RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

August was the month in which the Parishes enjoyed two of their major social functions, the Guestling Flower Festival and the Pett Church Fete. Both events were highly successful and both owe their success in large measure to the hard work of the organisers and helpers and stall-holders as well as the tremendous generosity of the parishioners and visitors. I am particularly grateful, in respect of the Flower Festival at Guestling to Mrs Eve Sankey and her flower ladies for the lovely displays of flowers and all the thought and skill which had gone into their presentation. Likewise to Mrs Ruth Saville and Mrs Margaret Macfarlane for their wonderful refreshments which they sustained in both quality and quantity throughout the three days. We are all most thankfully aware of the great generosity of those who provided them with all kinds of food and provisions throughout the festival and I would wish to thank all concerned for their work and kindness. Likewise the organists who provided live music during the festival. The festival included a special Songs of Praise and I am grateful to Guestling Choir for their part in that. The financial total was £780 and I know how delighted we were with that. Thanks to Mr John Hughes for the customary watchful eye he kept on the finances of the Festival. In respect of the Rectory Fete at Pett I was so very pleased with the event and am thankful to all those who so willingly responded to our needs. There were many very well-stocked stalls and good sideshows, lots of prizes for the raffle and several competitions. I am pleased that the new tea arrangements were well thought of we saved well over £100 by not having a marquee. The takings on the day, including donations, was in excess of £1,350 which will come in very handy when our maintenance bills start to come in. My thanks to Avril and Wilf Slack for their handling of the financial side and Mr A. Dunlop and the men who brought tables and chairs etc from the village hall to the Rectory.

The sudden change in the weather is a salient reminder that Autumn has really arrived and with it the thoughts of the onset of Winter and all that will mean for the churches' calendars.

We shall shortly be celebrating Harvest Festivals, a local reminder of God's faithfulness and goodness to us. We are

only too well aware of the amount of hard work which goes to making for a good harvest. Over the past weeks we have seen our local farmers busy from dawn to dusk in the fields. This is the conclusion of months of work, patience, care and some anxiety. A good harvest is always at the mercy of the weather. Even when safely gathered in a satisfactory financial outcome depends heavily upon the prices of world markets. The harvest produced locally does not have the destination it would have had years ago when it would have been bought by local grain merchants and millers and the flour, barley and oats used in bakeries, breweries, and provender mills of the locality and consumed by those living in neighbouring villages. We now produce our harvest for a world market and for better or worse the prosperity of our farmers is tied in with a much wider and more complex trading system.

There are many references to harvests in the New Testament. Jesus certainly sees the world as God's harvest, the people as the precious grain He yearns to gather in. Jesus places this task into the hands of the disciples accompanied by warnings about the urgency attached to the task. In St John ch 4 v 35 we read these words; "Do you not say there are yet four months and then comes the harvest? I tell you, lift up your eyes and see how the fields are already white for harvest." Jesus was obviously speaking of the harvest of people. We are reminded of two important things. The harvest will not wait for the harvesters until they are ready. It will ripen, go past its best, then rot and be lost if reapers are not found. The harvest is an ongoing process. In agriculture it comes round year after year. On many farms where a variety of crops are grown harvesting of one sort or another lasts many months. The Mission of the Church is also a never ending task. It requires men and women, it requires resources, spiritual and financial, to put and keep reapers in the field. It requires the strong back-up of other Christians not themselves actively involved in the work but supportive of the work by their prayers and work in their local parishes. I wish to stress here the importance of this work in our own parishes. We have our own Missionary representatives on C.M.S. in Hastings and in the local Deanery Overseas Group. We have a Missionary Committee of members of the joint Parishes of Guestling and Pett. They keep the activities and the needs of missionaries before us, in particular the activities of Timothy and Frances Britton, our link missionaries.

Like the world harvest of grain etc where a much more complex marketing system exists, similarly in the Christian Mission a much more complex and often sensitive situation exists heightened as it so often is by political and cultural factors as well as the presence of other world religions.

These factors have always been there, but are now much more widespread with the shifting of populations exemplified clearly by the presence of a multi-racial, multi-religious society in our midst in this land. A missionary situation clearly exists at home as well as abroad, the needs are much more varied and the resources and understandings have to meet them if a realistic mission is to exist. Speaking of resources, and needs, any Christian mission must include a ministry to men's total needs, not simply to their spiritual needs. This means that among the missionaries there must be agriculturalists, doctors, engineers, nurses, dieticians, scientists and many more professions.

When our thoghts turn to underdeveloped countries we are reminded of the great differentials which exist between North and South. Harvest time is a time when this especially hits us. In some measure we meet the challenge by our local giving to mission in ways of which you will, I hope, be aware. Let us always keep those needs before us and the work of those in the missionary societies in our prayers.
