Maybe that's something we christians can do, no I do not mean go up in flames, but be aglow with the Spirit of God. Be enthusiastic and excited about the Christian faith we share, just as Paul was. Jesus, too, would certainly not have had the effect on people if he had been passionless and dull. Reading the gospels we are convinced there was something about Him that was compelling and passionate. It still has its effect today on those who wish to be his disciples. His Light of Life can be our light of life. Perhaps not to the extent it shone in Him, but nevertheless we can shine. Having an inner light of contentedness and trust in Christ can be much more powerful than any sermon or evangelistic programme. What we are speaks more loudly than what we say. So let's go up in flames of the Spirit and let our lights shine.

This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine.

PARAGRAPHS FROM THE PAST AN ADVENTURE IN PETT (about 1806) from a 1956 Parish Magazine

"During the summer we heard of more than one report of adders being found in the village. A Church member has brought to our notice an extract from "Lavengro" by George Borrow, and it is printed below. George Borrow, who was born in 1803, is perhaps best known for his study of nomadic life and his devotion to gypsies. He was also a remarkable linguist. In 1832 he became associated with the British and Foreign Bible Society and translated the New Testament into the Manchu tongue. He then went to Spain and for many years travelled up and down the country distributing the Scriptures. Borrow's journeys were not without danger and of his exploits he corresponded regularly with the Bible Society. Later he opened a Bible shop in Madrid where he translated St Luke's Gospel into Gitano for Spanish Gypsies. In 1840 he returned home and spent the rest of his life writing "Lavengro" which it has been said "is probably the most fascinating open-air book in the English language." George Borrow died in Oulton, near Lowestoft in 1881."

"... We once lived within the canvas walls of a camp, at a place called Pett in Sussex; and I believe it was at this place that occurred the first circumstance, or adventure, call it what you will, that I can remember in connection with myself; it was a strange one and I will relate it.

It happened that my brother and myself were playing one evening in a sandy lane, in the neighbourhood of this Pett camp (an army camp on Pett Level); our mother was at a slight distance. All of a sudden a bright yellow, and to my infantine eye, beautiful and glorious object made it appearance at the top of the bank between the thick quickset, and gliding down began to move across the lane to the other side, like a line of golden light. Uttering a cry of pleasure, I sprang forward, and seized it nearly in the middle. A strange sensation of numbing coldness seemed to pervade my whole arm, which surprised me more as the object to the eye appeared so warm and sunlike. I did not drop it,

however, but holding it up looked at it intently, as its head dangled about a foot from my hand. It made no resistance; I felt not the slightest struggle; but now my brother began to scream and shriek like one possessed. "Oh mother, mother!" said he, "the viper! My brother has a viper in his hand!" He then, like one frantic, made an effort to snatch the creature away from me. The viper now hissed amain and raised its head, in which were eyes like hot coals, menacing, not myself, but my brother. I dropped the captive, for I saw my mother running towards me; and the reptile, after standing for a moment nearly erect, and still hissing furiously, made off and disappeared. The whole scene is now before me, as vividly as if it occurred yesterday - the gorgeous viper, my poor dear frantic brother, my agitated parent, and a frightened hen clucking under the bushes; and yet I was not three years old."

(Note; amain = exceedingly, violently, with main force)

NATURE NOTES

On Christmas morning I watched the sun rise out of the sea, throwing a bright golden path across the grey water. On the horizon was a snow white bank of clouds like a flotilla of icebergs. It was a stunningly beautiful spectacle, but all too brief, as the sun thought better of it and disappeared back under its heavy grey duvet, where it has remained more or less ever since.

There have been thousands of lapwings on the Level. This is one of the species which is causing great concern to the RSPB because of a drastic fall in numbers nationwide. The reason we have so many here is that we still have the traditional grazing marshes. So when you watch the lapwings performing their acrobatics in glittering black and white mobs, or feeding shoulder to shoulder on the wet pastures, you can thank the sheep and cattle for keeping the ground just right for them; an excellent example of wildlife-friendly farming.

I was very pleased to see a little owl perched on a field gate recently. In a previous existence when I had the misfortune to live in London, I regularly saw these fierce little birds hunting around the bombed sites and air-raid shelters which still remained 30 years after the war - and may still remain for all I know. Little owls were only introduced to Britain in the late 19th century, and soon became widespread. Their diet includes mice, cockchafers and slugs, so they should be welcomed by gardeners.

A golden pheasant was seen in Rosemary Lane on two occasions. Presumably this is a 'free-range' domestic bird.

February is named for Februa, the Roman feast of expiation. It seems that the Romans made their new good resolutions somewhat later than we do!

