LIFE AFTER DEATH

I write as we try to come to terms with the Dunblane massacre. Nothing has so deeply touched the soul of our nation for many years. We struggle to deal with the pointless evil that destroyed such young lives and their teacher. Much has been said, although words seem totally inadequate. We have stood with the shattered community in prayer and deep-felt emotion.

Easter is with us early in this month. The Spring has been delayed this year, but the signs are with us. The message is of hope and new life. Our secularised, rational, materialistic society scorn us talking about "the resurrection of Jesus" from the dead and the certainty of our Christian hope of "life after death". Interestingly Christian Aid decided on the slogan "We believe in life before death". I see the point, but I affirm that "Christ is indeed risen, and is the first of those who have fallen asleep" (to rise like him and live the resurrection life). We do believe in life after death. Just now this may be a limited comfort to those who have lost their little ones, but we have no doubt they are safe with Jesus. We will affirm this belief, praying that we nil may know the experience that "nothing will separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord".

"Life after death" is the very essence of Christianity. Sometimes life becomes unbearable, but through the love and grace of God, we can discover this "resurrection" life. Jesus always promises us that "the best is yet to be". Many can testify that faith has transformed their lives. St John records Jesus' words in his Gospel "Whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life, he has crossed over from death to life". (John 5:24)

If Christianity has anything to offer Britain in these immediate "post-Dunblane" days, surely it must be that evil can never finally overcome goodness. In the very last analysis the victory is with Jesus who offers eternal life to all who believe and trust in Him. These are the days to grasp with hope and faith that there is "life after death". Hallelujah!

Bob Davis was one of those exceptional people who will be remembered for many different activities which were always aimed at improving the life of the community. His boyhood was spent at Gatehurst Farm Pett and he attended a little school which was held at the Royal Oak and run by one of the Miss Lloyd-Worths. In his early years Bob was a farmer, concentrating on building up a herd of Friesians, firstly with his father at Salehurst and later, after his marriage to Daphne, at Guestling. During this time Bob was very involved in the community in many ways. He was leader of the Young Farmers' Club, the Bowls Club and the Badminton Club. He was from time to time Chairman of all these organisations as well as being founder of the Badminton Club. He was also Chairman of the Guestling Village Hall Committee until last year. He was also Treasurer of the Battle Combined Society which raised money for sports clubs, TV licences for old people's homes and Christmas parcels for the elderly. He will be best remembered for his involvement, with Daphne, in the conception, planning and development of Five Villages House. After their 'retirement' Bob and Daphne took on the onerous task of wardens at Five Villages House. With his enthusiasm for fund raising Bob started the draw to raise funds for Five Villages House and this became a major part of his life. In addition he ran regular whist drives at the House and at the lcklesham Memorial Hall. Bob's passing will leave a gap in many people's lives and he will be greatly missed. Our prayers are with Daphne and the family. May he rest and grow in peace.

NATURE NOTES

Wasn't the snow beautiful? The wind sculpted it into the most fantastic shapes, like breaking waves. Then, when the snow melted, quite suddenly we were surrounded by crocuses, snowdrops and even primroses. If you have a hand lens, it's well worth looking inside snowdrops and other tiny flowers. The intricate patterns and delicate colours on the tiny petals and stamens are a source of wonder - why are they so perfect, so symmetrical, so stunningly beautiful? It often seems that the smaller the flower, the more perfect it is.

Sometimes you may see a line of holly bushes, all but one of which have been stripped of their berries. This could well be because a mistle thrush is defending the berried one as his feeding territory. You may see him on a wild and windy day, singing his heart out from the highest available perch; hence his other name of "storm cock".

My blackbird appeared on the kitchen doorstep the other day on one leg. He made it quite clear that his only hope of survival was a constant supply of currants, which of course were immediately forthcoming. He didn't appear to be much handicapped by his mishap, except that he had to use a wing to balance himself while picking up the currants. He has now started using the injured leg again, somewhat tentatively, so hopefully he will make a full recovery with a little help from his friends.

IN MEMORIAM

The funeral of the later Canon Peter Harvey was held at St Mary's, Rye (a Requiem and thanksgiving service). Peter was well-known in this Deanery having latterly served at Brede. The obituary in the Church Times mentions his long and effective ministry. Born in Wales and ordained in Monmouth he moved to England in 1946. He became an editor of a series of popular and ambitious magazines. His writing prowess continued even in retirement and after a debilitating stroke, working on the stories of popular hymns. A book on that subject is to be published later in the year, and we have featured his articles regularly in our magazine.

Canon John Heston wrote "it was however in Sussex that Peter's parochial Ministry developed and in 1979 he was appointed to a prebendal stall in Chichester Cathedral (made a Canon). As a pilgrimage leader he formed the Church Pilgrimage Association, once leading a pilgrimage of 300 to the Holy Land".

Peter was married to Vivienne, by whom he had six children. After her death he married Betty, and recently they have lived in Fairlight, to whom we convey our deep sympathies. He was in his 80th year when he died, remembered warmly by many in the Benefice.

In the past we have published Canon Peter's pages on favourite hymns. This is in place of the April issue, but we hope to include others in the future.
