PETT PARISH COUNCIL - DAVID PENFOLD, CHAIR

The council met in March. It agreed to pay for the Platinum Jubilee footpath map that I have mentioned previously; towards this we have had a grant from Rother District Council, but, as I said last month, the project has to be completed by June in order to obtain the grant. I have invited the Lord Lieutenant to be present at the unveiling ceremony.

The council also agreed that I should sign the new allotments lease, which runs to 2025, and decided to look at alternatives to Speedwatch as a way of reducing speeding through the village.

Although the proposed development is in Fairlight, the council agreed to resubmit its objections to the proposal for a housing estate at Wakeham's Farm; this was rejected by the Rother planning committee, but it has gone to appeal. The council's submission was modified to emphasise the potential problem of increased foul water going to the treatment plant, but not being treated and therefore affecting the Marsham Sewer, which, of course, runs through Pett Level.

I was happy to attend the Commissioning Service at the parish church for Rev. Jonathan Meyer. Already Rector at Winchelsea and Icklesham, he has agreed to take Pett under his wing as well. The service was well attended and a collection made towards Ukraine charities. With regard to the latter, local councils are looking at how they can help.

I have attended two seminars in recent weeks, the first on how Sussex Police plan to use data in a more constructive way, turning millions of records of phone calls, crimes, investigations and court trials into a tool to drive productivity and make people safer. The new database system will enable officers to predict trends, identify serial offenders, study crime hotspots and devote more time to victims. The Chief Constable, Jo Shiner, stated that, whilst people argue that there should be more police officers on the beat, the use of data analytics will help make better decisions on where that visibility should be. Thus, it is now even more important that any crime, however minor, is reported to the police and not just posted on Facebook or notified to Neighbourhood Watch. And you must get a crime number, not just an incident number.

The second seminar was on how Rother are improving the way they handle planning enforcements. Since the new system was introduced, the number of outstanding enforcement cases has been reduced by 37% with a new triage system in operation. Details of the enforcement procedure are given in the council's enforcement plan (see the appendix for details). This can be accessed at https://www.rother.gov.uk/wp-content/uploads/2022/02/Local-Enforcement-Plan-Policy-2022.pdf. It is perhaps worth noting that 40% of complaints turn out not to be planning breaches at all, but often disputes between neighbours.

The annual parish meeting is on 28 April; organisations in the parish will be asked if they wish to say something about their activities. Incidentally, they can benefit from the new Rother Community Lottery;

see https://www.rothercommunitylottery.co.uk/.

GARDENING CLUB - JUNE HARRIS

This month's meeting was a change to the planned schedule due to illness, so we were immensely grateful to Kathrine Lynn for stepping in at, almost literally, the last moment to deliver a talk entitled "Tiptoe Through the Tulips". Kathrine is a keen and knowledgeable amateur gardener who gave us a colourful, interesting and very informative insight into the history, production and culture of this lovely spring flower.

Tulips were first known to be cultivated in the Ottoman Empire in the 15th century and their name is thought to derive from the huge bulb shaped headdress, called a

Tulipan, worn by Sultan Suleiman II, the ruler at the time. Tulips came originally from Turkey and China, where the hot dry summers and cold dry winters provided the best conditions for their successful growth - they are not happy in wet, heavy ground where they are likely to rot. We are accustomed to visiting gardens nowadays, but even in the 15th century tulip gardens were open to the public, who were encouraged to walk among and appreciate the flowers. An Austrian ambassador of the time, visiting Sultan Suleiman, was given some bulbs, thereby introducing them to Europe and over time Carolus Clusius, a notable botanist, further developed them in Holland in the late 16th century,



collecting seed, crossing and hybridising and producing bulbs for sale. Then, in 1593 the Hortus Botanicus in London was designed and created by Clusius to a plan still recognisable today, in the process firmly establishing tulip growing in this country. Indeed by 1742 a nurseryman's catalogue listed 665 tulip varieties!

