La Cucina di Angela

Ciao. My name is Angela and I am Italian. I have been living in the UK for 24 years, and 1 year ago I moved down to East Sussex. My husband and I love this area!

I always had a big passion for different cuisines, and I really hope you will all enjoy my recipes. Please feel free to change some ingredients according to your tastes and don't be scared to use your imagination.

This month I will start with a simple sauce, Pesto alla Genovese (Genovese Pesto).

The word Pesto originates from the Genovese word pesto, which in Italian means 'to pound or to crush'. This refers to the way the sauce was made at the beginning of the 16th century, which was when it first was created. It traditionally consists of crushed garlic, basil and pine nuts (or in some modern versions walnuts or pistachio) blended with Parmesan cheese.

I remember my mom used to mix the pesto sauce with fresh pasta and, before serving, sprinkle it with more Parmesan cheese.

This recipe for us marked the Spring season and created in all of us a joyful sense of anticipation for the coming of Easter

Pesto alla Genovese

Ingredients (enough for 4 people)

2 garlic cloves 50g pine nuts (or pistachios) 120g fresh basil, stems removed 9 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil (or more if you like) 50g grated Parmesan cheese

Crush the garlic and the pine nuts in a mortar (or if you wish a food processor) and pound or process until finely chopped. Add the basil and the olive oil until you have a puree. Season to your personal taste with salt and pepper and then mix in a handful of Parmesan cheese.

You can add this immediately to the pasta or store in a jar covered by a layer of oil.

Keep in a cool place remembering that as this is a fresh sauce it is not going to last more than few days.

LORD-LIEUTENANT OPENS THE ARCHIVE RESOURCE CENTRE!

Andrew Blackman, the Lord-Lieutenant for East Sussex, officially opened the Archive Resource Centre (ARC) at the Pett Methodist Chapel on Saturday 12th February. Over 120 people turned out to celebrate the opening and to view the fascinating exhibitions, share memories and enjoy a slice of cake and a cup of tea! In addition, local Fairlight historian Haydon Luke, gave two fascinating talks about a few of the more famous artists associated with the area, including Reginald Eves, Jacob Epstein, Graham Coton and Mark Gertler, and we were fortunate to have an exhibition of original paintings by two of these artists, together with a stone chipping, believed to have come from one Jacob Epstein's sculptures (Venus?), which was found in the garden he once lived in in Pett Level!

Lord-Lieutenant, Andrew Blackman commented,

"The Archive Resource Centre is a fabulous resource for anyone interested in the life and history of Fairlight, Guestling and Pett - how incredibly lucky we are to have such an impressive archive in our own backyard.



I know just how much hard work, commitment and determination have gone into making the ARC happen - thank you to volunteers, supporters, committee members and sponsors."

Fran Rogers, Chair of the ARC, gave a short history of its progress since being founded in 2019. The ARC is a community archive project for the parishes of Fairlight, Guestling Pett, with the aim of collecting, preserving and making available, either physically or digitally, photographs, documents, oral histories, maps and artifacts which tell the stories of the three adjoining parishes.

Since 2019, and despite Covid, the ARC has been busy fundraising and applying for various grants. Fran commented that this Open Day was an opportunity to thank Rother District Council and Ward Councillors Roger Bird and Andrew Meir, The Isobel Blackman Foundation, and the respective parish councils of Fairlight, Guestling and Pett. In addition, many individuals across the area have made donations large and small to the Friends fund.

The ARC has now secured a permanent home at the Methodist Church in Pett. Our next step is to raise sufficient funds to purchase specialised archive software that will enable us to make much of the collection available online. We will announce regular opening times in the near future so Friends can come and visit.

GUARDIANS OF PETT CHURCHYARD

On Saturday 19th February we held our last push into Spring. Braving the last of the storms we finally managed to clear the backlog of waste created over the past few months, planted primroses and genarally tidied.

Alan Kenworthy visits regularly to understand what level of biodiversity there is, and recently added to the list Common Snowdrops and Lesser Celandines, and possibly the caterpillar of an Angel Shades moth.

Over the coming months we will be placing signs around the churchyard describing what can be found, and why we are doing certain things. As examples

WHY HAS THIS PATCH BEEN LEFT BARE?

