Duties that not only define church membership, but also define what if is to be a christian. The christian, although feeling the weight of commitment these duties imply, nevertheless, desire to fulfil them and, strangely, they become a joy and not a burden.

## **DIOCESAN AND DEANERY ST RICHARD CELEBRATIONS**

Our Deanery celebrations and services marking the 750th Anniversary of our Diocesan Patron Saint, and Bishop of Chichester, Richard, went very well. The high point was, on a very sunny afternoon Saturday 5 April, a procession from St Richard's Winchelsea Beach to a Deanery Service at St Thomas' Winchelsea. Civic dignitaries and children from local schools and churches took part. The focal point of our celebrations is an icon specially made by the distinguished Russian icon painter, Sergei Fyodorov, which will be transported through all 21 deaneries, ending at Chichester Cathedral on 13 June.

## NATURE NOTES

Because I regularly walk the same route at the same time, the resident wildlife takes very little notice of me. Even the Grey Herons, which are notoriously shy birds, let me get quite near before taking off for the next watercourse. I think that at close quarters herons look almost prehistoric. Their long, powerful beaks, beady eyes and slow, stealthy movements make them formidable hunters. Their kinked necks can be straightened with lightning speed, spelling death to frogs, voles, fish, young water birds or almost anything which moves. When they take off their slow, heavy flight adds to the impression of timelessness. Surprisingly for such large birds, they nest colonially in trees.

I am pleased to see that Little Grebes are nesting again in the same place which they have used for the last three years. I wonder whether they are the same birds. They vanish by diving under the water at the least sign of danger, resurfacing amongst reeds or other foliage where they are hidden from sight. Little Grebes, as their name implies, are very small - not much bigger than a duckling - and give the impression of a round head on a round body, rather like a lopsided cottage loaf. As with the Herons, "my" Little Grebes are now so used to me that I can get quite close to them before they disappear.

The spring flowers along the verges have been wonderful. I counted 65 flowers on one primrose plant in Pannel Lane - not counting unopened buds. Did you see the lovely display of primroses, crocuses and cyclamen at the end of the drive to Goldcrest and the daffodils, snowdrops and angels' tears on the bank outside the old barn at Lunsford Farm?

Look out for the Judas Tree in the garden of Rosemulion Cottage, next door to what used to be the Rectory. It is quite spectacular in May. Look out also for Spotted Flycatchers, one of the latest summer migrants to appear. They sit very upright on a fence or post, dart off to snatch an insect and return to the original perch to eat it.

The old admonition to 'cast ne'er a clout till may be out' may refer to the flowers of the may tree (hawthorn) or to the fact that the month can be very cold and windy. As Shakespeare so truly said, "Rough winds do shake the darling buds of May".

The month of May is named for Maia, the mother of Hermes who was the ambassador of the gods.

## LUNSFORD FARM DIARY

Extracts from my grandfather's diary for April 1907
"Monday 1st - Easter Monday Coder finished drilling I

"Monday 1st - Easter Monday. Carter finished drilling Lower Chick Hill, harrowed & rolled after. Sowed in all about 91/2 sacks of Mr Strickland's black oats ... Self played round (of golf) with boys. Best scores John 45, George 45, Andrew 50, self 57. Andrew won at bezique."

"Tuesday 2nd - Fine day but cold. Carter shimmed 5 Acre headland, drilled oats & harrowed. Will rolling 5 Acre wheat. Regg drove 30 tegs to new ground, leaving 4 ram tegs & 6 wether tegs in Cliff Piece."

"Wednesday 3rd - Carter rolling 5 Acres & Upper Chick Hill seeds (grass). Will took 1 bushel seed potatoes to Mr Peters, 4 bushel to Mr Vine, 50 trusses wheat straw to Vine. Loaded home 5 bags grains from Vine, 6cwt sulphate of ammonia, 8cwt bonemeal, 2cwt nitrate of potash from Strickland."

"Friday 5th - Carter, Fred & self till bait, then Joe with colt, shimmed big side of Pett Barn Field. Mr Cox finished at wood & spreading mole heaps in meadows. Boy rolled winter oats, finished harrowing 5 Acre wheat & harrowed about half of winter oats."

"Wednesday 10th - Will & boy rolling meadows. Carter, Bert Foster, Mr Cooke & self took 67 house faggots to Mr Cox & got 2 small loads of faggots & bats up to house. Afternoon Carter & Mr Cooke got 124 trusses oat straw from Ashes. Fred put in pinnocks (culverts) in brooks etc. Mr Cox & Joe sowing seeds in Lower Chick Hill. Wrote to Mr Wellsted (at Snargate) that I would pay £3-10-0 for big field & peak, & £3 for two (other) fields. (In addition to existing ground at Snargate; the Wellsteds are still farming there.) Boy all day rolling 8 Acres. Bert Foster started to hoe beans in Acre Spot."

"Monday 15th - Carter, Fred, Will Cooke & boy carting mould from Francom ditch to pond in Cliff. Afternoon, Carter, Fred, Joe & boy with colt & 3 other horses shimming in Pett Barn Field ... Put 12 ewes & 16 lambs to Toot."

"Tuesday 16th - Joe took 14 beats to Snargate. One kept at home for present."

"Friday 19th - very cold day. All hands to mangels. Mr Cox gathering couch etc. Harrowed, rolled, drilled, harrowed, rolled, sowed about 4 acres mangels, 11/2 acres thousand heads (kale). Used 6cwt sulphate of ammonia, 51/2 cwt bone meal, 14cwt superphosphate. Boys took 11 poor tegs to new ground, 28 odd sheep to Lower Ground."

"Saturday 20th - Carter ploughing Budds for potatoes with Joe & Colt ... Turned 5 heifers into Clokes Marsh."

"Monday 22nd - Mr Cox, Will, Carter, boy, 3 carts carting mould from Francom to fill up hollow in Cliff Piece. Joe drove 9 beasts to Snargate & stayed the night."

"Tuesday 23rd ... heard cuckoo."

"Saturday 27th - Carter took 46 trusses straw to Vine, loaded home 8cwt dried grains & 18cwt nitrate. Will Cook got cartload mortar from (Fairlight) Hall, cleared up refuse round feeding hurdles in Ellasfield. Got faggots from Ellas Lane to stack, & got calf from Elms."

Rain was recorded on 10 days and frost or ice on 4.

On 5 April we had a welcome visit from Susan Wilson from the Sussex Wildlife Trust. She came to advise us on how to care for our churchyard so that we might be able to fulfil the following aims:

to make it a fitting resting place for our loved ones; to preserve as much as possible the wildlife of the area - this includes flowers, birds, invertebrates and small animals;

A management plan has been suggested which includes:

regular grass cutting of paths which will allow access to tended graves; parts will be left uncut until spring flowers have blossomed and seeded thus maintaining a diversity of habitat.
