ROBIN WRITES:

HOLD ON TO THE FAITH

For my daily reading I have just read Jude v20, which has the words "Build yourselves up in your most holy faith". This month we see THREE OF THE MOST SIGNIFICANT DAYS in the Church's calendar, namely ASCENSION DAY, WHITSUNDAY (or Pentecost) and TRINITY SUNDAY. We are well familiar with the word "HOLIDAY", in which we delight (not least Eileen and myself, as we have our summer break this month!). The word obviously comes from "HOLY DAY". The country had time off work to focus on the key days of faith, that became "Holy Days". Ascension Day can pass, even in the Christian calendar virtually unnoticed, as it is on a Thursday. It is no longer a holiday, although traditionally Church schools used to have a service in the local Church and the children were given the rest of the day off. The "Whitsun" holiday, has now become the May Bank Holiday. Trinity has been swallowed up by the new ASB Service book, which has now Sundays after Pentecost rather than Trinity! How these three central facets of our faith need reaffirming and "holding" with conviction.

Ascension - the Ascension declares that the work of our Lord Jesus Christ is a "Finished Work". He has returned to God the Father and he reigns in heaven awaiting the Day He will come again. He now ever lives to represent us before the Father, and plead our cause before Him. It would be good if wherever we are on 8 May we might acknowledge the Lordship of Christ in our lives, and prepare ourselves for His return.

Pentecost - this year Whitsunday is on 18 May, the Sunday of the month when there will be a Communion at each Church in the Benefice as its main service. This will be good. Originally committed Anglicans were encouraged always to be at His Table at Christmas, Easter and Pentecost, even if they missed at other times. Also on this day the informal Praise and Worship will be held at St Peter's in the evening "Where the Spirit is there is freedom". It would be a joy if many from the Benefice made a special effort to attend this service.

Trinity Sunday - falls on 25 May. The Benefice Standing Committee has asked that we have a BENEFICE UNITED SERVICE in the afternoon at 3.00 pm on this day to demonstrate our oneness in Christ. It will need a special effort on a holiday weekend, but please try to be with us outside St Nicholas, Pett Level to witness the Faith!

Have happy HOLY DAYS this year.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 1997 11 - 17 MAY

'Freedom to live' is the theme of Christian Aid Week 1997, which focuses on India as it celebrates 50 years of independence.

Although this 'freedom' is a cause for celebration, the relief and development work done overseas is still vital. It helps some of the poorest people in the world - people like 12 year old Moti.

Moti lives in the slums of Raipur, South India. He shares a one room house with his brother, sisters and parents. They have no electricity, toilet or running water. Moti has to work to help feed his family. He is a shoe-shiner, and walks up to 8 miles a day looking for customers, earning about 30p a day.

Moti's parents believe education is the key to improving their children's lives, but they cannot afford for Moti not to work. However, Moti recently started going to evening classes, and a playtime in the park on Sundays. Both were set up by a committee which is run by local people to improve the lives of child labourers. They are planning to offer food to families who put their children into full time education, to make up for lost wages. This work is funded by an annual grant from Christian Aid.

Christian Aid Week gives us a chance to assist projects such as this. We start with a **Coffee Morning** at Paxstead, Pett Road (opposite Pett Recreation Ground) from 10.00 am - 12.00 noon on **Saturday 10 May** with raffle, bring and buy, plants and a sale of Traidcraft goods (fairly traded products from poorer countries); there will also be an opportunity during the morning to see a short video illustrating some of Christian Aid's work. We hope loads of people will come to make it a happy social occasions as well as a good fundraiser.

Following that, during Christian Aid Week itself, there will be house-to-house money collections in Guestling and Pett.

If the experience of previous years is repeated, we know that local generosity will mean a wonderful response; please be assured that whatever support you can give will be warmly appreciated and put to good use.

REMEMBERING SEAFARERS ON SEA SUNDAY – JULY 13TH

Seafarers spend most of their working lives isolated at sea, away from their homes, families, and the community ashore. While they may be out of sight, they play a vital part in all our lives whether we live near the sea, or miles inland.

In fact we depend on seafarers for many of our daily needs - petrol for our cars and much of the food we eat are just two examples.