This patch used to be covered with bramble and an invasive vine of some sort. Volunteers have dug out as much of that as possible and we will try and stop it re-growing.

It has been proven experimentally that the quickest way to increase biodiversity in a degraded space is to remove the adverse stresses (bramble and vine) and to allow the space to regenerate naturally.

Rather than wading in with packets of seed or plug plants, we are just going to wait and see what comes up. The soil will be full of dormant seeds just waiting for light and growing space, so hopefully in a few weeks this will be covered in seedlings.

POLLINATORS IN THE CHURCHYARD RED-TAILED BUMBLEBEE

This is one of 24 UK bumblebee species and one of 7 very common bumblebee species.

Queens like this will emerge in Spring. She will feed herself on pollen, then she will nest, and lay her eggs in an underground hole.

The eggs will eventually hatch into worker bumblebees that look just like her, but smaller. About 3 months later males will emerge from the nest. These will look just like the queen but have a bright yellow stripe behind the head and a bright yellow face.



WHY HAVE WE STOPPED MOWING THIS PATCH?

We are leaving this patch to encourage wildflowers to grow, to flower, and to set seed. This will help them compete with the grass. There are many wildflowers growing in this patch already, but with the previous mowing regime, very few of them got to flower, let alone to set seed.

We want flowers rather than grass to attract pollinating insects. We want to encourage pollinating insects because ultimately, they are responsible for providing a large part of our diet. Without pollinators there would be no tomatoes, aubergines, strawberries or apples, not to mention the seeds we need to grow brassicas and root retables.

ere are many different types of pollinating insects—mblebees, Solitary Bees, Beetles, Hoverflies, and even 18th and Butterflies play their part. The insects that we ract are of course, somewhere near the bottom of the 18th chain and more flowers may attract more birds or all mammals. The more species we attract, the more idiversity we will have, which will lead to a healthier system.

is is an experimental patch. Depending on what thrives, doesn't, this year, we may extend the patch or find newhere different.

GARDENING CLUB

Our February meeting included the AGM and payment of member subscriptions.

It was very pleasing to have so many renewals from our loyal members and to welcome new members, especially heartening given the continuing pandemic.

We were also very pleased to welcome our speakers for the evening, Ann Novotny, assisted by David Penfold, with a talk entitled "Discovering the World of the Iris."



Ann lives locally now but worked as a schoolteacher in London for many years. Her interest in irises stemmed from her family connections, one of her father's sisters, Katherine, having married William Rickatson Dykes, the recognised world authority on irises in the 1920s. William had already written a book, "The Genus Iris", still today regarded as the definitive book on these beautiful, varied and bold flowers, before meeting Katherine, and she joined him in moving and replanting thousands of plants from his original garden to the new home they bought together. Tragically William died in a car accident only a couple of years later, but Katherine continued breeding, hybridising, promoting and selling irises, becoming in the process quite renowned in her own right. Once again tragedy struck when she too died in an accident, this time a train crash as she returned home from the Chelsea Flower Show.

Ann never knew her aunt as she died the year Ann was born, but naturally she was interested in the family story and, having settled in Hastings, she began growing bearded variety irises. We were shown a photo of "Gudrun", a tall, stately white iris, flourishing in a pot in its happiest environment, in the sunshine. Gudrun was a hybrid produced by Katherine Dykes in 1930, for Ann a great privilege to be able to grow in the present day a beautiful iris created by her own aunt. Ann told us that specifically, bearded irises prefer an open, well-drained and sunny place, with no competition from other types of plants - a perfect illustration of "right plant, right place". In time Ann's small garden became an issue - too little space to grow sufficient plants to do them justice. An opportunity then came about to plant irises in an area of St. Clement's churchyard, in between the old gravestones, where they continue to establish and flourish, as the lovely photos we were shown ably illustrated.

Over the years Ann's connections with William and Katherine Rickatson Dykes, coupled with her own promotion of iris growing have led to her being recognised as something of an expert on the world of bearded irises, even being invited to Sissinghurst to exchange her knowledge with them. As for William Rickatson Dykes himself, his contribution to the world of irises continues in a highly coveted medal, conceived by the British Iris Society in 1926 in his memory and awarded annually to the hybridiser of the most outstanding new iris variety. Ann had brought a medal with her, which she passed round for us all to appreciate.

