

The Rector's Reflections in Rosemary and Peter James Lanes or Bernard's baffling bemusements while traversing the Benefice

I couldn't help thinking about the Tower of Babel while listening to the recent House of Commons debate on reform for the House of Lords. I hope it isn't too hard to see why all proposals for reform, even though they contrasted, were voted against indicated a very wide disparity of opinion and even confusion. All those who have ever sat on committees or attended meetings will know that some issues seem to defy consensus and they will have at least some sympathy for the Commons or, at most, an understanding.

Why is it that we can't at times seem to understand each other? It seems to me that the writer is telling us much more in Genesis 11:1-9, the story of the Tower of Babel, than the origin of different languages. Appreciation of Jewish word play and irony help us to discover the underlying messages. The word 'Babel', for the ancient Babylonians meant "the gate of the gods" whereas in Hebrew it sounds like "mix up" or confusion. The story tells us that God had to come down to look at the Tower, so it was hardly the 'gate of God'. We are also told that brick and bitumen are used to build the Tower. These are not durable materials.

Many think that the story highlights human pride as our basic sin. We think we're great and can do anything. Our confusion and lack of consensus derives from human pride. Humbling ourselves to God and to one another brings agreement. Although I would endorse that explanation, perhaps there is another interpretation. Maybe what was being attempted at Babel was to recreate something that was lost. There is an element of fear in verse 4 "Come let us build ... lest we be scattered ...". The Bible tells us that at first we were meant to live in close harmony with God and in a fellowship and community, one with Him and with one another. The construction of a Tower sought to give coherence, unity and community. Similarly, when nations go to war using it as a diversion from problems at home. But as the story tells us, grand idea though it was, it was not big enough to replace what had been lost at Eden.

So the next time you hear of disagreement and confusion in political debate or at a meeting and it sounds as if everyone is talking a different language, remember the Tower of Babel and confusion and misunderstanding arises from our sense of loss.

But there is hope, a great hope of finding coherence and community. On the Day of Pentecost the New Testament records that the disciples talked in tongues. That is, all the people who were gathered in Jerusalem, many of them foreigners, heard the disciples talking in their own language. Babel was reversed. This was done to that they could be understood as they proclaimed Jesus Christ. The reversal of Babel on the Day of Pentecost clearly shows us

where to find what was lost in the hearts of humankind.

PARAGRAPHS FROM THE PAST

Fifty years ago - 1953: Part of the monthly letter from the Revd R C Wood

"Some weeks ago Sir Percy Maryon-Wilson, Rector of Christ Church, St Leonards, made some remarks in the parish leaflet which received considerable publicity. These remarks seem to me to be so pertinent and so important that I should like to amplify them in this letter.

The Rector pointed out the increasing strain to which human beings are now subjected through the ever-growing importance that is being attached to speed in all departments of life. This, far from constituting true progress, involves both waste and deterioration in terms of human life. The waste takes the form of undue and unnecessary fatigue, and in some cases breakdown caused by the depletion of physical and psychological energy, and the deterioration comes about through the pernicious diversion of energy from the true ends of living. The energy that is spent in inventing, maintaining and keeping up with the mechanical adjuncts of living is no longer available for prayer, meditation, worship, study, thought, contemplation, the enjoyments of the arts and those enrichments of life made possible by the wise use of creative leisure. There was, perhaps, something to be said for the Luddites after all!

The Germans used to call this devotion to mechanical efficiency 'Fordismus', and Aldous Huxley portrayed its logical consequences in his novel, 'Brave New World'. It is an ironical comment on the course of history that the machine (which HG Wells welcomed as the liberator of the drudge) is showing a tendency to enslave men more insidiously and destroy them more effectively than the rigours of the Dark Ages or the ravage of bubonic plague. It is in the machine age that the craftsman and apprentice have almost disappeared; that

are too small for books; that people are too busy to write letters, to read or to engage in any of the charming and leisurely pursuits which made up a civilised life in the past. When we are invited to join in some futile, whirligig activity let us say, not "Oh, I am much too busy", but rather "Oh, I am much too leisurely for that!""

(Could these words have been written about life today?)

NATURE NOTES

There are already lots of primroses in the lanes, apparently undeterred by the cold snap. Forecasts of snow turned out to be somewhat exaggerated in this neck of the woods, but there was just enough in the fields to allow for a bit of amateur tracking. In places where snow has half melted and then frozen again. footprints 'spread' and look bigger than they really are, so that fox or badger prints give the impression that a wolf or bear has passed that way.

