"NEW START"

The Christian Churches in this country are getting themselves ready to begin celebrating a NEW MILLENNIUM of Christianity in our land. The organisation called "CHURCHES TOGETHER in ENGLAND" has launched a programmed called "NEW START". The major challenge is that all Christians in a given area should stand together to witness the occasion and the Faith!

The New Start initiative has suggested a Lent Course which has been produced by the Mission Advise of the YORK DIOCESE, John Young. It is called "Attending, Exploring and Engaging" and involves the interviewing of FOUR LEADING CHRISTIAN SPEAKERS, including the Archbishop of York and Revd Steve Chalke, recently popular as a TV presenter as well as being a Baptist Pastor. Fr Gerard Hughes, the Jesuit Roman Catholic priest, who is widely read for his books on prayer, and also Professor Frances Young complete the quartet. We have managed to find SEVEN VENUES in the Benefice, and each church has a list of them. It would be really good if each one was required. There is a list of hosts in this edition, so if you are interested, please find a group.

The NEW START programme has other ideas for the coming year or so. I am meeting with representatives from the three parishes, as well as being in touch with members of other church denominations and we hope to build a worthwhile, but not too demanding programme. The Churches Together have planned the opportunity to deliver to each house in the country a CANDLE and a copy of the MILLENNIUM RESOLUTION. The NEW START idea is that the candles would be lit on New Year's Eve and the resolution said by the household. To actually deliver these to even most of the homes in the Benefice will be a major undertaking for the churches. The cost is 30p for each candle with literature, or £150 for every 500. If any feel moved to make a donation towards this venture, please make contact with myself or make out a cheque to "The Benefice Fund" (this would be returned if we choose not to go ahead!)

There is a list of planned events in this issue. Please make a note of them and help the Benefice to remind the community that this MILLENNIUM is actually about the birth of the LORD JESUS CHRIST. Let us make the best of this opportunity.

11 NATURE NOTES

I thoroughly enjoyed watching a squirrel trying to get to the nuts in a friend's garden. He had to climb a narrow metal pole, negotiate an umbrella of netting, climb some more pole, and then do a tightrope act (mainly upside down) along a single wire from which the nut holder was suspended. I thought he really deserved his peanuts when he finally got there. The best thing was his tail, which went round and round in circles like a windmill while he walked the tightrope.

A Sycamore in Rectory Park was cut down recently as it was past praying for, and a lump of shrapnel was found inside it. I wonder whether older parishioners remember a bomb falling on or near what would have been the old Rectory garden?

I was interested to hear of a mouse and a robin feeding together from the same dish. In, my garden the birds all fly up at once if a small mammal of any description appears. There is no doubt that birds learn to recognise individual humans and dogs, so perhaps this mouse and robin just knew each other.

When I have a log fire I usually break down the remains into embers before going to bed, but if I have a slow burning log such as elm or bay, I leave it whole in the hope of finding a Ghost Log in the morning. THE NEW VILLAGE HALL IN PETT

Pett Village Hall is a tired looking building, inadequate for its needs and this is not surprising for a 76 year old wooden construction. This fact is often brought home to me because I am responsible for the hiring of the hall. People ask me if they can hire the hall for a special occasion, but often they change their minds after seeing it. These refusals deprive us of a useful extra source of income. Another problem I get faced with is the very limited accommodation. Only one activity can take place at the same time, so if two of our regular users prefer the same time this is not possible. Nor can an extra booking be taken for a time when the hall will already be in use.

The present hall has very limited facilities for entertainment, sporting facilities and social events and as a result it is sometimes under utilised. Even when empty it still has to be heated during the winter and standing charges for gas and electricity have to be paid. Refurbishing the existing building would be an expensive and on going process which anyway would not solve the problem of lack of space. It is unacceptable that the doctor's surgery has to be held in the ladies cloakroom. Lack of a car park means that cars obstruct the road and, indeed, Pett Parish Council are concerned about this problem.

Looking to the future a new hall has great potential. It will be an attractive venue for social occasions and these would generate an important amount of revenue currently denied to us. Extra rooms would enable two or more groups to use the hall at the same time, and they would allow a modern doctor's surgery to give patients a good service. The large car park will solve the problem of street parking and give safe access for children. The generous donors of the old hall will be remembered because their plaque will be placed in the new hall.

As Tim Jury wrote in the previous Parish News, there would be great possibilities for a youth centre. Other ideas include an adequate badminton court, golf nets and basketball. We would also have a very good venue for modern, old time and line dancing. Let the village of Pett "Drive Change Forward".

A BOOK FOR LENT

The Rector recommends the following book which can be order by signing the list in each church, as soon as possible. MESSAGE FOR THE MILLENNIUM by David Winter. BRF £5.99.

David Winter suggests that an appropriate preparation for the Millennium is to look again at the teaching of Jesus. In six weeks' readings from the synoptic Gospels he examines what Jesus really taught and what is the relevance of that teaching at the end of the 20th century. A book for personal, daily reading or for use with groups. Other books of interest (with a common theme) can be bought from Pathway Books, 34 Robertson Street, Hastings.

LIVING WELL by Robert Warren - Hodder £7.99 - the Archbishop.or Canterbury's Lent Book 1999.

What does Jesus really mean by "Blessed are the poor in spirit"? and who are "the pure in heart"? Taking some of the well-known words of the Beatitudes, Robert Warren writes with his heart set on the Kingdom of God, but his eyes and ears open to the needs of today's world. With reflections, questions and prayers, he grapples with the ways in which Jesus' radical teaching affects our attitude to the whole of life - relationships, community, the environment, world debt. Suggestions for group study make this a thought-provoking resource for shared as well as personal use.

PRAYING WITH JESUS by Rob Warner - Hodder £6.99 - Hodder Lent Book
The subtitle sums it up: Experiencing the spiritual riches of the Lord's Prayer.
Rob Warner explores this classic prayer phrase by phrase, with imaginative and
practical freshness. To pray the Lord's Prayer with Rob Warner is to be
challenged to a deeper reality and a sometimes painful honesty. The style is
similar to the author's '97 Lent Book, with Biblical mediations, quotations from
great Christian poets, and suggestions for personal reflection.

A NEW EARTH by Margaret Atkins, Sheila Cassidy, Joseph Donders, Kathy Galloway, Sara Maitland and Brendan Walsh - CAFOD/DLT £4.95
Brendan Walsh is the head of communications at CAFOD. In his introduction he writes of the need to use Lent profitably, not only as "a time of inwardness, of renewal in the life of prayer", but also as "a time of outwardness, of seeing family and friends, neighbours and strangers, the poor and suffering, with a compassionate eye". In these Bible readings and reflections for each day in Lent, the six contributors all follow this theme - that true Christianity needs to be lived out in the social and political situations around us, and that discipleship involves caring and compassion. To quote Brendan Walsh again: "What sort of person do I wish to become? What sort of world are we trying to create?"
