

ROBIN WRITES

A POWER FAILURE

We have become very used to throwing the switch and having a surge of power. Some years ago my previous car had an electrical fault and it kept breaking down. Sometimes I could start the engine and at other times it would go dead on me. One occasion after going visiting, I was at the other side of the parish. I had a lot of work to do and could not start the car. I had to call out the garage, and it took me a long time to walk to my calls and get back home. I remember feeling hot and bothered and very frustrated. A "power failure" makes you feel that way.

The Church has all the pieces in place; a long tradition, the ordained clergy, the ordered institution, many buildings, but it so often seems to be suffering from a "power failure". After the resurrection Jesus told his disciples this: "Wait for the gift my Father promised. You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes to me and you will be my witnesses". It is significant that Christmas is a time when all the churches are filled. Easter has extra visitors, but WHITSUN nearly always passes with little mention and interest. Paul, early in the story of the Church, met some Christians who also seemed to lack "power". He asked them "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?" They answered "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit".

Sadly many churches are in that position. No wonder there is a "power failure" in many of them. We need to know that our loving Heavenly Father does not deny any good gift from us. Read Luke 11:13 "If we who are evil know how to give good gifts to our children, how much more will our Father in Heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask!" We should both ask and receive. Look out for the special services and events around Whit Sunday and come prepared to receive the gift. The Alpha Course has a suggested weekend away to deal with the subject of the Holy Spirit. On Whit Saturday some of us will be sharing at the Oasts Centre in Ewhurst. On Whit Sunday afternoon we will complete our learning and experience at St Peter's, Fairlight. Join us at 6.00 pm for a special service to share the Spirit. Many have asked for a "together" service again. It would be lovely to have members of each church present at this service.

A loan from IDET enabled the Asto family to buy a lathe, a chain saw and some wood to start a chair-making business. The proceeds help to feed and educate the family, which means that they can live independently and retain their dignity, whilst providing their children with a chance of a better future.

8 NATURE NOTES

When I first saw the Comet I was disappointed; it just looked like a rather fuzzy star. Then I looked at it through my binoculars - and I was spellbound! It had a brilliant light whirling round it, making loops and irregular patterns, and I was so excited that I continued watching it until I had frozen fingers and a crick in the neck. It would be wonderful to see it through a really big telescope. I think I could get hooked on astronomy.

On 3 April at midday I saw a fox pass through a field of sheep with very young lambs. Most of the ewes took no notice, though some to whom he was closest called their lambs and watched him warily. The fox completely ignored the sheep. Two days later I walked through the same field with a friend's dog, on the lead of course. The sheep parted before us like the Red Sea before the Israelites, regrouped behind us, and watched us with much anxious baaing until we crossed the stile out of the field. I have seen foxes pass through fields of sheep before, always without causing panic, and it seems to me that this says something about the relative dangers to sheep from foxes and dogs - at least as perceived by the sheep themselves.

If you are waiting with bated breath to hear what happened to my blackbird, you will be relieved to know that he has made a full recovery from his leg injury. His latest escapade was to hop into the greenhouse through the door, which was only open about six inches, and then try to fly out through the same gap. He then panicked and crashed round the greenhouse bashing his head on the glass till I went and rescued him. He seems none the worse for the experience. I suspect his skull is fairly thick both literally and metaphorically.

ALPHA by Mary Ewen

Mary a young student at university, is known to Michael Townroe. He thought this article in her parish magazine would be of general interest.

EXCITING, CHALLENGING, REVITALISING, these are just a few words to describe Alpha. For those of you who have not yet heard of it, Alpha is a 10 week course which examines the foundations of the Christian faith. Personally I didn't realise such a thing existed until fairly recently but in fact the course was devised some 17 years ago when a clergyman began looking for a means of presenting the basic principles of the Christian faith to new Christians in a relaxed and informal setting.

They are mostly evening courses which begin with a meal, followed by a talk on topics such as Who is Jesus? Why did Jesus die? How does God guide us? etc ... then, in true Christian style, there is a break for coffee after which we separate into small groups to discuss the topic although the discussion often leads to many other issues concerning Christianity People are encouraged to be open and ask whatever questions they like. The course also includes a weekend away on the subject of the Holy Spirit.

Alpha began with a few people meeting in someone's living room but today courses are being run by almost every Christian denomination in Britain and around 45,000 people are estimated to be involved with an Alpha course somewhere in the country each week. It doesn't stop in the UK, courses are beginning in places like Australia, the USA, Germany and Kenya to name but a few. It is also being introduced into prisons and homeless projects.

Impressed? I was I began my Alpha course 5 weeks ago and it is absolutely brilliant. I was bit sceptical at first having been a Christian for some time. I expect most of you are thinking "if I'm already part of the church I don't need a course like this" but believe me you couldn't be more wrong. Being a Christian does not mean you know all the answers. There is always something new you can learn about God

Being a Christian isn't easy but each week Alpha strengthens my faith and reassures me of God's love. It has given me the chance to meet new people outside University and make friends within my new church. To others it is an opportunity to introduce friends to Christianity and share with them about their faith. We have around 150 people each week and I was really surprised and encouraged to see how many were non-Christians. People from all sorts of backgrounds come wanting to find out more about Jesus.

It's not just an excellent way of reaching out to the community, it brings the church itself closer together. There are many ways in which you can get involved; administration, helping with catering, leading a discussion group or simply contributing to the discussions.

Many people have come to faith through these courses. They certainly give you a chance to consider just where God fits into your life. I believe it is important for those of us who are Christians to be questioned about this sometimes as often we push Him to one side as we become preoccupied with what's going on in our lives.

The growth of the Alpha course is extremely exciting and is being halled by church leaders of all denominations as one of the most significant developments of the Decade of Evangelism. As Christians we are always in need of renewal, as Christians we are called to spread the Gospel message to others. If we are aiming to make our society a better place and to bring people back to God then I truly believe Alpha is a great way forward.
