Sunday 9 May is an important day in the life of our Benefice. We want to demonstrate our concern for the world in which we live.

Christian Aid - in this Benefice we have always been concerned for those in need throughout the world. CHRISTIAN AID WEEK is of prime importance to us and we do what we can to raise money for those worse off than ourselves. This year the situation comes into sharp focus with the conflict in Kosovo and the fearful plight of the refugees. I was very pleased to see the immediate response in both Fairlight and Pett to give spontaneously at Easter to the Christian Aid Kosovo Appeal. Pett did exceptionally well and we are grateful to John and Ray Taylor for taking the initiative. THIS WAS JUST A BEGINNING. On 9 May at 10.30am there will be commissioning services at both Pett and Fairlight. (Guestling will also be given a chance to give on that Sunday). On 8 May a coffee morning will be held at Paxstead from 10.00 am until noon. During the week we hope that collectors this year will find residents with warm and generous hearts. We know that every pound will make a difference. THE EARTH IS THE LORD'S AND EVERYTHING IN IT. THE WORLD, AND ALL WHO LIVE IN IT. (Psalm 24) If we are heart-broken with all the pain and suffering that we have seen on television, how much more must the heart of our Lord be breaking. WE IDENTIFY WITH THE PAIN, and pledge that we will do our best this Christian Aid Week

Rogation Sunday - 9 May is also Rogation Sunday. It is the time traditionally the Church OWNS ITS PARISH. The land and the seeds were blessed ready for planting. The old rhythms of life have changed and so have the areas of the Vicar's concern! The old regationtide services are things of the past. As we come to the end of the SECOND MILLENNIUM of Christianity the BENEFICE MILLENNIUM GROUP felt it would be a good thing to leave the confines of our church buildings and go out into the highways of our parishes. We are going to gather in the forecourt of FIELDS BARN in Peter James Lane at 4.00pm on 9 May for a simple service. (This venue is equidistant from the THREE PARISH CHURCHES). Our thanks to Mr & Mrs Jury for allowing us to meet there.

We are asking those who can walk, to meet at their parish churches from 2.45 pm and then make their way (if possible) through the fields to the venue. On the way prayers will be said and hymns sung. We hope that each Church will have a banner to carry. Others will travel by car and arrangements will be made for them. We want to OWN THE LAND for our Lord and our Faith! We have strong beliefs about God's concern for His creation. We are passionately concerned for our environment, for the countryside and all that is in it. PLEASE COME AND JOIN US, either on one of the walks or else at the venue. We are pleased to hear that Kay is arranging for a cup of tea after our service. This will be a memorable occasion for the churches of the Benefice and cement out mutual concern for the land and God's creation. Please pray for fine weather.

A group of 30 from the Benefice, including Robin and Eileen Balch, their daughter Jenny and her husband James, experienced Spring Harvest at Skegness this year. My family and I were privileged to be part of a group of 8 from Guestling who set off on Tuesday 6 April for this famous Lincolnshire coast holiday resort.

Spring Harvest is an annual event in the UK at Easter when Christians from many denominations gather at different locations for celebration, prayer, teaching and good fellowship. Catering for all ages, Spring Harvest is also family orientated and includes a variety of sporting and social activities.

After a long journey, it was a relief to settle into comfortable and welcoming accommodation and to anticipate enjoyment of the range of programmed events. The first evening's Big Top worship and praise set the scene for a lively musical week in a "high tech" Environment which also provided food for thought

We quickly settled into a routine. In the mornings we participated in a study of the Bible - this year it was St Mark's account of the events leading to Jesus ultimate sacrifice and his Resurrection; in the afternoons there were specialist seminars on a variety of topics; and in the evenings we returned to the Big Top for lively musical celebrations and to listen to compelling speakers with strong messages on subjects such as love, truth and devotion. We also found time for exercise and a table tennis match. Do you want to even the score next year Robin? The children in our part were well catered for and they had their own programme of events but with a theme consistent with the adults'. They obviously enjoyed their competitive activities, making new friends and gaining a thrill from the "Gunge Tank".

Throughout the week, our thoughts were focused on the plight of the refugees from Kosovo and we said prayers for all involved in the conflict in the Balkans. There was also a practical manifestation in a collection. This raised a large sum which will be entirely devoted to relief work. On the final day we experienced a link up by telephone to a Tear Fund representative dealing with the immediate needs of refugees in Albania.

Spring Harvest is a renewing experience. There is something for everyone. Many gained enormous benefit from the shared praise and good fellowship; for others, the Bible teaching will sustain their faith. My family enjoyed everything and I found particular fulfilment in the references to the Second Coming. It emphasised the central role of the Bible in understanding God's purpose.

We look forward to returning again. I am sure many others share this thought and we all thank Ken and Beryl Holmes for coordinating the booking arrangements.

Margaret was born and bred in the Guestling area, met her husband Phillip at the Village Hall 30 years ago at a badminton group. They were married at Guestling Church in 1973. After several years of marriage they moved to Westfield but remained well-known by the Guestling Green community. They had one Son, Christopher, and we extend our deep sympathies to both Phillip and Chris as well as the wider family and many friends.

Maggie worked at the Harbourers Nursery for many years and was seen about on her moped. Latterly she worked at Whitegates Nursing Home in Westfield as a care assistant. She was particularly fond of animals and had two dogs (who she called "her boys") as well as budgies, chicken and geese. Taking her dogs for walks meant that she met many people and enjoyed talking with them.

