BENEFICE BLESSINGS

Following the LENT HOME MEETINGS on the Pastoral Letter sent by Bishop Ian to the parishes, a 'Benefice' meeting was called on 30 April. There was a summary of the findings of the groups, and then a discussion followed. The Rector, Robin, then outlined his thoughts about the future.

His ideas were based on the views of the C of E Officer for the Decade of Evangelism, Canon Robert Warren. In response to the Bishop's Lambeth Conference of 1988 and the launch of the Decade of Evangelism, he suggests that the Church must move from a PASTORAL MODE to a MISSIONARY MODE. He said that the traditional view of the Church was that it equalled:

BUILDINGS + PRIEST + STIPEND

he wants us to rethink and base our new concept of the Church on

COMMUNITY + FAITH + ACTION

Robin's idea was that we could have a FOUR YEAR PLAN for the Benefice where the three churches would work in parallel with each other encouraging, supporting and sharing where possible. He suggested that the four years would be:

1) COMMUNITY YEAR (1997)

A look at the community and how the churches were serving it, and as a part of this year listening to others and to God and to bring changes on the basis of what we learned.

2) FAITH YEAR (1998)

This would be a year to learn more about our faith and also to increase. The suggestion was that more INPUT would be given to the churches and that we should expect more OUTPUT from them, as a part of the community where each is placed.

3) ACTION YEAR (1999)

This would be a year when ideas would be turned into action. We would want to meet the community by visiting them where they were. We would also invite them to discover a church that really cared. We would be prepared to rethink our approach to be of greatest help to those around us, and to help increase their faith as well as ours.

4) CELEBRATION YEAR (2000)

This year we would really enjoy ourselves in joy and celebration. Remembering Jesus' birth 2000 years (or so) ago.

JOHN ROOTES (1921-1996)

The funeral of John Rootes was conducted at Guestling Church by the Revd Robin Balch with the eulogy given by Mr John Springford. John left instructions for his funeral which were carried out as he wished.

John was well known in Guestling and Pett; a Guestling man all his life, born at Bachelor's Bump. Latterly with Beryl, his wife, lived on Chick Hill, at 'October', Pett Road and then in Rectory Park. for many years he sang in Pett choir and was also a member of Guestling choir when younger. Widely known as a painter, he loved to paint the Romney Marshes and was known as the 'Marsh' painter. He belonged to East Sussex Artists and often exhibited at the Stables. Some years ago the Queen Mother on a trip to East Sussex admired his paintings. For many years he donated money for an art prize to Guestling School.

He was by occupation a motor mechanic with the Post Office and during the war was a driver in the West Country for the RAF. He was a great supporter of village functions, especially the Pett Flower Show and the Church Fete helping Beryl with many of her activities. On the loss of his wife a few years ago, his health began to deteriorate. He found it difficult living on his own and was very poorly at the end.

He will be remembered with great affection by family and friends. His paintings will always bring joy to all who own them and a constant reminder of his talent and life in this area.

NATURE NOTES

Ambling along Pannel Lane looking at wildflowers, I startled a sparrowhawk which flew up leaving its prey - a blue tit. I kept walking till I got to the next bend in the lane, then stopped and waited, but the hawk didn't return. Other interesting sightings this month - regrettably not seen by me - were a duck with no less than 16 babies seen at Pett Level, and two fox cubs playing together. I would particularly have liked to have seen the fox cubs, as I think they are among the most enchanting of all wild creatures.

Sometimes when you are weeding your borders you may come across a seedling which you don't recognise. It's worth leaving it to develop further, as it may be a 'present from the birds' which will make a welcome addition to your garden. I have a lovely purple geranium which arrived in that way.

I heard the cuckoo on 19 April, and have only heard it once since then. Martins, too, are few and far between. Perhaps they are just late arriving. The wood anemones were very late this year, but are now like snow on the ground in Guestling Wood. Primroses on the other hand have been flowering for weeks, and I recently found the biggest clump I've ever seen; I counted over 100 flowers before being distracted by a green woodpecker flying close by.

Blackbird is now being run ragged by two well-grown youngsters. They follow him into the kitchen, get themselves trapped in the greenhouse and generally seem to have picked up all their father's bad habits. In contrast, the pair of fat, rather solemn baby thrushes who help me with my gardening have perfect manners and never cause me or themselves a moment's worry.

'The Church's One Foundation'

THE WINDSOR CURATE'S FIRM FOUNDATION

CANON HARVEY'S FAVOURITE HYMNS AND THEIR STORIES

DR. WINNINGTON INGRAM, Bishop of London for close on 30 years in the first part of our Century, used to say that he had lived on a diet of cold chicken and one particular hymn for as long as he could remember. He meant of course that his frequent Confirmation Services took him to many vicarages for supper and that, almost without exception, the last hymn would be *'The Church's one foundation'*.

I SUPPOSE ONE can have too much of a good thing, even with episcopal suppers and hymns, but the good Bishop's experience did pay tribute to the remarkable popularity of a fine hymn which first appeared in 1836, (in some 7 verses). The author was, at the time, a Curate at Windsor, a zealous and enthusiastic churchman who went on to become a well known figure of his day as Rector of All Hallows-on-the-Wall in the City and a noted hymnographer, a member of the first Committee of *'Hymns Ancient and Modern'*. His most famous hymn was written as a contribution to quite a famous theological controversy of the period. In South Africa Bishop Colenso of Natal was thought to have preached heresy by questioning some of the basic biblical and traditional doctrines of the Church. Ranged against Bishop Colenso was his Brother South African Bishop Gray of Cape Town and our Windsor Curate, much admiring and applauding the latter's defence of orthodoxy, wrote *'The Church's one foundation'* as a tribute to him.

THE OBVIOUS REFERENCE to the dispute comes in verse 3 of the original -

*'The Church shall never perish
Her dear Lord, to defend
To guide, sustain and cherish
Is with her to the end
Though there be those who hate her
And false sons in her pale
Against or foe or traitor
She ever shall prevail'*

The first part of verse 4 (verse 3 in today's hymnal) obviously goes on to refer to the dispute also - *'Though with a scornful wonder men see her sore oppressed By schisms rent asunder, by heresies distressed'*.

IT WAS USED as the processional in Westminster Abbey at the opening Service of the first Lambeth Conference in 1867. It is a remarkably fine hymn, whatever its original motive, and has been taken by the whole Church everywhere as part and parcel of our regular worship, not only at Confirmations. It has the genius of expressing basic Christian teaching in a concise yet simple and dignified way -

*'Elect from every nation yet one o'er
all the earth
Her charter of salvation, One Lord,
one Faith, one Birth'
and
'Yet she on earth hath union with
God the Three in One
And mystic sweet communion with
those whose rest is won
O happy ones and holy, Lord give
us grace that we
Like them the meek and lowly, on
high may dwell with thee'*

HAVING GOT THUS far it is more than time for me to reveal the name of the clergyman who gave us this lovely hymn - Samuel John Stone born 1839 and died on 1900 in 19th November. So far as I know there has only ever been one generally accepted tune for Stone's words - it is called *'Aurelia'* and was composed by the great S.S. Wesley, originally it seems for *'Jerusalem the golden'*. The most inspiring rendering I have experienced was in Detroit, Michigan, when I attended the General Synod (they call it Convention) of the Episcopal (i.e. Anglican) Church in the USA. They sang it as a processional whilst all the delegates literally *'marched'* in at a really rollicking pace at about twice the speed I have ever heard it sung in England!