Our next meeting will be on **Tuesday March 8th at 7.30 p.m.** in the Catherine Holman Room at Pett Village Hall, when Linda Pearson will update us on the refurbishment of the greenhouses at Alexandra Park, which we plan to visit in July.

PETT ON THE KNIT

I recently sent off four blankets, made up of over 300 squares, to Knit for Peace. You may have seen pictures of them on the Pett and Pett Level Facebook page. Thank you to all those who helped with them, and to Jenny Grist for crocheting them together.

With the blankets went three soft knitted toys (see picture) and three babies' coats, beautifully made.

Knit for Peace

I am getting low on double knitting wool, so if you have any to spare, even odds and ends, or would like to donate some - which can be bought cheaply from charity shop - that would be greatly appreciated.

Our Pett on the Knit project is to knit squares for the blankets, which are then crocheted together. The dimensions and pattern for the squares are repeated below. Squares should measure 12.5cms (5 inches) square, be made of synthetic DK wool, and knitted on No 4mm (old fashioned No 8) needles.



Blanket Square Pattern: (knit diagonally)

Cast on 1 stitch.

Row 1: kf&b (2 stitches)

Row 2: K1, kf&b (3 stitches)

Row 3: K1, kf&b, k1 (4 stitches)

Row 4: K1, kf&b, k2 (5 stitches)

Row 5: K1, kf&b, k3 (6 stitches)

Row 6: K1, *K1, kf&b, knit to end of row*

Repeat the 6th Row from * to * until side of the square measures 12.5 cms or 5 ins exactly.

Begin to decrease.

Next Row: K1, k2tog, knit to end of row. Repeat this row until 2 stitches remain.

Next Row: K 2 together.

Tidy up wool ends by sewing into square.

Abbreviations: K = Knit, Kf&b = knit into the front and back of the same stitch, K2tog= knit two stitches together.

PETT PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

The council did not have a regular meeting in February, although it may have to have an extra meeting to consider a planning application and one other matter, which I will give details of next month if this meeting goes ahead. In the mean time, councillors have been continuing to develop various projects.

Meetings have been held to make decisions on the Platinum Jubilee footpath map that I mentioned last month: what should go on it, how it should be produced and what kind of mounting should be used. This all has to be completed by June in order to obtain a grant from Rother District Council towards the cost.



The council has also applied to obtain permission to put up notices banning parking on some of the verges in the village. This is a problem that has given rise to complaints for some time now and we shall see if our application is successful.

Another project is to develop an award for contributions to the community, similar to awards in other parishes. We are currently drawing up terms of reference, including deciding what form the award should take.

I was pleased to attend the formal launch of the Archive Resource Centre (ARC) at the Methodist Chapel early in February. While, of course, ARC covers both Fairlight and Guestling as well as Pett, as it will be housed in Pett, the parish council is particularly happy to support it. Our thanks go to all who have worked hard to set it up (and will, of course, continue to work to provide a useful service), as well as to the Methodist Chapel for providing the space to house it. It was gratifying that the launch event was attended not only by the Lord Lieutenant and both district and county councillors, but also our MP. So, if you have family records of any kind, don't throw them away; consider lodging them (or, if you want to keep them, a copy of them) with ARC.

The other thing that has happened in February has been the work on the trees between the village hall and the allotments. Essentially, potentially dangerous branches have have been removed, along with the dead wood. The parish council is grateful to the village hall management committee for agreeing to share the cost.

On a wider scale, I attended the East Sussex Council Chairmen's Forum. This is a useful event at which information from both government and the National Association of Local Councils is passed down. It also provides a conduit for passing information relating to shared issues to the national association and organisations such as East Sussex Highways and the police. Issues that came up at the recent meeting included: the Platinum Jubilee and tree planting schemes; the Levelling Up White Paper; whether councils will be able to hold virtual meetings if they wish (it looks as though this may eventually come about); issues of civility and respect (mainly, but not exclusively at meetings) on behalf of both councillors and members of the public; national negotiations on local government pay (including parish clerks); citizens of which EU states will be allowed to vote in the 2023 elections; and, as ever, Highways and the police. Issues raised by council chairmen were to do with the algorithm used for calculating how many houses should be built in a district and how street lighting is funded, neither of which, I am pleased to say, affects Pett directly.

