Bernard's baffling bemusements whilst traversing the Benefice*

"It's a dress!" said one. "You look like a girl!" said another. Those were some of the reactions of the pupils of Year 1, Guestling Bradshaw School as I donned my cassock and surplice. I had been invited to show them how a vicar dresses and to tell them a Bible Story. I explained that this was my uniform and, like their school uniform, I did not wear it all the time. But you could see that for 6-7 year olds, I was a very strange sight indeed.

It was no good telling them that there is no subject which is more difficult to be precise and accurate. There are those who would like to think that clergy dress goes back as far as Moses and Aaron, 1200BC (Exodus: Chapter 39). And there are those who like to dress, as they believe, going back to the late Roman Empire (5-9th Century AD). However, according to my reading, my formal 'Anglican' dress has more to do with the last century and a half.

The reaction of the children confirms my opinion that 'church' and 'clergy' are a very different culture, and increasingly so, in our modern world. I am grateful that the school helps me to close the gap. However, as I told them about Jesus I hoped and prayed they could see that as I was very serious about Him I didn't mind putting on a 'dress' for Him.

PARAGRAPHS FROM THE PAST

The following snippets are taken from various issues of the Parish News:

July 1946: Women's Institute: Mrs Jury announced that she would be forming a Canning Club and would commence at Pickham Farm as soon as the gooseberries were ready. The Produce Guild also held a very successful area meeting at the Village Hall, members coming from the surrounding villages.

July 1948: We congratulate Ronald Barden on winning a consolation prize in the "Safety First" Competition for East Sussex.

According to our custom the collections at Matins and Evensong on the first Sunday in August will be given to our organist, Mr Kennett, who has worked most enthusiastically with the Choir, and the musical quality of the services has improved out of all recognition.

The Annual outing of the Old Comrades Civil Defence Association leaves by coach at 1 o'clock, arriving Brighton at 3 o'clock approx; allowing three hours shopping time until 6 o'clock when high tea will be arranged and afterwards seeing Tom Arnold's Ice Rhapsody at Brighton Sports Stadium.

July 1957: Inside Chester Cathedral stands a grandfather clock, on the door of which the following verses appear:

"When, as a child, I laughed and wept, time crept.
When, as a youth, I dreamed and talked, time walked.
When I became a full-grown man, time ran.
And later, as I older grew, time flew.
Soon I shall find, while travelling on, time gone.
Will Christ have saved my soul by then?"

And forty years ago in July 1963: The prospect that the Bishop of London may leave Fulham Palace for a home near St Paul's recalls a story about one of his predecessors, Dr Winnington Ingram. He used to give taxi drivers 5s for the pre-war journey from the Cathedral to the Palace, the exact fare being 4s 6d. One day a cabby who thought the tip too small remarked on arriving; "St Peter wouldn't have lived in that place." "No," replied the Bishop. "He'd have been the Primate, and the fare to Lambeth Palace would have been 1s 6d".

NATURE NOTES

I went into the kitchen to put the kettle on, and there in the middle of the floor was a Pipistrelle bat. I picked it up and took it outside, where it spread its wings but showed no inclination to leave my hand. Further down the garden out of range of the security light, it suddenly took off into the darkness. But how did it get into the kitchen? I can only think it must have come in my bedroom window and found its way downstairs, where it became confused by the lights. What a good thing I saw it before I trod on it!

The Marsh frog is an introduced species which has really made itself at home here. At about 5" long they are much bigger than our native Common frog (3"), and although they do no physical harm to their smaller cousins, they do compete for habitat and food. Marsh frogs are the ones you hear 'singing' all along the Level, and indeed up the hill in Pett too. The Common frog is much less common than it used to be. Apart from its smaller size it can be distinguished by the black patch on each side of its head behind the eye.

When the wind is in the right direction you can sometimes smell that wonderful 'sea smell' made up of salt water and seaweed. It always reminds me of scrambling barefooted around rock pools as a child. Scents can bring back memories long buried in the depths of our consciousness - to this day I can't smell wallflowers without thinking of my grandmother whose cottage was surrounded with them. Think what a magic world dogs and wild animals must live in, their noses being so much more sensitive than ours. Birds on the other hand are supposed to have no sense of smell, which is why you can mix chilli powder with bird seed to deter squirrels.

