RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

I was fortunate enough to be able to attend a course at Crowhurst Old Rectory, a Home of Healing. The course was designed for clergy and doctors and was conducted by The Rev! d David Howell, Director of Crowhurst. The very fact that the course was for clergy and doctors reflects at once the firmly held fact that there is a very important interaction between our bodies and our souls. The well-being of one affects the well-being of the other. We are so familiar with the fact that stress, worry, sadness etc., take their toll upon our physical stamina and can actually cause as well as aggravate adverse physical conditions. We do tend to see our bodies and souls as separate entities, the well-being of one being the domain of the doctor, the well-being of the other being the domain of the priest. Yet experience of both shows that these domains often cross and what we thought was a physical condition bringing us low, turns out to be the result of some present or past spiritual condition which has caught up on us and taken us by surprise. The contrary can also be the case, as indeed a mixture of physical and spiritual problems which really forms the basis of pastoral visits by the clergy in times of sickness. His ministry undergirds all that the doctor is doing for you with surgery and medicine.

Now if we turn to the life and ministry of Jesus we find that healing occupies a good deal of Jesus' time and energy. When we were young we may be forgiven for thinking that Jesus performed miracles of healing to prove His Divine origin and to enhance His reputation. This does not fit in at all well with His character and ministry for in respect of "mighty works" Jesus often tried to keep them secret. In several cases of healing, Jesus told the onlookers (if any) and the healed person not to tell anyone. The healing was a matter between Jesus, the sick person and God. It is also true that the healings which Jesus performed, brought about a new relationship with life. For the sick, whether blind, deaf, dumb, leper, lame, maimed, or however afflicted, the cure opened up a completely renewed and restored way of life. Restoration to health enabled the person to take up their lives again hearing, conversing, working and earning their living. Selfrespect was restored with material and physical well-being.

In the case of the leper ostracised by society, a whole new lease of life was given. In short, the person became whole again. Wholeness is really the key to Christian healing. Healing means far more than the curing of a physical ailment though this may well be involved. Lack of wholeness may take many forms; it may be some physical illness, it may be the belief that we have some physical illness, when we are really perfectly well. It may be that we have some very bad memories of childhood, or any of the years between then and now. It may be that we have some guilt, some negligence, some sin, which we have not confessed, or which, having confessed, we cannot accept that we are forgiven. These dreadful weights we take around with us are lowering in the extreem and release from them is an integral part of our healing (wholeness). We know only too well how our state of mind can make us feel rotten too, and with our minds "put at rest" can also come a sense of physical well-being.

In the case of physical healing through surgery or medicine, we know that we must be prepared for the medicine to be ineffective or the surgery to be of no avail. We also know, however, that the state of mind in which we approach both is very important. If we approach with a positive and co-operative spirit this can often compliment the physical changes which drugs and surgery can bring about. If we approach them with an extremely pessimistic attitude that can actually militate against our healing. There is therefore a spiritual (psychological) as well as a physical aspect to our healing. Equally so, the mainstream of Christian healing places very great importance upon the work of medical science. It is God's will that people are whole, complete and well; the work of Jesus makes this clear. It is also true that He had given to men and women the skill to develop medicine and surgery to play a major role in the bringing of wholeness. God has given His church a commission to play an important part in the healing process by the laying on of hands, the Holy Communion and the Annointing of the sick and, we must not forget it, the Sacrament of Penance (Confession and Absolution). There are many scriptural references to healing in the Bible, some which refer to the God-given skill of doctors and pharmicists; others which give clear authority to the Church to play a part in healing. It is therefore in response to these Biblical texts, especially those which deal with the practice of the early Church, that the Healing Ministry of the Church has been revived and is practised.

Next month I will say a little more about the ministry of healing. In the meantime, I would like to wish you all a very Happy and Blessed Easter.

STORM DAMAGE REPAIR AT GUESTLING

I am grateful to Mr. Fisher who has looked after the arrangements for work on the main part of the roof to be carried out. He is presently involved in arrangements for repair to the tower. Having been advised by the roofing contractor and the Architect that the entire tower roof is in need of repair, we are taking steps to execute this work at a projected cost of £4,670 plus V.A.T. It seems good sense to do the work now, since scaffolding is needed in the case of repair or complete restoration and it is better to "grasp the nettle" than to do repairs now and pay scaffolding charges and in a few years' time repeat the process, paying scaffolding charges again.

Naturally this work will put great pressure on our resources and we shall appreciate any donations please.

SYNODICAL GOVERNMENT

Many people switch off when they hear these words, probably because they have only a hazy idea as to what it is and how it works. In order to give ordinary members a say in how the Church is run, a system of representation has been introduced which can be compared roughly with that of local and national government. At the A.G.M. of the Parish Church, the members of the Electoral Roll elect the Parochial Church Council to look after the affairs of the local church, plus two or three representatives for the Deanery (or district) Synod - in our case, Rye. In turn, the Deanery elects three lay and three clerical members to represent it on the Diocesan (or county) Synod. General (national) Synod members, (a given number from each Diocese), are also chosen by members of the Deanery Synod. In a diocese like ours, which covers both East and West Sussex, we in Rye cannot possible know all the candidates, but we are fortunate in having a local member, Dss. Dr. Una Kroll. It is the General Synod's decisions which hit the headlines, but they are supposed to reflect the views of us in the parishes, deaneries and dioceses.