Her death was very sudden and a great shock to family and friends. Her funeral service was taken by the Rector at St Laurence Church followed by burial in the Churchyard.

## BERNARD PARSONS

The community of Pett were so distressed to hear of the death of Bernard Parsons of Bough Beech. He had been ill for a very long time, he was born with defective kidneys and in latter years had been on constant dialysis, which was very painful. Recently his wife had a successful hip operation and was making a good recovery at home when this happened. The Rector was sad that he was away after Easter and not available to take the funeral service, but was able to take the service of internment of ashes at the Cemetery later in the month. Robin enjoyed talking with Bernard and Eileen as they spent most of their lives in Carshalton where he grew up and shared memories. # Christian Aid We believe in life before death

## LIVING WITH UNCERTAINTY

For Friada Nordez of Mozambique life is full of uncertainty. She doesn't know how old she is, though she's probably about 60. She doesn't know how long she was married, though her eldest child is over 30. Nor does she know where she's going to live now her husband is dead. And until recently, she didn't know how she was going to make a living for herself and her family.

Friada and her younger daughter are rice-growers, working a 1½-acre field 15 miles from her home. During the week they stay in a makeshift shelter or in the grain warehouse, and only make the long walk home at the weekend.

Harvesting rice is a long and laborious task without conventional cutting tools. Friada uses just the sharpened edge of one of the snail shells that litter the fields. The spiral shells are about three times the size of the average garden snail and they fit snugly in her hand. When one breaks she simply finds another and carries on.

In one way, though, Friada's life is less uncertain than it was. She has joined the Association of Women Farmers (AMCELA) which buys rice from its members at a fair price and sells it for them. So she no longer has to make the 15-mile walk into town, not knowing how successfully her rice will sell. AMCELA stores it until the market is favourable, and also provides a tractor which makes the farmers' work easier. In return AMCELA receives financial support from another association which for the past five years has been funded by Christian Aid.

We will launch CHRISTIAN AID WEEK with a Coffee Morning at Paxstead, Pett Road, on Saturday May 8 from 10-12. Raffle, bring & buy, cakes, plants - and a sale of Traidcraft (Christian Aid) goods. A short video about Friada (above) will be shown. Please come and bring your friends!

The service at 10.30am in Pett Church on May 9 will be a special one for Christian Aid.

Then from May 9-15 there will be a house-to-house envelope collection in Pett and Pett Level Last year, people's generosity resulted in the highest total yet; please help us this year to break even that record!

# NATURE NOTES

I am told that there was an American Scoter on Pett Pools towards the end of March. It had (inevitably) attracted a large crowd of twitchers from all points of the compass.

The following is from a newspaper clipping thought to be about a hundred years old. I think the sentiments expressed are as true now as they were then.

"There is something much more to a garden than mowing the lawn, double digging, or weeding the paths. These are the inevitable tasks which go towards making a garden a fit place to exercise your senses in. With your eyes, you see all the beauties of nature - the trees, the lovely flowers, the rolling skies, the butterflies in their dancing flight. With your nose, you smell the lingering fragrance of the rose, the scent of the newly cut grass, the spicy perfume of the lavender and bergamot; with your touch you feel the caress of the breeze, the warmth of the sun, the clean splash of rain on your face; with your ears you listen to the songs of the birds, the hum of the ever-busy bees, the sighing of the wind in the pines. Your taste is regaled with the fresh fruit and vegetables picked with the pristine bloom of health upon them. With your mental processes relaxed, you contemplate in happy frame of mind upon your labours and realise how insignificant they would be without the help and guidance of that mysterious force, Mother Nature. Such are the glories of the garden; all yours for so little - if you have the wit to find them."

Keep an eye open for the Spotted Orchids on the bank opposite the Methodist Church, and on the verge at the Pett end of Rosemary Lane. Also look out for the Green-winged Orchids in the Churchyard near the war memorial.

# CMS celebrates 200 years



The year: 1799. The date: 12 April. The place: the Castle and Falcon Inn in Aldersgate Street in the City of London. A group of clergy and laymen launch a 'Society for Missions to Africa and the East'. Today we call it the Church Mission Society.

The eighteenth century was hardly an age of piety or moral restraint. One historian has said that the British "were then perhaps as deeply degraded and debauched as any in Christendom."

But the founders of CMS represented a new mood. Their activities were just part of a massive outpouring of spiritual energy that changed the face of Christianity in Britain, Western Europe and North America.

This surge of energy not only stimulated foreign missions. At home it put Christians at the forefront of the fight against slavery. It paved the way for an era of social reform of prisons, factories and mines. It brought the benefits of education to the poor through Sunday Schools and made the Scriptures available at an affordable price through Bible societies.

CMS' first 'field' was Sierra Leone, a West African haven for freed slaves. Over two centuries CMS has sent out more than 9,000 men and women to share the gospel. Their destinations have included Africa, Canada, Ceylon, the Indian subcontinent, Iran, Malta, the Middle East, New Zealand and the West Indies. Today CMS supports 157 mission partners, including 10 working in Britain and works alongside Christian Churches and agencies in about 40 countries.

In 1799 Christianity was primarily a European faith. Now its is a global faith. Moreover former 'mission fields' have become self-governing Churches. Many of them do missionary work, including sending people to Britain which has become a mission field.

But CMS is needed a much as ever. Its agenda is to listen to its partner Churches and agencies and support their priorities with personnel, funds and knowhow. Like its founders in 1799 CMS' vision is nothing less than seeing the world transformed by the love of God.