Many will have heard of "Tulipmania" a period during which even a single tulip bulb could command a fantastic price of 1000 florins at a time when the average annual salary was 150 florins! It all began when growers exhibited "flaming" tulips, with flowers of one colour marked with what appeared to be a flame pattern in a contrasting colour and they quickly became highly prized as it was wrongly believed they were a very rare hybrid - in fact the markings were due to a virus! Everyone wanted to obtain these prized bulbs which they believed would make them rich, resulting in what amounted to a gambling frenzy, with prices rising madly as the demand increased and purchases often pledged in promissory notes, until one fateful day, February 3rd 1637, the bulbs at auction did not sell and thereafter prices tumbled with many losing all their money or becoming heavily indebted - Tulipmania was deemed madness and was no more!

Kathrine's talk was beautifully illustrated with slides of many lovely tulips we can all buy today and photos of the vast Dutch bulb fields, huge rainbow blocks of commercial flowers, carefully husbanded to remove rogue colours or poor specimens from the serried ranks of specific colours. The bulbs are harvested in July, the flowers being cut off and discarded to enable the goodness to go into the bulb's development and the plants lifted and dried off. Nowadays most of the work is done by enormous machines which plant the bulbs embedded in lengths of netting, which at harvest time is then hauled from the ground and rolled up, still with the bulb in place. In 2017 Dutch growers exported over 2 billion bulbs and 77% of the world's bulbs come from The Netherlands!

Kathrine offered growing tips for getting the best out of tulips, including planting firm, plump bulbs in November - December up to ten inches deep in prepared ground, using grit for drainage if necessary, or planting in pots if the soil is completely unsuitable, fertilising and watering when planting. She also showed many slides of different varieties of tulip, some early to flower, others late, explaining that, by choosing carefully, it is possible to have these lovely plants in flower from early April until the end



of May. She also dispelled the myth of the "Black Tulip"! Despite the name and the strenuous efforts of many growers over the centuries, even the darkest bulbs are shades of purple.

The evening concluded with slides of Keukenhof, the world-renowned stylised tulip and bulb gardens near Amsterdam, which Kathrine has visited many times over the years, where tulips are celebrated so creatively and in their masses from April-May only each year.

Our next meeting, on Tuesday April 12th at 7.30pm in the Catherine Holman room at Pett VH, will feature another popular flower, with Christine Bartlett delivering a talk entitled "Orchidmania - History of Orchids."

UKRAINE - ANGELA HAWKSLEY

When I was young, some people were a bit surprised that I could dance the Charleston with confidence. If they asked I used to explain that I learnt it during the Hungarian Revolution. In 1956, thousands of Hungarians escaped from Russian brutality and very many in this country raised money for the refugees in all sorts of different ways. A girl at my school taught the Charleston for sixpence per pupil. Also, I still have a small table which my mother bought for me at that time. She told me it was made by a Hungarian lawyer who was trying to requalify in this country.

These rather trivial personal reminiscences may well reflect current diverse fund-raising in aid of Ukrainians. I hope so. Funding will be needed for a long time.

Our new Priest-in-charge in Pett, Jonathan Meyer, has also pointed out that, even if we cannot invite refugees to live in our homes, we should make sure that we welcome them to our country in whatever way we can.

REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTORY - JONATHAN MEYER

Many of you may not be aware that you now have a new Priest in Charge at Pett. I am delighted to have been licensed to your parish on Tuesday 8th March. I am looking forward to working with the people of Pett and making links with my existing parishes of Winchelsea and Icklesham whenever that is possible. One of my duties will be to contribute something to your magazine from time to time. I apologise if this month seems to focus on Winchelsea but the thoughts underlying my reflection are intended to be universal. In future I look forward to meeting Pett people and no doubt I will find themes that resonate with you in particular.

