#### PETT PARISH COUNCIL

Welcome to the new Pett Parish Magazinel Avril Thurley came to us earlier this year and told us about the Church's plans to change the way they disseminate their news. We were keen to make sure that the Parish kept the magazine in a similar format and develop it to encompass a wider range of news and views. Avril produced a mini business plan and I'm delighted to say that the Parish Council agreed to fund a significant part of the annual cost on behalf of the villagers.

Apart from the continuation of an important part of village life, we will be able to tell you much more about what the Parish Council is doing, which hopefully will encourage people to become more involved in the local community. Over the last couple of years we have sent out flyers on important issues such as mains drainage, facilities for younger people, and the Pett Post Office. The response we have had to these has been tremendous, particularly where we have directly asked your views in a little questionnaire.

We decided to make the magazine free to everyone in the Parish of Pett so that nobody misses out on village news and has a chance to contribute. Also, in this way the magazine will replace and improve on our flyers. This will save money; additional funding will come from adverts from local businesses, and I'm sure that many people who paid £3 a year to subscribe to the old magazine will feel able to donate a similar amount towards the cost of the new one.

My thanks to Avril, and the editors Mary Saint and Lynda Fletcher who will produce the magazine. I would encourage everyone to contribute articles and news, and I wish the new venture every success. It's for everyone in the Parish; please make the most of it!

#### What is the Parish Council?

The Parish Council is the most local form of government, and in the Parish of Pett it consists of seven members elected from the local community, and one employee, our Clerk. The Parish Council is effectively non-political and the members' time is given voluntarily. Our role is to deal with local issues such as:

Planning – we are asked by the local planning authority (Rother District Council) to comment on each and every planning application in the Parish, which covers both Pett and Pett Level. In this way we can look after the interests of villagers, and do our best to make sure that people aren't affected by inappropriate development.

Local Amenities – the Parish Council's most important asset at the moment is the Recreation Ground. We are there to make sure that it is maintained for the benefit of the villagers and that it provides the activities that people want. Money to do this and other things comes from a relatively small part (the "precept") of the Council Tax which householders pay every year.

I said that the Recreation Ground is the Council's most important asset at the moment because we hope that it will soon to be joined by a new village shop and post office. I'm sure that most people will be aware from Parish Council flyers and the Rye Observer that we are working hard to make sure that the post office in Pett isn't closed down following the sale of the garage site on which it stands. After months of effort we are close to signing contracts with the owner of the garage site, Rother District Council, and a local developer (WAC), which will provide the village with a wonderful new shop and post office, to be owned by the village for many years to come. Our business plan indicates that the income from the new building should go a very long way to paying interest on the loan we will need, so that the annual cost to the village will be small. We will "keep you posted" in this magazine.

Village Life – the Parish Council is able to provide grants for worthy causes in the local community and, apart from expenditure on providing recreational and other facilities, we have been happy to support maintenance of the local churchyard, Flicks in the Village, and the Golden Jubilee celebrations.

Rother District Council and East Sussex County Council – many of the things we take for granted such as hedge and verge cutting, roads, planning decisions and social services are dealt with by the two larger local councils. We keep in constant touch with them to make sure the Parish gets most benefit, and we work closely with them on major projects. For instance, Rother is closely involved with us in keeping the Pett Post Office open.

The Pett Parish Council meets at 7.30pm in the Village Hall on the third Tuesday of every month; please come and see us and give us your views.

#### "PICK OF THE PAST"

For nearly a century there has been a Parish Magazine in Pett. In later years it was called the "The Parish News" and incorporated the church parishes of both Pett and Guestling. It is great that the village is going to continue with tradition and produce a magazine for everyone in Pett. So what is "Pick of the Past"? For a couple of years I have been delying into old Parish Magazines to produce an article each month entitled "Paragraphs from the Past". Recently I found that about forty years ago someone tried to start a regular item in the magazine called "Pick of the Past" and I thought I would revive the title and use it in the new village magazine. Some folk may not have seen the former "Parish News" and so some of the material may be repeated in the months ahead; however it is all interesting, about the people of Pett and the ethos of this lovely place. Therefore I apologise in advance to those who have read some of this before. By the way, if anyone has any old magazines hidden away in a drawer or cupboard i would be extremely pleased and grateful for the loan of them as many gems of local history are contained in these documents.

And now for a couple of snippets from the past magazines: -

September 1946: Reg Cook in his 'Nature Notes' for that month wrote.... 'Several people have reported to me that they have seen numbers of the Crow family taking young birds from their nest and either feeding them to their own group or making a meal of them. The Crow family which includes the Raven, Carrion Crow, Rook, Jackdaw, Magpie and Jay have always carried on this sort of robbing to some extent but I think that it is a much more common practice now than it was a year or two ago. The reason for this is that the Crow family has increased tremendously during the war years owing to the fact that no one has had time or ammunition to keep down their numbers and consequently there are far too many of this species of birds in the district.