Over the years it became common to have them for a week or so before and after Bonfire Night, then they became popular on New Year's Eve, then for parties, and now they can be heard at almost any time of the year - presumably because people now literally have more money to burn. Like bonfires, fireworks are great fun if they are yours, and somewhat less enjoyable if they are someone else's. Bearing in mind that most pets, and quite a few people, are nervous of sudden loud noises, it would be a kindness to notify one's neighbours before having a fireworks party. They can at least then keep the cat in and turn the wireless up loud.

I've been turning out my loft, and have unearthed an amazing amount of junk which I can't imagine why I kept. I have found homes for most of the useful items, but am left with an oil heater, freestanding, quite big, ideal for a greenhouse or conservatory. Can anyone take it off my hands? I don't want anything for it, but you will have to collect it.

By the time you read this, we should know whether the Post Office has been saved. If it has, the village will have Andrew Dunlop to thank. While the rest of us were wringing our hands and bewailing the loss of this vital service, Andrew got out there and launched a rescue mission. He was supported by our District

Councillor, Robin Patten; by the Rural Regeneration Office at Rother; and latterly by the Parish Council. At the time of writing it looks as though the rescue mission has been successful and we shall be able to keep our Post Office and our indispensable Tony. I for one will be keeping my fingers firmly crossed till we know for sure!

LUNSFORD FARM DIARY

Extracts from my grandfather's diary for January 1907.

"Tuesday 3rd - Morning windy - night hurricane with some rain. Carter took 84 trusses straw to Vine, loaded home dung to Acre Spot. Fred & boy put out mould & gas lime to 3 acres. Self setting up (sheep) fold in Lower Chick Hill."

"Friday 4th - Frost with thin ice just holding all day. Carter ... got (threshing) machine from Pound Farm (Guestling). Fred finish taking mould to 3 acres after skinning & burying steer (which) died in crib in stable yard."

"Monday 7th ... All hands & 10 extra threshed winter oats, 66 sacks."

"Tuesday 8th - Carter ... finished 5 acres headlands & moved (threshing) machine to Gatehurst. all hands, 11 extra, & Mr Cox & Will Cook bond making. Threshed 8 sacks white oats from Hopgarden on top of stack & 76 from small side of Pett Barn Field - 84 in all. Put 37 in Oast, 47 in barn. 2 crossbred lambs marked EP died."

Wednesday 9th - Carter with Mr Cox & boy got up 21/2 small loads of ditch litter from Lower Ground. Fred getting out approx 25 cwt potatoes for Mr Harborough. Regg drove 11 sheep & black lamb to Mr Buffards for Mr Smith. Bought 1 ton sulphate of ammonia from Mr Strickland at £12.10s basis of cash, delivery to be taken 1st week in Feb. (Paid) harness maker, Rye, 16/-."

"Thursday 10th - Carter morning PBF 4 hours, afternoon took 23 bags potatoes to Harborough. Fred & Mr Cox tying straw, 181 trusses. Joe got cartload litter from Frankham. Self put 48 crossbred lambs to fold, making 144 in all."

"Saturday 12th - Joe & Carter took 2 tons seed hay & 1/2 ton marsh hay to Strickland, brought back dried grains. ... Self Hastings, sold Mr Stonham spring oats from PBF, 18/6 for 38 lbs; winter oats from Budds, 2-/91/2 for 42 lbs. Bought 10 quarters of crushed maize for 23/6." (Both spring & winter oats were one bushel, the latter being heavier.)

"Tuesday 15th - Snowdrop calved."

"Friday 18th - Carter, boy & self harrowed part of small side of PBF, 2 went up, one went across. Drilled 61/2 bushels Mr Cooke's beans, harrowed draft up & down & drew out furrows. Fred, Mr Cox, Joe cleaned up winter oats, 55 sacks good oats."

"Monday 21st - Carter, Joe & 2 ploughs ploughing in beans in Acre Spot. Mr Cox & Fred picked up about 1 ton potatoes. Bert Foster started gripping (cleaning shallow field ditches) in Clokes Marsh. George & 4 others got about 11 rabbits."

"Wednesday 23rd - Very hard frost all day, ponds & ditches bearing (weight). ... Fred got red bull calf from Mr Foster, 25/-."

"Thursday 24th - Fred, Bert, Mr Cox & self reed cutting on canal (for thatching)."

"Thursday 31st - Freezing all day, ice bearing boys. Carter, Fred & self got waggonload litter from Lower Ground, 51/2 van loads from Toot. Afternoon, Carter drew out furrows in Eastlands."

In a note at the end of the diary, grandfather writes "Fortnight ending 19th Jan-marvellously fine weather, people sitting out of doors, men working in shirtsleeves." He records frost or ice from 20th to 28th, when there was a thaw. No mention of rain!