It is not possible to write any kind of reflection or sermon for that matter at present without thinking about the dreadful situation in Ukraine. As so often happens when something of this magnitude takes place the news is almost entirely dominated by it. Certainly we need to be aware of the horrors taking place but as I constantly pray we need also to remember those other parts of the world where needless suffering is taking place. In some ways the humanitarian situation in Afghanistan at present is almost worse.

In the season of Lent we are using the Bishops Lent course, "Comfort Ye My People". It is a series of reflections from different Christians and clergy within the diocese. It is worth looking at his introduction, which starts,

"I'm very well, thank you." That's the response we normally give when people ask. It takes quite a lot of courage to say something else. So we live with the stuff that makes us not very well. And that can be a very heavy burden to bear.

The season of Lent offers us an opportunity to lay down the things that burden us. Lent is a season of safety when we can admit that not all is well. It gives us permission to review our lives and be honest about how we damage ourselves, other people and the world we inhabit.







REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTORY continued

I rather doubt he realised the significance these opening comments would have for us in the last couple of weeks. Things seemed to be improving with regard to the Covid pandemic and we were beginning to look forward and suddenly we are faced with greater problems. He goes on to refer to those words of Jesus,

"Come unto me those who are weary and carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest."

Perhaps this is the most important message of the gospels and indeed of this Lenten period as we prepare for Easter. In a shared humanity we can acknowledge what is wrong with the world and with our own lives and doing so together and in community in a strange way is a comfort and strength to us.

Many people have been seeking to raise money to support Ukraine and unprecedented sums have been raised in a short period. In Winchelsea we had an impromptu piano recital given by one of the young competitors from the international Hastings piano competition. He is Half Russian and had travelled from Moscow where he was studying. He cannot now return but has family in America. He was only too delighted to be able to play for us and support Ukraine. The event raised £5845 and I know people have given more money in other ways. It was supported by people from both Pett and Icklesham as well as Rye and other parishes.

Although it was a fantastic community effort that is not why I have raised it in this context. For me the most powerful aspect to the evening was being able to gather with between 250 and 300 people (standing room only) to acknowledge the enormity of what is happening, to accept that there is a limit to what we can do but most important of all to remember that we come together in our humanity. Some came without faith, some in faith; we came in different ways and yet there was a sense of shared need, shared fears and anxieties.

I believe Jesus does help us bear our burdens, seeking to understand that at least in part is what we should do during Lent and then we will be truly ready to accept and celebrate the risen Christ this Easter and always.

LA CUCINA DI ANGELA - Patate e baccalá (Cod and potatoes)

The origin of this recipe is very old, from around 1431, when Pietro Querini (a merchant from Venice) shipwrecked close to the Norwegian coast. When he came back to Italy, he imported this unknown fish called "cod" and introduced it to the Italian menu with all his methods for cooking, preservation and storage. During the following centuries cod became very popular in Italy, particularly in the south, and although there are different recipes from north to south, the Pugliese way of cooking it is for me one of the best. I grew up in a seaside town with the smell of baccalá – or cod fish – as my mum used to prepare it particularly around Christmas (frying it as the Italian tradition requires), but also during the year it can be a nice change to introduce into your cuisine.

FOR 3-4 PEOPLE

400g potatoes

35-40g finely chopped onions

40g finely chopped celery

250-270g cod (without skin and in fillets)

150g tinned tomatoes

4 tablespoons of extra virgin olive oil

50g green pitted olives

1.5 litres water (approx)

Some crostini bread



Peel the potatoes and cut them into big chunks. Heat the olive oil in a large casserole, then add the onion, celery, and olives. Toss the potatoes in the casserole for no more than 30 seconds, adding a bit of water and mixing with all the other ingredients and leave to cook without the lid for no more than three to five minutes. Add the tomato sauce and some water until the potatoes are almost covered and the tomatoes sauce is quite liquid, then leave it to cook until the potatoes are almost ready (it should take more or less 20 minutes). Make sure the tomato sauce doesn't thicken too much by adding some water occasionally, or it will stick to the pan and easily burn the ingredients.

