

A FRIEND IN HIGH PLACES ROBIN WRITES:

in this Benefice of Fairlight, Guestling and Pett we are very fortunate to have a good friend in our Archdeacon, NICHOLAS READE. Since I wrote to you last, Nicholas has made his Triennial Visitation to us. Every three years the Archdeacon (or one of his Rural Deans) has to make a visit to each parish under his charge and that amounts to nearly 200. He arrived mid-morning and did not leave until 5.30pm. The Archdeacon's responsibility is to check the "nuts and bolts" of each Church. He has to review the fabric and finances and see that accurate records are made, and spend time with the incumbent and the churchwardens, talking with any assistants as well.

All the churchwardens agree with me that we have a really good friend in our 1th Archdeacon. Already he has given us a great deal of time, bearing in mind all the other churches he has to oversee. Each church is involved in a building project and he has been there to advise and direct us. Fairlight is close to obtaining a faculty to begin the work of reordering St Andrew's Church to provide toilet, kitchen and meeting place facilities. Nicholas has visited with members of the Diocesan Advisory Committee on several occasions and the PCC at Fairlight has been very grateful for his efforts. The PCC at Guestling has suggested that there should be a toilet within the building. Again, Nicholas has come on at least two occasions to help the discussion and give objective 8th

The churchwardens of Pett and I were especially helped by his support and advice as we are coming to terms with the repair of Pett Parish Church. You will know by now that estimates for urgent repair have now arrived. The lowest tender was just short of £40,000. Pett Church has only £15,000 at present to 5th meet this. The architect has helped us fill in applications for grants from two Historic Churches Trusts. Although there is no guarantee that we will receive any money at all, we hope to get about £10,000 from both together. That would still leave a shortfall of £15,000. Because of the existing demands on our village, we are sensitive about a wide-spread appeal. As the church has only 30 regular members, most of whom are retired and have restricted means, we are uncertain how we can proceed any further.

Nicholas has agreed to make a special visit to the church on a Sunday and discuss the way forward. We ask readers of the magazine, and all interested in retaining a Parish Church in Pett to come on Sunday 19 September 1999. Jugust Nicholas is to preside and preach at the 9.30am Parish Communion. After a st cup of coffee, an OPEN COUNCIL MEETING which can be attended by anybody, will be held in the church. Nicholas will put before the church and the village the future prospects of the building and what might be done to secure it for the future. In the meantime, any donations and gifts would be most welcome, as a sign that the church building is wanted for the future. We are grateful for the lead set by Joan Zeepvat in selling her lovely map of Pett and Pett Level and donating proceeds to the Restoration Fund (see last month's magazine). FOCUS ON KENYA

30 May was the date for another significant Benefice occasion. Although it was the Bank Holiday weekend, and many regular churchgoers gave their apologies, 110 people gathered at St Andrew's Church, Fairlight for the morning service. That weekend an important occasion was remembered both in this country and overseas. It was 200 years since the Church Missionary Society was launched at Holy Trinity Church, Clapham by the then priest in charge, the Revd John Venn. On 29 May a whole day of celebration was held at Clapham in the presence of the Archbishop of Canterbury and also the Archbishop of Kenya.

We focussed our service on the country of Kenya. Fairlight has links with the Society, Crosslinks (formerly the BCMS) and Guestling and Pett are linked with the Friends of Nakuru and Nyahururu. Our own Canon Michael Townroe is formerly the chairman of the link between the Dioceses in Kenya and our own of Chichester. Michael spoke with much vigour and enthusiasm of the church in Kenya, belying his age! The Rector took up the theme in his sermon and reminded the churches that we are now in a World Church and the programme is global mission. No longer do we send missionaries abroad. We are partners together sharing our resources with each other. We still have material prosperity, while they outshine us in spiritual riches. A helpful display about the work of CMS, Crosslinks and Friends were placed in the church and a retiring offertory was taken to be shared with Crosslinks and Friends of Nakuru.

The benefice Missionary Committee has decided that in this significant year a Benefice Missionary Gift Day should be held on the occasion of the Benefice Service at Guestling Church on 31 October 1999. Early in the Autumn information will be available, together with allocation sheets and envelopes for the gifts. We trust that the churches will give prayerfully and sacrificially, and also allocate a significant gift to CMS on their anniversary. Last year Fairlight managed to raise £2,000 for the Missionary Gift. It would be really encouraging if the benefice could reach that figure this year, and even surpass it. God promises to bless those who give generously, "Give and it will be given to you ... the measure you give will be the measure you receive". (Luke 6:38)

PETT PUZZLE '99

In Puzzle 'B' you are required to determine which of the four interviewers held the job application letters. By solving either of the puzzles you may win a £10, £5 or £2 prize.

11 NATURE NOTES

Some young cattle had just been let out of their winter quarters and were full of the joys of Spring. They spotted a small furry thing in the grass and went to investigate. Up went the rabbit's ears, and the cattle jumped back. After some thought they approached it again and this time the rabbit lolloped away, the cattle in pursuit. After a few yards the rabbit stopped and turned - the cattle stopped - the rabbit moved towards them and the cattle ran away. Then the cattle stopped and turned and the game was repeated. It was really delightful to see such big animals playing with such a small one.

Another happy encounter on Lunsford Farm was with a moorhen trying so very hard to persuade her three black fluffy chicks to keep together. One disappeared into the cattle shed, oblivious to its mother's loud commands. She eventually went off after it and emerged triumphant, only to find that the other two had ambled off in different directions. She rounded them up without too much trouble but, of course, by then number one was back in the cattle shed. In the end it took her nearly ten minutes to get all three babies together, at which point I would have given her a round of applause had I not been afraid of startling them into scattering again.

In the grass verge outside John and Frances Read's house in lcklesham are three lovely Bee Orchids. John phoned ESCC when the rosettes first appeared and they put up tapes to prevent the mowing contractors cutting the verge.

Three of my baby blue tits didn't live long enough to leave the nest. If the remaining six avoid getting caught by a cat or hit by a car, they have a pretty good chance of at least surviving the rest of the summer. At the moment they are trying to get to grips (literally) with the peanut holder. I am keeping the lid of my well firmly closed in case any of the babies falls down it.

Our new District Councillor, Robin Patten, attended the meeting and showed a welcome interest in Council affairs. The routine details of Parish affairs can seem very tedious, but must be dealt with - and dealt with properly - if things are to run smoothly. Both Robin and Eddie live on the Level, so will be able to keep a close eye on problems arising at that end of the Parish.

NEWS OF THE BANNER GROUP

Just seven weeks ago a small group of June Dyer, Beryl Holmes, Maureen Horscroft and I started work on the Fairlight banner. After praying we came up with the vision of a light/beacon and the words 'Walk in the Light'. The schedule was tight but in three weeks the task was completed and ready for the Rogation Service.

Our second project, a banner for Pett. By this time June Woodcock had joined the group. With a specification from Pett and artistic licence on our part, we got down to planning a simple design. Then lightning struck, our cry "Can we finish it on time for it to be hung in Rye Church for the final service of the special Deanery weekend "Walking the Way"? It is now in our dining room along with Guestling and Fairlight banners waiting to be transported to Rye.
