A "BARNABAS" BOY

I was born on St Barnabas day 1937! It was some years ago that I realised that I was a "Barnabas" boy! When I studied the life of Barnabas, I was delighted to have him as my "patron saint". He name means "Consoler" or "Encourager" direrally "son of peace"). It also has evertones of "paraklesis" (comforter), the name given to the Holy Spirit. Barnabas was not an "up front" leader. His colleagues like Paul, Mark and Luke have taken pre-eminence, but Barnabas was always there as a support, a reconciler and an encourager. If you wanted a job done, you asked Barnabas to do it. Luke says of him "A good man, and full of the Holy Spirit". We have many saints associated with this Benefice. Maybe in the Millennium Year, we could have a celebration on each patron saint? What do you think?

On my actual birthday (11 June) we will be celebrating Holy Communion at St Peter's at 10.00 am. You could be "Barnabases" to me by supporting me on that occasion. It has been a testing time to be a lone stipendiary minister in these three parishes, but your support and encouragement has kept me going. I would value your support on this occasion

When my Eileen was 50 we had an open house to any who would like to come. In our visitors book we recorded 100 names on that day. We are having OPEN HOUSE on SATURDAY 14 JUNE from 2.00 - 5.00 pm, and you are all invited to share with us. Our family will be here that weekend and I know that some from my previous ministry in Erith will be travelling down as well. One of the things our appraisal has discovered, is that there is a strong desire to do things together as a Benefice. I would be thrilled if people (church members and others) from the three parishes dropped in to see us that afternoon. I believe that there are plans to lay on a "Nice" tea, so DO COME!

A new decade in one's life makes you think of times past and time to come. My prayer is that with the spirit of "Barnabas" we will encourage one another, in cooperation not competition, and build a strong and growing Benefice.

7 NATURE NOTES

Walking in Guestling Wood on a cold wet day at the end of April, we came across what appeared to be a dead slow worm. My friend picked it up, and it came to life in the warmth of his hand. Its tail was missing, so presumably it had had a brush with a predator, but it was otherwise unharmed. We put it under a pile of dry leaves at the base of a tree, and wished it well.

Two people have told me that they have grass snakes in their gardens, which is good news because this totally harmless snake is not very common. It is easily recognisable by its yellow neck markings, like a collar.

The scent of the bluebells in the woods is quite overpowering, and they form a carpet of blue in every direction. I once took a young friend to see them. She was wearing ankle socks and a short skirt, and by the time we returned home her legs were covered in a red itchy rash. Many plants have irritant sap, but not everyone is affected. Bluebells have no effect on me, but I come up in blisters after contact with any of the spurge family (Euphorbia).

I have been asked how to identify a spotted flycatcher. It's slightly smaller than a sparrow, and a paler brown with creamy underparts, but the easiest way to spot it (if you'll pardon the pun) is by its behaviour. It sits very upright on a post or fence, darts off to catch an insect, and then returns to the same post.

Flowers to look out for in June include the yellow toadflax and the blue devil's bit scabious; also elderflowers, popular for wine or pancakes. According to legend, if you burn elder wood indoors you will allow evil spirits to enter the house. Perhaps better grow a rowan by the front door, as that is supposed to keep evil spirits out!

LISTENING YEAR EVENTS AND NEWS

Thank you for returning your Questionnaires from the three parishes. Later in the year we will be processing them to see if we can learn anything about our role in the community.

We were glad that some ten people from the Benefice attended the "As You Go" conferences arranged by our friend, John Ford (Adviser in Mission and Renewal) on 25/25 April at Worth Abbey. More than 1000 people attended over two days, and enthusiastic reports have come back to share with the churches. One suggestion is that we book a Benefice party to go to the Spring Harvest in 1998! This would have to be in the week after Easter to include Robin and Eileen, and they thought we might go to Minehead rather than Skegness. As an early application in July is needed, please let Robin know if you are interested.

The Summer School has been progressing well, and we are learning much. A need was expressed for more opportunities for "united" activities and services among the Churches of the Benefice. We remind you that the services at St Peter's on Sunday evenings are open to all, especially the Praise and Worship on the third evening and the Communion with Healing Ministry on the first. At this time less than a tenth of the Electoral Roll are booked for the Benefice Quiet Day on 7 June. This is one of the major events of the year and we hope more will respond before the day. Do remember that John Ford is returning to us on 19 October. He will be preaching at all the services. There will be a shared lunch in Guestling Village Hall followed by a United Service at Guestling Church.