When the potatoes are almost cooked lay the cod under those, towards the edge of the casserole and cover it by all the ingredients. Continue cooking for ten minutes or more, making sure the cod is covered by the tomato sauce as well, which should also partially covers the potatoes. This is a quite slow cook recipe, therefore needs cooking without the lid. That's why this needs the addition of small quantities of water from time to time to stop the tomato sauce from thickening too much, as it will evaporate quite quickly while cooking. You can let the sauce thicken a little bit only towards the end, when it is ready. Add some crostini bread on the side of the plate when serving and..

HAPPY 20TH ANNIVERSARY PETT VILLAGE HALL

30th March 2022, that day is the anniversary of 20 years since the opening of second Pett Village Hall. The ceremony was performed by Paul Merton, the television and radio celebrity, who was a resident at that time, he declared the

hall open. There are some extracts below taken from the Parish News of that time.

This new building replaced the old wooden building, which was located on the same side of the road, but nearer the church, there is a house now on that site, the clue is in the name. That land for the original hall was donated in 1923 by Mr and Mrs Frank Dennett, in memory of their son, who was killed in action in 1917.

The new village hall was build on land which was an another generous gift from residents, Evelyn and David Darnell, By December 1998, a leaflet outlining the plans for the new hall had been sent to all residents. In April 1999, the initial fundraising plan was drawn up and the first event held. Money had



been committed for the project from our Parish Council, Rother and ESCC. The National Charities Board were in possession of the application form and busy plan.

The Parish Magazine reported in July 1999, the formation of the fundraising group known as the **Friends of New Pett Village Hall**, who would be the driving force behind raising funds to build the new hall. Amazing people, with an unselfish commitment to the community. Some are still amongst us and others have moved on. Next time you are in the hall take a look around and appreciate what we have and give thanks to them.

NATURE NOTES - ALAN KENWORTHY

Spring is well under way now and things are moving quickly. Queen bumblebees are feeding themselves up after their hibernation and are looking for nesting sites. By the time you read this many of the spring bulbs will have finished flowering and hopefully the clocks will have been put back to where they belong. At this time of year though, sources of nectar and pollen can be quite scarce. We have a Flowering Currant and we grow Dwarf Comfrey, both of which are great plants for early foraging insects. Another good plant that I have tried, and failed, to grow is *Mahonia japonica*. This is an evergreen shrub that flowers through the winter and into the early spring and there are a few other *Mahonia* species available that give a similar boost to our beleaguered pollinators. If you want to improve the lot of early pollinators, then don't forget the humble Lungwort (*Pulmonaria officinalis*)

with its attractive spotty leaves and pinky-purple flowers. This common plant readily grows just about anywhere, so I was quite surprised to learn that it is not a native plant. If you have a passion for native plants, then there is a native species of Lungwort, the Narrow-leaved Lungwort (*Pulmonaria longifolia*), but you would need to travel to a small area around the Solent to see it growing wild. (Most pollinators are not that concerned about national boundaries, fortunately.)

As I have written in this column before, pollinators evolved before flowers did. Before flowers evolved



pollen would be wind-blown (as it still is for grasses) or occasionally transported by insects that found the pollen almost by accident. Evolution then favoured species that were more noticeable either visually - hence coloured petals - or from their scent. It makes me wonder whether the fact that humans find flower scent attractive is actually an evolutionary influence? In its random wandering through time, evolution has come up with many wonderful and bizarre ways for plants to ensure that their pollen gets to fertilize another flower. From the trigger plants of Australia that dab pollen onto the back of an insect when it lands on its petals to the Cuckoo Pint that traps insects in a chamber and then releases pollen onto them, and the Snapdragons that are so choosy that only bumblebees can force their way through the tight petals to get their nectar reward and a liberal covering of pollen.

