

ROBIN WRITES:

THOSE WHOM GOD HAS JOINED!

Last month we focussed on the farming community in our ACTION YEAR programme. We were reminded at our ROGATIONTIDE SERVICE by a local farmer, that their industry is driven by change. We were told how supermarkets had completely changed the lot of the farming community. Together with the European markets and BSE, many have been in despair. I was struck by that phrase 'driven by change'. As I write this, I sit at my computer and muse at the tremendous changes that have happened in the clergyman's study since my ordination 31 years ago. The 1662 Prayer Book still remains the normative statement of the Church of England, but as you read through the pages of the services, it seems strangely out of touch with the World Scene of the coming Third Millennium. Yet within it is enshrined unchanging biblical principles. One of these is the "SOLEMNISING OF HOLY MATRIMONY" (1662 book!).

In less than 5 years since the formation of the Benefice, more than 50 couples have come to me asking for marriage or for a service of blessing after a civil ceremony. Thirty years ago single people tended to be living with their parents up to their wedding day. As you well know styles and customs have changed dramatically, but I believe that the majority come with a very serious intention to commit themselves to their partner for life and to seek "God's blessing on them" and have prayers that "strengthened and guided by God they may fulfil his purpose for the whole of their earthly life together" (1980 ASB service).

A part of our Action Year before the onset of the New Millennium is to declare that the Church believes in TRADITIONAL CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE. We want to contend for the sanctity of marriage and to work hard to keep couples together, learning to love each other and overcome the problems of life. We desperately want to see a secure haven for children to be brought up within a safe marriage and strong family life. With all this in mind we call EVERYBODY who believes in the principles of CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE to support our Marriage Celebration Service to be held on SUNDAY 6 JUNE at 4.00pm at ST LAURENCE CHURCH, GUESTLING followed by a picnic lunch.

The churches want to make it abundantly clear that the service is for EVERYBODY, whether married or single. In fact all who believe in the institution of Christian marriage are warmly invited to stand with us. There will be a chance for married couples to renew their vows to each other within the context of the service. We are grateful for members of Guestling Church in providing a picnic tea either in the Church or else in the churchyard (depending on the weather). After the encouraging service last month praying for the farming community and the environment, we are hoping for an enthusiastic response. Please come and bring your friends as we witness our belief in the centrality of CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE.

THE NEW MILLENNIUM IS COMING!

(A moment of reflection by the Rector)

I really cannot believe that it is nearly with us! It will soon be the year 2000. This is to be very significant for me, for many reasons, but one of them is that early in the New Millennium I come to retire from my full time ministry as an Anglican Clergyman! In the 80s I rarely gave this day a thought. I had a lively successful church and my children were moving on to University with good grades behind them. We had a brand new Vicarage built for us and I was a Rural Dean. A decade or so later I am near to retirement and thinking about the Benefice of three parishes and five churches that I will be passing on to a new incumbent in a few years time! For the first time in our lives, Eileen and I have been seriously thinking about MONEY FOR THE FUTURE. We have to provide ourselves with a home in retirement and make sure that I have sufficient pension for the future and for Eileen if she is ever left as a widow. A bit morbid isn't it, but "needs will have". I also cannot help thinking about the future of this Benefice. Five years here has made me suggest different ways of managing the job. The Diocese and the PCCs will consider them and come up with their own ideas.

Recently I have had some interesting letters and information sent to me. The Church Commissioners sent their annual statement. They have recovered their lost assets which brought so much publicity at the beginning of the decade. They are handling these so that the Church will have sound finances into the new Millennium. However, nowadays the Parishes have to pay all their incumbents' stipends and the pensions of those who are now retiring. In fact this Benefice is nearly up to Full Responsibility contributing over £35,000 a year plus almost £3,000 in fees (as well as a similar amount returned to the Churches). I have also received the lowest estimate for the urgent repair of Pett Parish Church. It is almost £40,000. If, as recommended over the next 5 years we were to complete the repair of the building, it might easily be double that amount. At present Pett has some £15,000 to meet this challenge. What do we do? Also through my door has come a letter about the new Pett Village Hall. What should be our priorities in Pett Village? My responsibility is for 4000 people over an area of some 10 miles x 7 miles with 275 on the electoral roll and an average of 170 people attending on each Sunday, not just here!

As I plan for my future I will need "to cut the coat according to the cloth". As a retired clergyman I will need to be wise in managing my finances. The time has come for the Benefice to plan wisely for the future. A lot of prayer, planning and discussion is needed. This includes, as the PCCs already know, where the Rector should live to best manage the benefice. Where his assistance should live. (We are thrilled that Frank and Marjorie have pledged their commitment to us until at 2003). Could we manage our finances better or arrange the services so that more would be attracted to our worship? In what ways can we encourage people to increase their financial support of the Church? None of these questions have easy answers. But it is no good just burying our heads in

the sand about the future. The Church of England says "The Responsibility Is Ours" (TRIO), for it is surely no one else's!