ASCENSION DAY VISION

"The brightness of his glory, and the express image of his person, and upholding all things by the word of his power ..."

These words, from the Epistle to the Hebrews (1.3 AV) appointed for Ascension Day, happened to strike me early today. May I share just a few of the thoughts?

They were concerned with the beauty that surrounds us, as we enjoy views over this one area that enfolds all who live within one benefice. It gives incentive to make full use of opportunities, as they arise, to share in, gain from and enjoy occasions of meeting, and also reading, as a basis for prayer, the magazines, leaflets, notices etc, that come our way. In one sentence 'Give the Holy Spirit of the living God free movement in all three directions'!

ONLY in such ways might St Paul gladly write to us as he did to his friends in "Ithank my God upon every remembrance of you for your fellowship in the Gospel from the first day until now". 1, 3-5. How blessed we are in this place!.

9 PETT PARISH PUMP

The various tiers of local government hold regular joint meetings on subjects of mutual concern, and whenever possible one or more members of the Parish Council attend. June Barnes recently went to a seminar about rural transport, which included an interesting talk on the "Westfield Wheelies". This is a volunteer service which provides transport to reach Health Care services such as the hospital, GP, dentist or chiropodist. People ring the coordinator to ask for transport, and a volunteer driver is arranged from the list. A charge of 30p per mile is made to the passenger, of which 25p goes to the driver and the other 5p covers administrative costs.

This scheme was discussed at the last Parish Council meeting, but it was agreed that it is not required in a small friendly community like Pett, where there is no problem getting lifts from neighbours. Do you agree? If you personally ever have difficulty getting transport to a medical appointment, please tell me or any Parish Councillor, so that the scheme can be reconsidered.

Many angry parishioners justifiably complained about the disgraceful state of the grass verges after the mowers had been through. The Parish Council in turn complained to ESCC, who have apologised on behalf of their contractor. The contractor offered the excuse that a new machine was being used, would you believe, but said that more care would be taken in future. Thanks are due to those parishioners who went out and cleared up the worst of the mess.

The second phase of the Oak Fields development is now under way, and the Parish Council is pressing Rother to ensure that priority is given to prospective tenants living in, or having strong connections with, Pett or Pett Level. The Housing Association has given an assurance that the new houses will not be occupied until the sewage disposal problem has been solved.

The Priory Church of St Mary and St Blaise was founded as a Benedictine monastery by monks from Normandy, it is one of the finest examples of Early English architecture in the country.

"Silence is the nutrient of devotion"

A degree of stillness and silence is essential if the Holy Spirit is to enter our hearts and minds.

In Jean Millet's famous painting of two peasants kneeling at midday in the field, both are calm, reverent and silent in the Normandy countryside.

The Hebrew for Spirit is Ruach, meaning a light refreshing breeze. In Greek "Pneuma" (eg pneumatic-pertaining to air). "A young African boy got the point: Lord, I am a bicycle; but my tyres are flat. Pump them up and ride me."

We cannot see the wind in the sky, yet when the trees bow down their heads, we know that God is nigh.

"The wind bloweth when it listeth, and thou hearest the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh, and whither it goeth; so is everyone that is born of the Spirit"

"AS YOU GO", WORTH ABBEY

Organised by Revd John Ford as part of the initiative of "Building for Mission", facilitated by Canon Robert Warren, the Archbishop's adviser on evangelism, and the Revd Stephen Cotterall from Wakefield. Their thoughts on evangelism included stimulating ideas about the church moving forward, gaining momentum and wider support in the community.

The clear message was the need to address change and evolution. The recognition that there is an overwhelming spiritual need in society, but a lack of feeling of identity with the Church

We divided into groups to work with people from other parts of Sussex to discuss changes in society and its relationship with the Church.

There was a question and answer session and finally we were advised not to expect change to happen quickly. We left feeling inspired having experienced an event complementary to what is happening in our United Benefice through Robin's five year plan.
