Encountering the holy

"But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saving 'Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord.' ... And Jesus said to Simon 'Don't be afraid'

Most of our lives we avoid or skirt round the holy. We may live in a beautiful area, which gives a sense of well-being and perhaps wonder in the human breast, but rarely does it penetrate to that place of genuine awe. Even in Christian worship we talk and sing of it but, again, rarely is our soul genuinely aware of the majesty and holiness of God and of our own near-nothingness.

Peter experienced the holy. Although he must have been acquainted with Jesus the miracle of the huge catch of fish opened his eyes to who Jesus is and His holiness. He is made to feel wretched and ashamed, yet he leaves everything and follows. All genuine experience of God has this quality of simultaneous fear and longing. Wanting Jesus to go away, yet longing to be always in his presence.

Such experience must, and does, change us. We are never the same again. But remember that He said ... "Don't be afraid!"

"PARAGRAPHS FROM THE PAST"

A few more snippets taken from various issues of The Parish News:

August 1953: I am sure that we are all pleased at having the old Bath-stone font dated 1753 back in its rightful place in the Parish Church. One is able to appreciate the beauty of its proportions even more keenly by contrast with the hideous, bulbous Victorian font that was once considered an Improvement on it. This latter has now been consigned to the Churchyard and we hope to find a home for it in the near future. We are most grateful to Mr Vincent Lines who generously offered to pay for restoring the old font in memory of his mother. We are also most grateful to him for supplying us with a new noticeboard at St Nicholas church, which has been painted by one of his pupils.

August 1956: Most of us regret the closure of our Village School and the departure next term of our young children to Guestling. The school has served the village for over a century and for many it must hold both pleasant and painful memories. However, time marches on and we can be assured that our children at the Guestling School will have all the attention, care and consideration (to say nothing of the three Rs) they received at Pett. In bidding farewell to Mrs Bright we wish her every happiness and success in her next appointment.

August 1957: Seen on a country grave:

"As I am now, so you must be, Hence prepare to follow me."

After reading such lines, a local wit added this conclusion:

"To follow you I'm not content Until I know which way you went."

August 1958: King George VI included this message in bibles issued to the Forces during World War II. "To all serving in my forces by sea, or land, or in the air, and, indeed, to all my people engaged in the defence of the Realm I commend the reading of this book. For centuries the bible has been a wholesome and strengthening influence in our national life, and it behoves us in these momentous days to turn with renewed faith to this Divine source of comfort and inspiration."

August 1963 - 40 years ago: This being the holiday month I should like to take the opportunity of wishing all those who are leaving us for a time, a happy holiday and to welcome all those who have come among us at this time. I do hope, if only for the campers' sake, that the weather of the last few weeks of rain and cloud will be followed by a month of sunshine and warmth.

11 NATURE NOTES

Summer scents are wonderful - philadelphus, honeysuckle, pinks, roses, jasmine - the list is endless - but perhaps the most delectable scent of all is that of new-mown hay. It retains much of its scent after being baled, so if you are using the permissive path through Lunsford Farm, pause by the Dutch barn and give your nose a treat!

I was sitting in a friend's garden when a rabbit came hopping across the lawn and started chomping his way along the border. My friend clapped her hands and the rabbit looked up with an expression which said quite plainly "mind your own business", and went on munching the border plants. What, my friend asked, could she do about rabbits?

In the autumn of 1992 my dog Anna died, and the following year my garden was totally devastated by rabbits. They must have stood on each others' shoulders to reach as high as they did. I tried every known rabbit repellent and all sorts of allegedly rabbit-proof plants, and none of them worked. In the end I took the only remaining course and had the garden properly rabbit-fenced by a local contractor. In the ten years since then I have seen no evidence at all of rabbits, so I consider it money well spent. Now, if someone could just invent an effective slug barrier!

Did you see the Bee orchids in the Riddell caravan park at Pett Level? There were at least 15 of them, easily visible from the public footpath. My thanks to Barbara Jennings and the gorgeous Sophie for drawing them to my attention.

August is named for the Roman Emperor Augustus. He was originally called Octavian, but changed his name to Augustus ('sacred') after defeating Antony, whose mind was on other things (like Cleopatra) and becoming sole ruler of the Roman Empire. After his death he was deified by his grateful subjects.

This edition of the Parish News marks the tenth anniversary of my first Nature Notes and I though it might be timely to reprint the first paragraph of those notes:

"Perhaps I'd better start by saying that these notes are not meant for 'proper' naturalists, but for those who, like me, find blackbirds and primroses every bit as interesting as Little Terns and Military orchids."

LUNSFORD FARM DIARY

Extracts from my grandfather's diary for July 1907.

"Monday 1st - All hands & 2 extra men turned Hopgarden rows twice and carried 12 loads, 10 to stack in field & 2 home. Carter earthing up potatoes. Will took old barrows to blacksmith."

"Tuesday 2nd - Forencon dry. At noon thunder, lightning & torrents of rain running to bottom of loaded wagons of hay. All hands shook over remaining 4 loads of hay in Hopgarden & picked this up in forenoon, then stopped by rain. Afternoon lost,"

"Wednesday 3rd - Carter, Joe, Fred & self dried part of two wet loads, and unloaded whole. Stopped at noon due to heavy & persistent rain. Afternoon, Joe cut wood. Carter put load of dung to Upper Chick Hill. Will Cooke went to Rye for 1/2 ton cotton cake & 12 sacks maize."

"Sunday 7th - Rain in torrents for about 2 hours."

"Monday 8th - Carter morning ploughing old seed lay in 8 acres, afternoon cut about 21/2 acres in Spring Meadow. Fred & Joe off, on Portsmouth excursion. George Foster morning pulling seed stack (pulling off all the loose bits, to make steep smooth sides which would shed the rain) afternoon cutting round Spring Meadow (cutting round the edges and corners which the horse-drawn mower had missed). Will Cooke carting dung to Upper Chick Hill heap."

"Wednesday 10th - Dry till 10 then pouring in torrents. Very cold. Fred hoeing until driven off (by rain) to thatch wood. Joe & Will Coney Banks thistles. Carter rolled, harrowed & rolled about 1 acre in 8 acres, & sowed about 3 cwt superphosphate & 1/4 cwt sulphate of ammonia, then dung carting with 2 carts."

"Friday 12th - Fine day all day. First 24 hours without rain for a long time. George Foster, self & boys turned swathes near side of Spring Meadow, shook whole with tedder & cocked up at night."

"Monday 15th - Carter cutting in near end of Front Field till noon. All hands raked over far side of Big Meadow, & shook out cocks near side. Picked up 8 rather small loads total, making 9 rather small loads in total from near side and 2 loads from far side of Big Meadow. In evening raked over Front Field. Sold Mr Smith Wadman's big steer for £19-10s, and Field's roan heifer for £16."