GUESTLING CHURCH FACILITIES

It has now become common knowledge that the Guestling Church Council have been looking at the possibility of providing a toilet within the building of the Church. The architect was asked to look at a suitable site and provide drawings. He felt the best place was within the tower, both for convenience and economy. The Diocesan Advisory Committee, including a representative from British Heritage was visiting the Benefice and came to see what was proposed. They verbally approved the scheme. Subsequently concern has been registered and the Archdeacon, Nicholas Reade, together with the DAC secretary made a recent visit to talk to some who were unhappy about the scheme. Following this the PCC has decided to ask the architect to speak at a public meeting to show his plans and answer questions. The Council do not want to proceed until they have gained the majority support of the Church and the community. If you are concerned about this project, please keep alert for the date and time of the meeting and do attend.

WILLIAM FLETCHER CHARITY

These are some of the problems that face modern agriculture today:

- 1 There needs to be more understanding from the supermarkets and they need to source more of their supplies from Britain.
- 2 The Government needs to have a greater understanding of the countryside and how it works.
- 3 Small and mixed farms and family farms need to be retained because it is the farms that have a mixture of livestock and crops that give the countryside its varied beauty of a green and pleasant place to live in.
- 4 There needs to be less bureaucracy and more common sense is needed in the way that agriculture and other industries are administered. If not it will make people give up.
- Farmers themselves must become salesmen of their produce and must be prepared to go and meet the people that are the customers.
- 6 The right to roam worries many farmers. Those people that will decide on this matter need to take these fears into account and not do it for some ideological reason. Most of the countryside is a working environment for someone and home to many.
- All farmers, big or small, do not mind working hard for a just reward. So we need to see that all farm produce is bought at a price that enables the farmer to earn a living and to invest for the future. Mankind cannot survive without a good supply of food.
- 8 The growers of fruit have had some difficult years, mainly due to the late frosts which kill off the new buds, so let us hope that there will be no frost this year and that they have a good harvest.
- 9 Pig farmers have had a very difficult year with very low prices for their produce, and many have gone out of business.
- 10 Let us hope that the mix of farming practices that we have in this part of the country can continue and we can all enjoy the beauty of the countryside that we see around us today.
- We all hope to see an end to the BSE crisis that has brought such havoc to the beef and dairy farming which has also had a dramatic effect on many other industries.

10 APATHY

The Euro election takes place on Thursday 10 June 1999. Many people feel apathetic about voting because they are either totally against Britain's inclusion in the European Community or against the Single Currency. Alternatively, they may feel totally confused by the proportional voting system. My view is that it is very important for us to exercise our right to vote. 11 NATURE NOTES

It was 8.30 on a Sunday morning and the woods were carpeted with anemones and bluebells. There was no wind, so I was surprised to see what appeared to be a ball of dead leaves blowing about on the footpath further ahead. As I drew nearer I could see that the thing was alive. At first I thought it was a hedgehog, perhaps entangled in something and rolling about trying to free itself. I removed my anorak, intending to throw it over the struggling creature. By this time I was only yards away and I stopped in astonishment. The thing seemed to be a whirling ball of legs and tails. Then it suddenly resolved itself into two weasels, who stood glaring at me fearlessly for a moment before pitching into each other again. The fight rolled off the path and into the undergrowth and I wondered how long they would keep it up before one did the other a permanent mischief.

I went with some friends to Warehome on 2 May and we had a lovely walk along the Royal Military Canal. We heard no less than four nightingales singing. I used to hear them daily in May in Guestling Wood on our lunchtime walks, but never so many close together.

My garden is awash with baby birds and I can't garden in peace without either an anxious parent scolding me for getting too near the nest, or the older fledglings getting under my feet. The blue tits raising a family in the box a couple of feet from my kitchen door are far too busy bringing beakfuls of green caterpillars to take any notice of me. They have nine babies in the box, of whom at least seven will be dead before next spring if the blue tit population is to remain stable. Nature is not sentimental.

To end on a happier note - last night I went to sleep to the sound of tawny owls calling, and this morning I was woken at 5.30am by a blackcap singing right outside my bedroom window.

PARISH PUMP

Our local Community Beat Officer, PC Ray Turvey, attended the April Meeting and answered questions about the Crime and Disorder Strategy. One of the points he made was the importance of members of the public reporting incidents to the Police. He assured us that the Police would rather hear about the same incident from half a dozen people than not at all. One of the problems in country areas is fly tipping. If you see anyone dumping rubbish, please inform the Police, if possible with the vehicle registration number.

Still on the subject of rubbish, there have been complaints about people dumping garden refuse, either near public litter bins or - worse - in farm gateways. You can buy large paper sacks for garden refuse, which the dustmen will then take away. The sacks are obtainable from the Rother Office in Rye and although they cost about 70p each they are good value, as they hold an amazing amount of hedge clippings or whatever.

The sewage leak into the Recreation Ground has now been dealt with and the mud holes at the entrance gate have been levelled courtesy of the Cricket Club. The problem at the gate is made much worse by people taking their cars into the field when the ground is obviously too soft to take a car's weight without damage. In future the gate will be kept locked during bad weather.

It was good to see so many parishioners at the April Council Meeting. I hope you found it interesting and will come again.