To do their vital jobs, seafarers not only face long periods cut off from the shore. Their work can be dangerous and when they reach port they are often "strangers", faced with an alien culture and an unfamiliar language.

The Missions to Seamen, a missionary society of the Anglican

Church, offers a welcome and friendship to these "strangers" on your behalf. Working through a network of chaplains and staff in ports throughout the world, we visit crews on their ships, and run centres where seafarers can relax ashore, meet people from the local community, worship in the chapel, and get help with any kind of problem.

We are at work 365 days a year, providing practical and spiritual support for seafarers of all nationalities and creeds. Once a year, on Sea Sunday, we ask you to remember seafarers and their families in your prayers, and to support the caring work that The Missions to Seamen does on behalf of the whole Church.

Early in the morning of 29 March I put up a snipe in a field near Pannel Lane. It flew very fast in zigzags, the aerial equivalent of a hare jinking. Most of our summer migrants are back with us now, although some, like the spotted flycatchers, are always late arrivals. You can attract flycatchers to your garden by putting up a nest box, similar to a tit box but with an open front. In my garden they have also nested in a low gutter just inches from a hanging basket which was watered every day. I've heard of birds nesting actually in hanging baskets, but I don't know how they manage when the basket is watered; perhaps they like having an en suite shower.

On Easter Monday I took part in a walk on the South Downs. It was a bit early for cowslips, but there were lots of violets, and the skylarks were pure joy. This is one of the once-common species now suffering a worrying decline, though the RSPB is doing its best to remedy the situation - surely a cause worth supporting.

The glorious but unseasonable weather at the end of March brought my four fruit trees (apple, plum, cherry and pear) into blossom at the same time. This is the first time I can recall this happening. It was noticeable too that all the different types of daffodil and narcissi flowered simultaneously, which certainly made for a spectacular show.

No doubt we've all been comet-watching. What a pity such a beautiful celestial visitor was given such a boring name! When you think of the speed at which it is moving, and yet it hardly seems to move in the sky, you get some idea of the immense distance involved. Awesome, isn't it?

CHURCH ANNUAL MEETINGS

Both Guestling and Pett Churches had their Annual Meetings last month, on 10 and 15 April.

For Guestling it was a matter of "no change" as last year's elections were for three years. This included the Deanery Representatives (Derek and Kath Greenwood) and the members of the PCC who will serve until 1999. Derek Greenwood was also appointed as the PCC representative on the new scheme for the ROBERT BRADSHAW (SCHOOL) TRUST which is about to be sealed by the Charity Commission. Ken Tytherleigh and Margaret Barnett were reelected as Churchwardens for the coming year. Thanks were expressed for the faithful service over the past year.

For Pett Parish Church the Annual Meeting again elected Angela Hawksley and Meriel Deasy to serve for another year as Churchwardens. The PCC is elected each year and a strong council was elected for the coming year. Namely: Joan Zeepvat, Catherine Hollman, Chris Harris, Doreen Goodsell, John Taylor, Phyllis Gerrelli, Bernard Dibble, Joan Medlock, Tom Clarkson, Frances Taylor, Beryl Vick and Muriel Turner. Eileen Balch (Reader) and Canon Michael co-opted. Deanery Representatives Bill and Gladys Cooper.

The Electoral Rolls are now Pett - 68 and Guestling - 64 (with Fairlight - 148 the Benefice total is now 280). Both meetings report a satisfactory year. The Treasurers announced healthy surpluses of income over expenditure. However, there are building works to be done at both churches. Guestling is hoping to build a toilet into the tower area. Pett needs pointing to the walls, but the lack of funds is delaying the work. The stained glass window needs extensive repairs, but unless the church finds grants or gifts, there is no chance of this being undertaken in the near future.

The Rector referred to the LISTENING YEAR. Questionnaires are being prepared for congregations and communities. He asked members of the Churches to seriously consider attending the QUIET DAY on 7 June. Brochures are in all the Churches. John Ford is visiting the Churches again on 19 October when there will be a shared lunch at Guestling Village Hall followed by a discussion and a United Service at Guestling Church in the afternoon.