The hand of man has been against this family of birds for centuries, yet they have managed to survive, and given the chance, will thrive and this is what has happened now. They have taken advantage of the respite given to them during the war years to multiply."

September 1955: We are most grateful to Mrs C.B. Taylor and Mrs A.G.W. Barnard for the gift of the lovely corner table and vase for St Nicholas in memory of their sister Miss E.M. Sayer. And one other thank you and that I am sure from all the village, to the gentleman who climbed the Church steeple, gilded the hands of the clock and we hope gently found a new home for the sparrows that had taken up residence in the clock face.

I watched a young fox trotting across a field. He found some carrion and started to eat it, and was soon joined by a couple of magpies. The scene was like a miniature version of one of those pictures one sees of lions and vultures sharing a carcass in deepest Africa. Then a carrion crow flew down, and the fox and magpies all immediately abandoned the carrion, leaving the crow in sole possession. The fox then trotted down the field, crossed the ditch at the bottom, and came up the other side through a flock of sheep with half-grown lambs, none of whom took the slightest notice of him.

There have been a lot of hawkmoths about, although this year I didn't have my usual Elephants in the greenhouse. Instead I had a visit from a Poplar hawkmoth, which sat on a post for at least 24 hours without moving and without getting eaten by the birds. Two days later it managed to get hooked up on a cactus in the greenhouse. I rescued it, apparently uninjured and put it outside.

This year's crop of baby blue tits is giving me much pleasure. The babies are very agile from the day they are taunched, and are already quite good at using the nut feeders, unlike the young sparrows whose little wings go like helicopters as they try to hang on to the wire. Incidentally, there was a time when I was quite surprised to see a sparrow on the nuts, whereas now it's a sight I take entirely for granted. Even if you can't get out and about, you can still enjoy nature right outside your window for the price of a few peanuts and a pound or two of mixed bird seed.

The hay meadows have been full of butterfiles, especially Meadow Brown, Common Blue and Small Copper. At home in the garden, Red Admiral, Small Tortoiseshell and Comma butterfiles have been enjoying my Buddleias. This exuberant and trouble-free plant is not called the Butterfly Bush for nothing. It will grow almost anywhere, in sun or shade, and has a lovely honey scent. You can grow it from a culting and have it flowering the same year, and in the autumn you can cut it right down and let it start again next year.

Earlier this year I saw what I thought was a mummified pear in my tree. Closer inspection revealed it to be a new wasp nest. Over the weeks it has grown from golf ball size to nearly as big as a rugby ball. In view if the fact that my Victoria plums are ripening and wasps find them irresistible, I have reluctantly had them destroyed. The nest is a most beautiful piece of art, and I hope to take it to the next meeting of Pett Nats on 19<sup>th</sup> September. It really is well worth examining.

September is from the Latin "septem", meaning seven. Until 1752, New Year's Day was 25<sup>th</sup> March, so September was indeed the seventh month, as it was in the calendar of ancient Rome.

### THE VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE

With only 18 months gone by since our new village hall was opened it is a good time to reflect on the progress that has been made.

The many parishioners that drove the project forward were in no doubt about the potential for such a facility in the village and it was indeed that vision that kept us all going during the hard slog of seeking the necessary funding and overseeing the building progress. With all this in mind, it is still none the less very gratifying to witness the astonishing success of this venture.

The sheer fact that it is difficult to find an available slot when booking enquiries are made is just a measure of that success. We now have a wide and varied selection of activities available to all ages and evidence that many are taking up new interests because they are available locally. I am sure many of the groups using the hall will be using this magazine to promote themselves but at the risk of some repetition here is a brief run down of the principal users.

The playgroup continues to extend their opening hours providing the youngest users with the best care, sessions now every morning except Wednesday.

Other regular users who began in the old hall include Pett Naturalists who meet every 3<sup>rd</sup> Friday evening from September to April. Pett W.I. also meet that same Friday but in the afternoon. The doctor continues to provide a most valuable service on Monday and Friday morning. Karate is on Wednesday and Friday evenings. Badminton can be played on Wednesday mornings. The Railway Club meet on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Friday of each month, the Gardening club on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday each month. The Parish Council meet on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday each month with Keep Fit classes on Tuesday evenings. Computer classes for the time being are on Monday morning and Wednesday evening. Short Mat bowls is on Thursday afternoon and again in the evening. Yoga sessions take place on Monday evenings and Wednesday afternoons. You can brush up on your ballroom dancing on Friday afternoons and of course go to the "flicks" on the 1<sup>st</sup> Thursday of the month.

As well as the above there are of course many occasional hirers many of whom are villagers that run art exhibitions, hold parties and wedding receptions and so I feel all will agree our New Village Half is a great success but I should say will always need the dedication of a group of volunteers to keep it going, so if anyone out there feels they would like to help out there is always a welcome for you.