Wild birds and most mammals have a hard time of it when the ground is frozen. You can help some of them by putting out food and water, or by digging over a patch of earth for them to get at the creepy-crawlies underneath, but birds such as the kingfisher are beyond human aid and will starve to death if rivers remain frozen for any length of time.

A red kite was seen over Pett on 31 January, flying towards Fairlight. This is a most unusual sighting for this time of the year. Red kite numbers are on the increase, with a lot of help from their friends, but they are still very rare in the southeast of England. If you are lucky enough to see one in flight you will be able to recognise it by its very long tail which is forked at the end.

March is named for the Roman god Mars, who is known to us as the god of

War. He may originally have been the god who looked after the fields and agriculture.

LUNSFORD FARM DIARY

Extracts from my grandfather's diary for February 1907.

"Friday 1st - Freezing much of day in shade. Carter in Eastlands. Fred morning in wood, afternoon spreading furrows in Eastlands. Joe carting up bottom headland in Eastlands to top. Mr Cooke hedging. Bert Foster (cleaning) grips. Self (mending) stable manger."

"Monday 4th - Freezing all day, slight fall of snow in night. Ground too hard to plough. ... Put remainder of hurdles to Chick Hill. Got 20 bundles thatch wood from Mr Griffin & 50 drainpipes from Mr Foster, 10 bundles stakes & 10 binders from Mr Harman's cant. Got bay filly from Lower Ground."

"Thursday 7th - freezing hard. Carter, Fred, Mr Cox & boy mould carting from Francom to 3 acres. Bert Foster (cleaning) ditch between Mr Fuller & Toot. Sold Mr Smith 6 ewes 47/- and 7 Snargate sheep at 50/6. Put 15 Snargate sheep with 17 in Clokes Marsh."

"Saturday 9th - Steady thaw all day. Carter got in (threshing) machine from Breeds Barn. Fred & Mr Cox & Bert Foster tying straw. Reg got calf from Mr Wadman's, from roan cow & put in pen."

"Monday 11th - Carter, boy & Will Cooke took 50 trusses wheat & 50 oat straw to Vine, 103 oat straw to Weston and loaded back 1 ton coals from Bryant, & 2 cwt peameal, 21/2 cwt maize germ meal & cwt dried grains from Strickland. Reg took 13 sheep to meet Smith's man. Fred & Mr Cox making bonds (then) Cox heding & Fred helped Charley Stace to put up 11 cwt potatoes."

"Thursday 14th - Fed & Bert Foster helped to put up 27 bags potatoes. Joe took 18 bags to Mr Harborough with Prince (a horse) in cart. Boy took 9 bags in van (also horsedrawn)."

"Monday 18th - ... Fred, Mr Cox & 12 extra men threshed wheat from top half of big side of Pett Barn Field, put 49 sacks to barn, 3 to stable & 2 to oast."

"Tuesday 19th - ... Fred, Mr Cox & self with 12 extra men threshed Hopgarden oats, put 6 sacks to oast, 76 to barn, weighed 4 for Mr Hunter, 6 bushels to stable."

"Wednesday 20th - Carter, Mr Cox & Fred got 2 loads litter from marsh. Carter took (threshing) machine to Hunter. Fred broke weighing machine. Self Rye, sold 24 quarters of wheat to Stonham at 29/6, 63lbs (bushel weight), and white Hopgarden oats at 21/-, 42lbs."

"Thursday 21st - Carter ploughing Eastlands. Fred & Bert (cutting) wood. Mr Cox hedging. Mr Barling put in 40 sheep."

"Friday 22nd - Carter & boy took 34 sacks wheat to Rye, loaded back 6 sacks cracked maize & 1 ton cottoncake. Bert Foster, Fred & Mr Cox cleaning white oats."

"Tuesday 26th - Fred lookered & got ewe that had been in ditch to Front Field, leaving 42. Reg got 44 ewes from new ground to Coneybanks. Self (went to) horse show & came down & walked out (from Hastings)."

"Thursday 28th - Very fine day, men working without coats. Carter finished Eastlands, got up about 30 hedge faggots, and started ploughing Lower Chick Hill. Fred ... helped put up 1 ton potatoes for Harborough."
