From the Pett Parish Magazine - June 1915 - Diocesan Inspection

The annual examination of Religious Instruction in our Daily School was held on Wednesday, May 19th at 9.45 by the Rev R B Jameson. He says, "The Religious work continues to be carefully taught in both Divisions, the Rector taking a regular part. In the Upper Class the greater part of the syllabus has been covered, and the lessons from the Catechism and Holy Scripture have been reverently explained. Some answers were thoughtfully given ... The younger children are kindly and successfully taught and trained. The Old Testament narratives were well known and a simple explanation has been given of the early portion of the Catechism. The written work was carefully done.

NATURE NOTES

I was sitting under a gorse bush, sheltering from the bitter wind and watching a big bank of purple cloud build up over Icklesham. A rabbit came lolloping out of the scrub and moved slowly passed me. At one point it was no more than a yard from my wellies. It looked perfectly healthy but certainly had no awareness of my presence. I wondered whether I smelt so "sheepy" as to be unrecognisable as a human.

On 18 April I not only heard the cuckoo but also saw it as it flew low across the road at the top of Chick Hill. The following day I saw a swallow, which as we all know doesn't make a summer, and sure enough it turned bitterly cold with an arctic wind!

The wild cherry trees have been spectacular this year, totally covered with white flowers. The bark is attractive too, being a rich chestnut brown with horizontal stripes. Another plant which has done exceptionally well, though much less welcome, is the Alexanders, which you can see growing rampantly along the verges all the way from Pett Level to the Royal Oak. According to the books it is edible, but the smell is enough to put me off. Perhaps it has its fans, but I put it in the same category as Ground Elder and Goosegrass. A plant which is certainly edible is garlic mustard, which also grows along the verges, and makes a tasty addition to salads. As its name implies, the leaves taste quite strongly of garlic.

I know I'm not the only one to be irritated by the call of the Collared Dove. To me it sounds like "Raphael is dead!" and when it has been repeated over and over for an hour or more I tend to wish the same fate on the bird. Visually they are attractive birds who would be welcome visitors to my garden if they would just stop mourning "Raphael".

A friend has her fishpond netted over to prevent the heron taking her goldfish. The netting is only about 2' above the water, so my friend was somewhat surprised to see two mallard ducks swimming happily about beneath it. She suggested to them that it was not a very safe place to be and they swam calmly to the edge and climbed out through a gap where the netting didn't quite cover the irises. They then toddled off across the lawn in line astern and in no particular hurry. I though it was especially interesting that they were sensible enough not to fly up when discovered, as had they done so they would assuredly have been entangled in the net.

Sunday 4 May was a beautiful day. I went to Warehorne on the marsh with some friends and we heard two nightingales singing. It was about 3.00pm and they had a background accompaniment of blackbirds, chaffinches and a willow warbler. The previous day I had been admiring big fat spikes of Early Purple Orchids in a local wood. Aren't we lucky to live in this beautiful area?

June is named for Juno, the supreme goddess and the wife of Jupiter. The Roman Jupiter is the equivalent of the Greek Zeus, chief of all the gods.

LUNSFORD FARM DIARY

Extracts from my grandfather's diary for May 1907.

"Thursday 2nd - horrible day, heavy rain, intensely cold. Men working in coats and gloves. Carter, after delay by weather, carting Pett Barn Field. Afternoon ploughing up waste building land. (The houses had just been built along Pett Road East,) Mr Cooke Pett Barn Field all day. Fred & Mr Cox spudding. Self fencing in marsh."

"Friday 3rd" - Carter morning carting PBF, afternoon ploughing building land. Will Cooke all day carting PBF. Fred fencing end of towpath & spudding. Mr Cox (spudding) thistles in Ellas Brook. Turned 10 beasts (cattle) to Francom."

"Monday 6th - Morning, Carter, boy, Mr Cooke & Joe carting PBF. Fred & Mr Cox (spudding) thistles. Afternoon planted 6 rows potatoes. Put 8 ewes & 8 lambs to Coneybanks. Put 6 New Lodge calves to colts marsh."

"Tuesday 7th - All hands planted potatoes (Dalmeny Beauties) till noon, then carting etc. Self Lewes."

"Friday 10th - All hands planted 21 rows Dalmeny Beauties. Turned 7 calves to Poor field. Regg got up calf from Mr Field."

"Tuesday 14th - Heavy rain 6.30 to 8, thundery and close. Carter carting to PBF. Joe & Will & 2 horses took about 11/4 tons boards etc to Mr Small at Ore, & loaded home dung from Weston to PBF. Put Wakeham & Wiltshire heifers to Toot, & remaining 5 to Catstail. Put 5 Bean Lodge yearlings (cattle) to new ground."

"Thursday 16th - Carter started to plough turnip ground in PBF. Fred, Mr Cox & Joe spudding in afternoon. Joe morning filling in cart tracks in meadows. Mr Cooke started to hoe PBF beans second time. Kit foaled, colt foal, white hind feet."

"Friday 17th - Carter & Mr Cooke ploughing PBF. Fred peas. Boy pulling kelk (charlock). Mr Cox thistles. Self odd fencing. Regg garden. Joe to Catsfield for sprayer."

"Saturday 18th - Joe & man from Battle spraying kelk in Eastlands. In afternoon rolled ploughed ground in Eastlands, Carter harrowed after. Fred finished pea hoeing."

"Sunday 19th - Extremely cold day, heavy storms of frozen hail."

"Monday 20th - Dreadfully cold morning, dry till noon, then heavy rain alternating with heavy falls of frozen hail as large as peas & lying on ground most of afternoon. Carter PBF. Joe spudding. Mr Cox off. Fred hoeing mangels. Regg and self put 4 (ewes with lambs) to Coneybanks & 5 to Toot."

"Thursday 23rd - Carter PBF. Fred mangels. Joe carting to Budds heap. Self to Chatham."

"Friday 24th - Carter took load scaffolding to Ore for Mr Small, loaded back 24cwt superphosphate ... Self at academy."

"Saturday 25th - Carter PBF, Joe carting. Kit weak. Self Hatfield."

"Tuesday 28th - ... Darling died." (One of the horses.)

Rain or hail was recorded on 14 days, and it was very cold on 12 days.