#### PETT SUNDAY CRICKET

27<sup>th</sup> July at Northiam: Northiam 220 for 7 declared. Pett 157 Pett lost by 63 runs

Northiam ran up a big score with only Dean Daniel who took 3-44 doing much damage. The Pett innings was dominated by a second wicket partnership of 80 between Peter Harris (28) and Timmy Hambridge, aged 14 (50), but there were 4 ducks.

3<sup>rd</sup> August at Fairlight: Fairlight 27. Pett 29 for 0 wickets
Pett won by 10 wickets

Fairlight deserved great credit in fulfilling the fixture with several of their "regulars" out and a very weak side. Their top scorer was Extras with 14, and 6 Pett bowlers shared out the wickets.

10th August at Pett: This was a 12-a-side match.

Gustavius Adolphus 175 for 8 declared. Pett 67 for 10 wickets. Match drawn

Pett bowled and fielded so well, especially another of our "boys" John Fitton who took 2 for 41 in 11 overs and Dean Daniel who bowled 10 overs in that heat, that the opposition had to bat on after tea to achieve a reasonable score. This left Pett with no alternative, once their early batsmen were out but to play for a draw. It came with a tense and dramatic last wicket partnership between Andrew Duniop, who batted in all 27 overs for his 15 not out, and 10 year old Harry O'Brien, 9 not out, who lasted for 14 overs with the fielding side all crowded round the batsmen hoping to snap up a catch. Pett's policy of encouraging the boys paying off again!

Snippets from the war or how we defeated Adolph!

Summer 1940, the Battle of Britain raging overhead, a very real threat of invasion and Pett full of troops. Pett Cricket Club arranged a match with an Army team, but we had not been playing for long before the Germans (poor sportsmen!) launched another air armada against our defences and things became both exciting and very noisy. The Sergeant in charge of the Army side said that they would have to go back to their defence positions. The only time that Pett had a match recorded as "Abandoned due to enemy action".

#### LUNSFORD FARM DIARY

Extracts from my father's diary for August 1907.

Thursday 1" - Carter & boy carting to Budds. Joe mowing grass on Toot. Mr Cooke mowing (under) top hedge Pett Barn Field, and turned trifolium. Fred & Mr Cox thatching, afternoon pulled Long Field stack. Self sold Mr Smith big roan steer £22-10s, Wadman's big red £21, Moon's roan £16, and three red heifers £15-10s, £15-5s and £14. Also 5-2yr old ewes 50/- each, 2 old ewes 40/- each, 3 young ewes 46/- each. (A farm worker's weekly wage was about 17 shillings.)

Sunday 4th - Fine bright day - only fine day for a fortnight.

Diary entries are a little sketchy for the next week, as grandfather was helping with the haymaking at Hendon and didn't return to Pett until the 10<sup>th</sup>.

Monday 12<sup>th</sup> - Fred and Joe opened up winter cets. Carter certing to Budds heap. Will Cooke and Mr Cox Pett Barn Field mangels. Regg got 43 ewes & lambs from Lower Ground to Poor Field. Afternoon all hands and 2 extra till about 3:30 cutting cets, then stopped by rain.

Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> - Carter, Joe, Fred, Mr Cox, boys & R Smith finished winter cats. Got one load from Toot & topped up marsh hay stack. Boys drove sheep to dippers. Smith had Beckly heifer & Mr Moon's roan steer.

Thursday 15th — Carter ploughing part of winter oat ground in Budds. Fred, Joe & Will off. Regg & self weaning lambs. Put 62 ewes and 1 lamb to Cliff, 25 ewes 1 teg & 1 lamb to Cloke's Marsh, 90 lambs & 1 ewe to new marsh.

Friday 16<sup>th</sup> - Carter finished ploughing for rye in Budds, rolled and harrowed. Will all day, with boy in afternoon, carting from yard to Budds heap. Self and Regg got 3 old lambs to orchard, 4 ram tegs & 5 wether tegs to catstall, leaving 5 sheep and 1 lamb.

Tuesday 20th - Carter, Dennis, Will Cooke morning carting. Afternoon Carter cut 3 Acre lucern. Mr Cooke finished carting cut dung. Dennis and self turned peas. Fred & Joe opening up wheat Upper Chick Hill and started Eastlands oats. Smith had two big beasts (cattle).

Wednesday 21<sup>st</sup> - Carter, mate, Mr Cox, Dennis, Fred, Joe, Will Cooke, Mr Eilis & boy cut Upper Chick Hill wheat, finished at 2. Carter braking in 8 Acre swedes. Mr Cox, Fred, Joe, Dennis opening up Eastlands. Mr Cooke & self turned peas.

Thursday 29th - All hands cut remainder of Lower Chick Hill, about 6 acres. Mr & Mrs Ellis cutting headlands in 5 Acres & Lower Chick Hill.

Rain was recorded on 11 days, weather improving towards the end of the month.
