


Edward is Every Day Without A Road Death

Man jailed for three years for burglary in Hastings

A man has been jailed for three years for burgling a house in Hastings after fingerprint evidence linked him to the crime.

Billy Kent, 20, of Wishing Tree Road in St Leonards, was sentenced at Lewes Crown Court on Tuesday (8 September).

Officers attended a property in Bexhill Road on 29 June following a report of a burglary overnight. The victim had gone to bed about 10.30pm on 28 June and awoken at 06.45am the following morning to find an I-pad, £30 cash and some tobacco had been stolen.




Action Fraud scam watch

Did you know scams cost the UK economy £5-£10 Billion a year, with over 50% of people over 65 having already been targeted by scams; and only 5% of all scams reported?

This week's scam and fraud warnings from Action Fraud:

 We've received over 1,000 reports in 24 hours about these FAKE penalty charge emails. The links in the emails lead to websites that are designed to steal your personal and financial details. If you receive one, report it to: Report@phishing.gov.uk



 Urgent-sounding messages that ask for your personal or financial details are a common tactic used by criminals. If you receive a suspicious email, you can report it <u>here</u>

SCAM WARNING

Fake penalty charge emails reported over 1,000 times in 24 hours

Action Fraud has received more than 1,400 reports about fake emails purporting to be from HM Courts & Tribunals Service. The emails state that the recipient has been issued a penalty charge for "the use of a vehicle on a road in the charging area which a charging scheme applies without payment of the appropriate charge". The links provided in the emails lead to genuine-looking phishing websites that are designed to steal personal and financial information.

- Your bank, or any other official organisation, won't ask you to share personal information over email or text. If you need to check that it's a genuine message, call them directly.
- Spotted a suspicious email? Forward it to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS) - Report@phishing.gov.uk