Finally, I am sorry to report the deaths of Jean Barrett James, a long-time resident of Pett Level, and Felicity Tyas after a long battle with cancer. Our sympathies go to both their families.

MAIS OU SONT LES NEIGES D'ANTAN? (BUT WHERE ARE THE SNOWS OF YESTERYEAR?)

This refrain from the famous fifteenth century poem by Francois Villon (latterly sung by Georges Brassens) has persisted over the centuries. And it so often seems to fit in with all sorts of nostalgic feelings. Why do I refer to it now other than to show off that I know a bit of French as well as Latin?

Because when thinking of the parish church, many of us look back nostalgically to a time when there was a parish priest in every parish and often a curate too, a time when the parish church was definitely the centre of village life, a time when no one moaned about the church being short of money nor constantly turned to rather desperate fund-raising, a time when Scripture was taught at school and multiculturalism was yet to arrive. (One of my grandsons tells me he prefers Ancient Greek myths to Bible stories...he clearly considers they have equal importance.)

I mention all this now because on 8th March our new Rector for the parish of Pett, Jonathan Meyer, will be licensed at a special service in Pett Church. He is already Rector of Winchelsea and of Icklesham and we will share him with those parishes. This idea of sharing parish priests is quite common in the modern Church of England. There is certainly no need to despair. You may wonder what advantages there could possibly be in this sort of scheme. I suggest there are a few benefits: for example, we will appreciate more the time the new Rector can give to us in Pett and not take him for granted; we will be able to continue to have some services conducted by the popular retired priest Kay Burnett; there will be quite a bit of lay involvement which at the very least gives a more democratic flavour to the church. In addition, we will also be able to look beyond our parish and have the chance to try out the other churches in our new grouping.

Do think of coming along to the Evensong service at **Pett Church at 4pm on 8th March**, if only to take a look at the new Rector. Whatever else happens, we can be sure that God is with us and supports us all.

The Church Council is responsible for the two churches in Pett & Pett Level and are now seeking a new Treasurer.


You **do not** need to be a qualified accountant, and the financial needs of the two churches are not complex, as the amount of income is sadly relatively low, but it's important that a potential treasurer is reasonably financially competent, and has the ability to maintain a basic accounts book, have access to a computer and be able to undertake simple banking transactions online.

Some of the following skills and characteristics would be helpful:

- Be in harmony with the Parochial Church Council (PCC), the parish priest and the wider church.
- Be prepared to gain an understanding of the parish, its needs and challenges.
- Be prepared to attend the local church council meetings, (six time a year), not only to deal
 with financial matters, but also in order to be aware of the PCC's plans.
- Be able to explain financial issues clearly, both within the PCC and to the general church membership.
- Be able to maintain confidentiality, particularly with respect to matters that relate to individual church members; e.g. their personal giving.

NATURE NOTES

Spring is on its way. The winter still has plenty to throw at us yet, but the natural world is starting to wake up with buds swelling on trees and bushes and birds starting to pair up and look for nest sites.

As part of the Guardians of Pett Churchyard initiative, I have been regularly visiting the churchyard to continue compiling an inventory of the species to be found there. This week I found two new plant species - Common Snowdrops and Lesser Celandine. I'm sure neither species are new to the churchyard, but only Lesser Celandine appeared on the original inventory taken in 1989. I suspect that the original survey may have ignored snowdrops because even though they are naturalized in the UK, they are an introduced species. It is also possible that since snowdrops have a relatively short flowering period so if a visit was not made in early spring they could have been missed. Both Snowdrops and Lesser Celandine lose their leaves after flowering, so a later survey would have found no trace of them. There is a grand display of Primroses there as well but they are still in their pots waiting for the next working party to plant them out.