I had a very sad report about a young nuthatch. It got inside a squirrel-proof bird feeder, which is not a problem in itself, but it then managed to get into the tube inside. It was still alive when rescued, but died shortly afterwards. This must surely be a freak occurrence - or has anyone else had it happen?

The recent hot spell has encouraged reptiles to sun themselves in conspicuous places. Unfortunately this includes roads. There was a dead slow worm on the road outside Hill House the other morning, and I persuaded a grass snake to vacate its favoured spot in the road a little further down. Both slow worms (which are legless lizards) and grass snakes are completely harmless.

Mistle thrushes are raising a family in a neighbouring garden. I was alerted by their loud whirring alarm call - rather like the sound of a push-mower - and went out to see a magpie intent on robbing their nest. Both thrushes launched a spirited attack on the magpie, who persisted in his efforts for some time before being driven off. As the parent birds chased the marauder away, still scolding angrily, I found myself breaking into applause. Not many songbirds can protect their nests from the handsome, murderous magpie. You can often see them

hunting along hedgerows for eggs and nestlings, while the parent birds fly around frantically and helplessly.

July is named for Gaius Julius Caesar. He established the Julian Calendar in 46 BC, which was used in Europe until 1582 when it was replaced by the Gregorian Calendar, the major difference being that in the latter version a century year is only a Leap Year if divisible by 400.

LUNSFORD FARM DIARY

Extracts from my grandfather's diary for June 1907.

"Saturday 1st - Rain in night, dry till noon then thunder & rain almost continuously rest of day. ... Cooke's party washed sheep (at Sheepwash Bend) 106 ewes, 128 lambs. Will Cooke put 6 beasts (*cattle*) off towpath to new ground."

"Tuesday 4th - Carter, Mr Cooke, boy & self most of day dung carting to Pett Barn Field. Fred & Joe mangels - finished setting out (*thinning*). Mr Cox (*spudding*) thistles."

"Wednesday 5th - Carter stable cleaning morning. Mr Cooke morning odd work & wood cutting, afternoon stable whitewashing. Joe mowed lawn & grass walks, & greasing wagons etc."

"Friday 7th - Carter ploughing PBF. Mr Cox thistles. Joe thistles. George Foster dung spreading. Fred morning thistles, afternoon with Regg & self planting cabbages in Budds. Crossbred ewe died on Toot - got lambs to front garden. Will put out dung to PBF."

"Monday 10th - Carter morning ploughing, afternoon rolling. Mr Cooke carting & in afternoon harrowed potatoes. Fred & Joe finished mangels & turnips. Self & Regg braking (*hoeing*) mangels. George Foster dung spreading."

"Thursday 13th - Painfully cold day, gloomy, bitterly cold in evening. Carter finished sideland PBF & ploughed early trifolium ground. Mr Cooke harrowed up & rolled down about 4 acres of turnip ground. Fred & Joe hoeing mangels. Sold Smith 2 roan heifers in Francom, £34."

"Thursday 20th - Fred & Joe mangels. Carter finished Upper Chick Hill seeds & started Hopgarden. Mr Cox turning swathes in 8 Acres. Mr Cooke shaking over 3 Acres. (*Fluffing up the hay to help it dry*). George Foster mowed stackyard. Afternoon all hands picked up 5 very fair loads total from 3 Acres. Cooke & nephew shore 53 sheep."

"Friday 21st - Carter Hopgarden. Fred, Joe & Ore man turned 8 Acres. Mr Cox raked over first cutting Upper Chick Hill. Afternoon, picked up 10 loads from 8 Acres in moderate order. Cooke & nephew shored 39 sheep in new ground."

"Monday 24th - Driving rain at times, dreadfully cold. (*This was Midsummer day!*) George Foster & Mr Cooke braked potatoes. Fred & Joe mangled. Mr Cox thistles. Sold Mr Smith 6 barrens (ewes) & 5 2-year-old sheep at 53/- each, and whitefaced heifer & Mr Moon's sandy red steer at £15-10s each."

"Friday 28th - Carter, Fred, Joe, Will Cooke & boy drilling mixed swedes & hybrids (*fodder crop*). Used in all about 11/2 cwt superphosphate. George Foster, one Ore man & self shaking over Upper Chick Hill. Afternoon picked up 6 loads. Very late finish."

"Sunday 30th - Heavy shower in forenoon. Sunless, very cold. Fire in evening."

Rain was recorded on 16 days, and 17 days were very cold.
