

We are now well into the last year of the second Millennium since the "marked" date of the birth of Jesus Christ. Christians have always claimed that Jesus' arrival into the history of this world reveals God's concern for mankind. The heart of the Christian message has been enshrined in the famous verse from St John's Gospel, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life." Time is not really significant as Jesus Christ is the "Same, yesterday, today and forever", yet every milestone marks the history of faith in Jesus Christ and the message he brought to this world.

The second millennium has been very significant for Christians in Britain. By the year 1000 AD, the faith was well established in Saxon England. There was certainly a church in the village of Guestling, surrounded by a small village. Within a few decades the Normans had arrived and the Church dedicated to St Laurence was built and the first incumbent (Hugh) installed in 1072. In the next hundred years or so, churches were built by the Normans in Fairlight and Pett, which would have looked very similar to the one we still have at Guestling. In those days the churches looked to Rome and the Pope as their human head. The 16th Century saw the break with Rome and the formation of the CHURCH OF ENGLAND together with other denominations that did not conform to the State Church's rules and beliefs. The EVANGELICAL AWAKENING following the work of the Wesleys and others in the 18th century paved the way for the Missionary Movement that spread from the Western World. The CHURCH MISSIONARY SOCIETY (now known as the Church Mission Society - CMS) was formed in 1799. The Victorian age of the 19th century saw the spread of the British Empire and with it, the Church! The Victorians threw their energies into building many churches throughout the country, replacing some and adding others. The Church in Fairlight, built in 1846 is an example. There was provided a seat for every person living in the village - not that everybody ever attended church" The same thing happened in Pett. The Victorians left a real headache for this generation to maintain these buildings; many so impractical for the needs of today, yet "graded" and attached to churchyards (our legacy from the Christian boom of the Victorian age).. The 20th century has seen dramatic changes. There are enormous numbers of Christians in the world, but in Britain there has been a systematic decline of membership.

This month we approach the Three Annual Meetings of the Churches that make up the present day Benefice. There is still a great deal of life and vitality in our local churches, and we are well served by clergy and lay teams. (For example, the central authority of Diocese receives more than £40,000 a year from us in contributions, rents and fees). The two main problems we have are the maintenance and repair of our Victorian Churches and the "winning back" of people to committed support of the local church, especially the younger

ones in our community. The meetings will have to address these problems as the new Millennium approaches. Pett Church waits to receive a quotation for the major repair of its building. It has paid its way by not putting money aside for repair in the past. We can no longer do that! Your interest would make such a difference. PLEASE REGISTER YOUR SUPPORT. Thanks.

Others would arrive by car. We would pray for the land and the animals and have a service of blessing. Please put this date in your diary.

TRIANGLE - Three Villages children's events. The Committee has recently met and the programme planned. The first event is on 22 May which will be a ramble. A printed programme is now available. There will not be a Holiday Club this year, but two FUN DAYS are planned. An all day event at Guestling-Bradshaw School is to be held on Tuesday 3 August and another at the end of the holiday a fun evening with barbeque and games on Saturday 4 September at the Rectory. Other details can be found in the programme.

MISSIONS 1999

In 1799 (200 years ago) the CHURCH MISSIONARY SOCIETY was formed. This was the beginning of a great missionary endeavour that opened up Africa and Asia to the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. There has been a dramatic change in the way that the Mission of the World Church is organised at the end of the 20th Century! No longer is the Western World sending missionaries to heathen lands with the Gospel. The Churches in the Third World are now stronger in faith and action than the original missionary churches in the West! We are now MISSION PARTNERS!

Over the past few years the great missionary agencies of this country have been changing their names to reflect this move in Mission. Last year the Church Missionary Society was renamed the CHURCH MISSION SOCIETY. The Bible and Medical Missionary Fellowship (BMMF) some years ago decided to call itself INTERSERVE. More recently the Bible Churchman Missionary Society (BCMS) changed its name to CROSSLINKS.


We are very fortunate in this Benefice to have older clergy closely involved in Mission through the years, seeing for themselves first hand the change in the style of world mission. Our own Canon Michael Townroe was for many years Chairman of the Diocese link with Kenya, through the FRIENDS OF NAKURU. BCMS, now Crosslinks, has worked over the years alongside CMS in the Diocese of Nakuru. In the light of this we want to join the international celebration of the 200th Anniversary. For this year we have recruited people from Guestling and Pett to join the Missionary Committee and we wish to focus on Kenya in our thoughts and prayers (see map opposite).

On 29 May there is to be a celebration with the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Archbishop of Kenya in London, while on Sunday 30 May we are holding our next Benefice Service at St Andrew's. We shall be focussing on the changes that have taken place in Mission Strategy, with a feature by Canon Michael with the Rector preaching on "Mission 1999". This will begin preparations for a BENEFICE MISSIONARY GIFT DAY on 31 October to be held at St Laurence, Guestling. We will be providing display materials and literature to inform the congregation so that we as a Benefice might have an informed understanding and share by PRAYER and GIVING in the new WORLD MISSION SCENE.

11 NATURE NOTES

It was a cold, wet, windy morning in January. My boots were heavy with the glutinous clay of the field path, and sharp flurries of hail were bouncing off my hood. The sheep were staring at me as though I were crazy, and I was beginning to think they might have a point. Then a perfect rainbow appeared in the sky over loklesham. After a few moments a second rainbow appeared outside the first, paler and with the colours reversed. The whole thing lasted only a couple of minutes - just long enough to prove the sheep wrong.

A recent study in the New Scientist shows that the decline in numbers of Barn Owls is linked to the use of rodenticides. Less Barn Owls = more rodents = more rodenticides = less Barn Owls; what a crazy world we live in!

Following my note on the tree in Rectory Park containing a lump of shrapnel, I am told that the old Rectory was used by the Royal Artillery during the Hitler War. I am also told that during the War a collection of 13 unexploded bombs were detonated near Market Wood.

Interesting sightings this month include a magpie burying food, a fox hunting (for mice?) amongst heathers in a garden, and a pure white squirrel in Church Lane. The latter was not an albino, as it had dark eyes.

Our summer bird visitors will soon be back with us. The Chiff Chaff is usually one of the first, and also one of the easiest to recognise as he calls his name loud and clear. Visually he is very hard to distinguish from his close cousin, the Willow Warbler. There is a nice story about an ornithologist who insisted the two species were easy to tell apart. "That one on the fence is a Willow Warbler" he assured his audience, whereupon the bird opened its beak and solemnly commented "Chiff Chaff!".