On my latest visit I was guite surprised to find a fairly large caterpillar sunning itself on a plant stem. Looking through my caterpillar book, I thought it most resembled the caterpillar of the Cabbage Moth. Though the Cabbage Moth is aptly named for feeding on many leafy vegetables including cabbages, it also feeds on a wide variety of both wild and cultivated plants including trees such as willow and aspen. However, I uploaded the photo to a Facebook moth group for a more expert opinion. The species they suggested was the Angle Shades moth. This, as an adult, is a particularly striking moth with strongly marked wings that are held in folds when at rest. It should be noted that both the Angle Shades and the Cabbage moth caterpillars are bright green and both can be found at any time of year, so I wasn't surprised that the record was rejected by the county moth recorder who said that it would have to be reared to adulthood to be certain of an identification.



We attended a rather late post-Christmas lunch recently with the Short-haired Bumblebee project. As you may suspect, there are some real entomologists among their number, some of whom are still involved in research at universities.

When the conversation moved on from the weather and the convivial location, it turned to current research and one particular line of research was to investigate the effect of caffeine on bumblebees. I have no idea what the ultimate purpose of that research is but it turns out that just as caffeine gives humans a bit of a boost, feeding nectar containing caffeine to bumblebees has a similar effect on them. They are investigating whether it allows them to forage more efficiently, and also whether it affects their memory for forage sites.

There are, it turns out, several natural sources of caffeine-laced nectar. Coffee and tea are the obvious ones, but there are several other plants that produce caffeine, perhaps the most surprising being saffron, which is, of course a species of crocus. Plants produce many bitter, and even poisonous compounds as a defence against being eaten, and caffeine is one of those bitter compounds (though not so bitter when carefully roasted and brewed). Clearly the research is ongoing, but I missed out on some of the detail because then the coffee arrived.

NUTHATCH: THE BIRD TABLE BUCCANEER BY MICHAEL BLENCOWE OF THE SUSSEX WILDLIFE TRUST

Back garden birdwatchers know there's a pecking order on the peanut feeder.

Coal Tits are elbowed out by Blue Tits who in turn are ousted by Great Tits. But when the Nuthatch shows up, everything scarpers. With its streamlined body, blue back, pink chest and black eye-stripe, the Nuthatch cuts a dynamic figure; a swashbuckling, bird table buccaneer. The weapon it wields is a stout, dagger-like beak but it's not designed for skewering birds. Nuthatches are nuts about nuts.

The Nuthatch's name comes from 'nut hacker' in reference to the bird's habit of jamming hazelnuts and acorns into tree crevices and then using its powerful bill to noisily smash them open.



There is an old Sussex name which fits this manic, intense bird perfectly: Nutjobber. I have never seen this nutty little bird sitting still. They're so crazy about climbing that they're the only British bird that can actually climb headfirst down a tree.

At this time of year our garden birds become more vocal and aggressive as they claim and defend territories and croon their tunes to attract a mate. Spring lacks this urgency for the male Nuthatch. He hasn't stopped fighting all winter as he angrily defends his hectare of woodland. Nuthatches are monogamous too and the loyal pair soon dispense with spring serenades and get down to the hard work of making a home.

Many birds start from scratch. Twigs and moss are laboriously collected and nests are painstakingly woven. Nuthatches however are happy to let someone else undertake the heavy construction work. Their residence of choice is a spacious tree cavity drilled and abandoned by a woodpecker. Sure, it needs a bit of work but the Nuthatches will make do and mend. The main problem is the front door. It's too big. This gaping hole can let in predators or Starling squatters who will happily turf out nesting Nuthatches. So while the male keeps guard the female Nuthatch starts bricking up the entrance hole. Her bill is used like a plasterer's trowel to smear mouthfuls of mud until the terracotta porch is perfectly Nuthatch sized. She is a compulsive builder and if they move into a nestbox she still cannot resist plastering mud around the hole, even if it's already the right size.

And it's great to report on a bird that's actually increasing in number and range. Once restricted to south-east England, the Nuthatch now breeds in Scotland - probably assisted by the provision of garden peanut feeders as it marched north.

As Britain seemingly gets crazier by the day it's nice to know there's still space for a few more Nutjobbers.