NATURE NOTES continued

This preferential habit where one species of plant prefers a specific pollinator, and that pollinator equally prefers the specific plant, is very common in the natural world and is often taken to the extreme. (A dangerous extreme because if one species goes extinct, they both do.) One example among many is the Madagascan orchid that has a 12-inch nectar tube that can only be reached by a hawkmoth that has an equally long tongue. The moth is Wallace's Sphinx Moth, predicted by Darwin in 1862, and Wallace 5 years later and the orchid is the Malagasy Star Orchid. The moth was described as a full species in its own right only last year - Xanthopan praedicta.

I came across another really bizarre example of pollination mechanisms recently - that of closed flowers being pollinated by bats. The closed flowers are to be found on a tropical tree or shrub of the genus Dillenia. Because the trees grow in rainforests, if they were to open their flowers, then the pollen would get washed away by the rain. (Presumably other rainforest species took the easier evolutionary step of having their flowers face downwards!) If the flower is not visited by bats, then it is possible for the flowers to self-pollinate, but that has a very low success rate and they rarely set seed. If a bat does visit the flower, then it can't get at the nectar and pollen because the flower is closed, so the only option available to the bat is to rip off the corolla (petals) to lap up the nectar. This evolutionary dance has been fine tuned by the trees so that copious quantities of nectar are produced only for a very short period at night when the bats are active. Nature never ceases to amaze.

SUGGESTIONS FROM ANGELA HAWKSLEY

It sounds a bit smug, but I really do think our magazine is better than the other village magazines. It is useful, informative, entertaining and easy to read. Very occasionally the articles are too long for me but that is my only criticism. I am very grateful to the Editor and his team.

In the March edition, the Editor asks for more and different contributions. Some years ago I thought it would be a good idea for one of us to contribute a short poem (or part of a longer poem) and explain briefly why that poem means a lot. I started it off but that was it! Nobody else contributed a poem.

I wonder now whether we could have a series of say, book recommendations or suggestions of places to visit. It would also be interesting each month to read about an item in the Archive Resource Centre.



PETT ON THE KNIT - HEATHER GODWIN

At the beginning of March I received the following email:

Dear Pett on the Knit,

I am delighted to say that we have received your wonderful knitted donations, thank you so much. We look forward to delivering the knitted items, as they will undoubtedly make a big difference to those in need. Thank you for your support, we truly appreciate it.

All the latest information from Knit for Peace can be found in our monthly newsletter and on our Facebook page!

With warm wishes from all the team Lucy

The news from war-torn Ukraine brings into sharp perspective how our small contributions can make a big difference to the individuals receiving them. Our Pett on the Knit project is to knit squares for blankets, which are then crocheted together, but Knit for Peace accepts anything knitted with love: baby clothes, knitted toys, hats, scarves, gloves, socks.....

The dimensions and pattern for the squares are repeated below. Squares should measure 12.5cms (5 inches) square, be made of synthetic DK wool. and knitted on No 4mm (old fashioned No 8) needles.

Blanket Square Pattern: (knit diagonally)

Cast on 1 stitch.

Row 1: kf&b (2 stitches)

Row 2: K1, kf&b (3 stitches)

Row 3: K1, kf&b, k1 (4 stitches)

Row 4: K1, kf&b, k2 (5 stitches)

Row 5: K1, kf&b, k3 (6 stitches)

Row 6: K1, *K1, kf&b, knit to end of row*

Repeat the 6th Row from * to * until side of

exactly.

Begin to decrease.

Next Row: K1, k2tog, knit to end of row. Repeat this row until 2 stitches remain.

Next Row: K 2 together.

Tidy up wool ends by sewing into square.

Abbreviations: K = Knit, Kf&b = knit into the front and back of the same stitch, K2tog= knit two stitches together.

If you need any wool, let me know. I have quite a bit now, thanks to the generosity of people in the village. If you have any squares or items to donate please bring them to the Coffee Mornings, or to me at 2 Brambletye, Pett Road, near the Methodist Church. 