PETT PARISH PUMP

The Parish Assembly was much better supported this year, no doubt partly due to the eye-catching notices (thank you Charlotte) and also because the subject, Traffic Calming Measures, was of particular interest to many parishioners. Mr Graham Furness, Divisional Highways Engineer with ESCC, gave a very informative talk, illustrated with slides showing various methods of calming traffic. He said that before any measures could be taken, a survey had to be carried out to find out just how fast traffic is actually going, since pedestrians tend to over-estimate while motorists under-estimate their speed. He also said that ESCC has no money at present, so don't hold your breath! However, the Parish Council will keep the matter under review, so that when finance is available plans will have been agreed and be ready for action.

The Council Chairman, Andrew Dunlop, in his annual report thanked some of the people who have given service to the Parish over the past year. It is always perilous to list names, because as sure as God made little apples someone will be forgotten, but there are two people who particularly deserve the thanks of parishioners. One is our Postmaster, Tony, who allows the Post Office to be used as a repository for Planning Applications and assorted information leaflets. The other is Mr Eric Newton, who for many years has kept an expert eye on the Parish's stiles and gates. He has made several of them himself - you can tell by the star cut into the wood, and by the fact that you don't get splinters when Eric has been on the job!

You may have noticed that the big slide has now gone from the Recreation Ground. The new equipment, which will cater for a wider age range, should be installed within the next month or so, in plenty of time for the Summer holidays.

There will be an exhibition in Chichester Cathedral in May of tapestries created by Ursula Benker-Schirmer. The Dean and Chapter commissioned Ursula Benker-Schirmer to design and make a tapestry which would enhance the area behind St Richard's altar in the retrochoir. The symbols and colours of the design reflect the joy of creation and the glory and light which the Christian gospel brings, and incorporates specific references to the life and works of St Richard of Chichester. The central panel was woven in Marktreidwitz and the outer panels at West Dean College in Sussex. The retrochoir is where the ashes of George Bell (Bishop, 1920-58) are interred. He did much to foster relations with the Lutheran Church in Germany and in particular with Dietrich Bonhoeffer. The link is perpetuated today through continued friendship with the Church in Berlin and Bavaria. The tapestry is dedicated to these two former Bishops of Chichester and symbolises the ongoing process of reconciliation and peace.

NEW DIOCESAN OFFICIALS

This summer sees a new BISHOP OF LEWES and a new ARCHDEACON of LEWES and HASTINGS.

BISHOP WALLACE BENN

Wallace is to be consecrated as Bishop on 1 May. Our first chance to meet him will be his introduction at CARITAS at ARDINGLY SHOW GROUND on SATURDAY 21 JUNE. (We have booked a coach for this, please record your name on the list in the back of the Church).

Wallace has been a member of the Council of "REFORM". Reform is the "Evangelical" equivalent of "Forward in Faith" the Anglo/Catholic Organisation formed after the vote to allow the ordination of Women to the Priesthood. Reform has objected to the ordination of women to ultimate leadership in the Church on the principle of "Headship" which is taught in the New Testament. Reform has moved on to make a challenge of the Church of England based on biblical principles and has considerably widened its base. Wallace's appointment gives due weight to the influence of "Classical" Evangelicalism within the contemporary Anglican Church. He has recently been the Vicar of St Peter's, Harold Wood. It is a very well known and influential Conservative Evangelical Church. He is much respected in evangelical circles, and I am sure will bring a powerful ministry among us in days to come.

CANON NICHOLAS READE will take up his role as Archdeacon in August. (Hugh Glaisyer is retiring in June and there will be a farewell service on 25 May). At present he is the Vicar of St Mary's, Eastbourne and Rural Dean of Eastbourne. He is a history and theological graduate of Leeds University. At Leeds he met his wife Christine, who is the daughter of the former Archdeacon of Westminster herself a theological graduate. Their daughter, Claire, teaches Religious Education at St Leonards-Mayfield Convent School.

Before ordination in 1973, Canon Reade trained for the ministry at the College of Resurrection, Mirfield. He was curate of St Chad's Coseley, Curate of Codsall, Vicar of Upper Gornal (all in the Diocese of Lichfield). Then he moved to Mayfield in 1988 where he was Rural Dean of Dallington for six years before moving to Eastbourne.

Canon Reade and Wallace Benn will bring the two main emphases on the Church (both Catholic and Evangelical) to our Episcopal Area.
