rent Audit at Hall." (The Lucas-Shadwell's at Fairlight Hall were Grandfather's landlords.)

"Saturday 3rd -Will ploughing, self sowing, Fred Standen & Jack carting swedes."

"Monday 5th - Will ploughing, sowing & harrowing. Jack & self clearing swedes & Hopgarden. Jim finished pulling & then helped to fill cart."

"Wednesday 7th - Will tying straw. Jim working in garden & throwing tumips into heap. Self Rye, sold 5 sheep for 47/- (a man's wage for three weeks). Fred Standen took 22 trusses seed hay to Chealls and 24 to Richardsons."

"Friday 9th -Fine day at Hendon (his father's home), wet till 10 at Pett. Will ploughing. Jim half day at garden. Self came down by midday train and walked out."

"Saturday 10th - Will got up 2 loads litter in morning, afternoon hook-harrowed lucerne. Fred took 50 trusses meadow hay to Vaughans, brought back 4th load from Austins. Turned Kit (a horse) into marsh. Started to give lambs 3 1/2 gallons oats & put them onto fold. Met John & George in evening." (His younger brothers.)

"Sunday 11th - Self & boys (his brothers) walked round Winchelsea in morning."

"Monday 12th - ... John & George, 2 Barlings, Merricks, Wickens, Mr Cook & self shot 23 rabbits. Drove boys in in evening."

"Thursday 15th - Will got load litter from 5 acres. Self (hay) racks etc. Jack & self put 13 big beasts into Francom from bottom ground, and got up ram."

"Wednesday 21st - Will got material for gates from Estate yard & took to Bardens. Put load dung to 8 acres. Fred Standen took 100 (trusses) straw to Strickland, loaded home gas lime to 3 acres. Geo Standen tied meadow hay. Self getting ready for cattle etc."

"Thursday 22nd - ... Self (went to) Watford (to visit his grandparents) & back to Hendon."

"Friday 23rd - ... Self went to Crayford, walked to Temple & stayed night." (Crayford & Temple are near Dartford, where one of his brothers farmed.)

"Saturday 24th - Walked over Temple, came up (to Hendon) with David & William." (More brothers.)

"Sunday 25th - Christmas Day - Very fine day. General muster in evening." (At Hendon.)

"Monday 26th - Will day off. Kit got into ditch in Francom but got out herself. Played golf, George & self, John & Andrew. Lost 1 game, won the other."

"Tuesday 27th - Will finished Pett Barn Field. Self came down by corridor train, walked out. Jack got 13 big bullocks in ."

"Saturday 31st - ... Self went up in evening, met George & saw "La Poupee" & saw New Year in at St Paul's."

Rain was recorded on 11 days, and frost on 3.
