### **Pett Parish Council Update**

The council met in July. Probably the most important issue discussed was to do with the flooding at Pett Level in January. Members of the Marsham Brook Residents Association, with the aid of our flood warden Chris Saint, are working on a plan to understand and, ideally, prevent, or at least reduce the effects of future flooding. In order to achieve this they are commissioning a hydrologist's report and the council agreed to fund this. At the same time, contacts and meetings with organisations such as Southern Water, the National Trust and the Environment Agency are continuing. It was also agreed that the flooding would be a standing item on the council's agenda and that, later in the year, a public meeting would be held to keep people more fully informed and to give them the opportunity to ask questions.

Also at the meeting, County Councillor Keith Glazier reported that the county would be spending more money on the roads over the next five years. He also noted that £300 million would be required to bring all the roads in the county up to an ideal standard, but this money is just not available. On the credit side, Councillor Glazier reported that the new contractor, Balfour Beatty, seem to be doing a better job with potholes than their predecessor. He also noted that the county audits ten percent of the work carried out by the contractor.

District Councillor Andrew Mier noted that he had had a meeting with the district council officer responsible for monitoring the use of mobile homes as permanent residences. It is good to know that this is being done. While one has sympathy with those who have nowhere else to live, it is important that holiday homes remain as holiday homes, not only because such accommodation needs to be available, but also because planning requirements are less strict on holiday homes and such homes do not pay for local government services, such as rubbish collection.

In an effort to reduce problems elsewhere, the parish council has agreed to extend the wire fencing on the south side of the recreation ground in order to stop cricket balls going over the fence into the adjoining garden. The existing fencing only goes part of the way along the boundary and has therefore been only partially effective.

Other matters discussed at the meeting were: erecting bollards on a blind corner on Chick Hill to stop parking there; planting a tree on 'Hyde Park' to celebrate both last year's Platinum Jubilee and the coronation of the new king; and producing a leaflet describing the Jubilee Way. Whether to declare a climate emergency was again deferred to the next meeting.

Again thanks go to Peter Felton, who has cleared footpath 18, which runs opposite the old police houses from Pett Road parallel to Rosemary Lane. Also thanks to Paul Turner for cutting the hedges round the village hall and to Andy Norcott for clearing the bottom half of the field behind the village hall, so that it can be used for parking at the Flower Show.

You may have noticed that Highways have carried out what is called the 'urban cut' of the verges in the centre of the village, improving sight lines for drivers and cyclists.

Last month, I mentioned the consultation on dogs in open spaces. At a recent meeting of the Rother Association of Local Councils it was agreed to suggest to the district council that a blanket by-law covering the whole district is inappropriate as different parishes have different requirements and practices. Also at that meeting, in a report from the new district inspector, Kara Tombling, she noted that clusters of parishes have now been allocated to each PCSO. The PCSO for Pett is Laura Harrison. However, Kara underlined the importance of reporting any incident via the 101 number so that it is correctly recorded and appropriate action taken. She also noted that there is a downward trend in crime in Rother, although there are, of course, still some pockets of crime and disorder.

### Gardening Club Notes - July 2023

This month's outing took us not far at all, to Stonelynk Organics in Fairlight, which has been growing and supplying organically grown vegetables to the local area for about five years. Stephen Atkinson, who runs the business with his wife Helene, was there to meet us and show us round, while explaining their ethos and the ups and downs of growing organic produce. They are certified by the Soil Association, which carries out annual inspections to ensure all practices are consistent with its regulations.

Stephen led us around the various growing areas. There are seven specific sections, which follow crop rotation principles to help prevent against disease build-up in the soil, since, as organic growers, they do not use chemical pesticides or fertilisers. The focus, therefore, is on ensuring the health of the soil by enrichment. Stephen said they see themselves as custodians of the soil first and foremost - the better the soil, the more the plants will thrive and the less likely they will be to suffer attack from pests and diseases. They raise almost all their plants from seed, meaning they can monitor the quality from the beginning. Stressed plants, for example, are weaker and more prone to slug damage and disease, which stronger plants are far less likely to suffer.

Once the crops are over for the season the tops are mown with a flail mower that shreds them into a mulch, which then becomes a green fertiliser. In the peas and beans section, the legumes, the roots left in the ground fix nitrogen in the soil which further enriches it. Protecting plants against predators is still necessary however, with different methods used to achieve this. Around the perimeters flowers are planted, which, besides being very attractive, help strengthen the biodiversity by attracting beneficial insects which predate the less welcome ones! Where further protection is still required, for brassicas for example, netting is used to guard against pigeons and butterflies, whilst finer netting protects carrots against carrot root fly and chipped bark is used generally both as a mulch and to keep weeds down.

Stephen and Helene continually plant and replant the sections with successive sowings, using early and late season varieties to extend the harvesting season where possible. They also have polytunnels where less hardy plants, tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, etc., are grown, so that they have an abundant variety of produce for their many customers.

We were very grateful to Stephen for giving us an informative, interesting and entertaining tour of Stonelynk. It was so much more personal and enjoyable to absorb organic gardening principles on site. Further information is available on Stonelynk Organics' website.



#### **Nature Notes**

Recently, a number of schoolchildren visited the churchyard. The visit was organized by Mallydams as part of a programme to introduce young people to the natural world. So that we would have something to show them, we put the moth trap out the night before. The star animal in the moth trap was the Elephant Hawkmoth. Not only is it a big, impressive animal, but it also has striking pink and olive-green colours, and it drew lots of ooh's and ahh's from the children. The question is though, what use are those colours to the moth? They only fly at night when the colours wouldn't show up, and besides that, how do they find the colourful flowers now on show in the churchyard? The answer is that we tend to think in terms of our own senses, rather than those of the hawkmoths. Yes, we can smell the flowers - but we wouldn't be able to pick out one strongly smelling flower full of nectar with our eyes closed, and we wouldn't have a chance of picking out a yellow flower on a green background on a dark night.

I recently came across an account of an interesting experiment to test the exceptional senses of the Elephant Hawkmoth. The scientists raised the moths and trained them to use nectar feeders rather than flowers. One nectar feeder was filled with sugar water, another was filled with just plain water. Each feeder was then placed in front of a blue or yellow background. The moths then used the background to choose the 'correct' feeder - the one containing sugar water. The scientists then turned down the lights in the lab until it was no brighter than a half-moon. The moths still found the correct feeder. Even at the level of dim starlight, the moths were still easily finding the right feeder, when the scientists themselves couldn't see the moths (but night vision cameras could).



Of course, the scientists had to be sure that the moths weren't using their legendary sense of smell to detect the sugar water feeder. To eliminate that, they simply placed each feeder in front of a plain white background. When faced with identical backgrounds, the moths showed no preference and visited both feeders equally. The scientists also tried reducing the amount of yellow and blue pigment on each background until both, to human eyes, were the same shade of grey. The moths, however, were still able to discriminate between the two backgrounds.

Another super-sense that most moths have is the ability to hear ultrasonic sounds. The term ultrasonic doesn't mean that there is anything special about the sound other than that it is outside the range of human ears. There is, of course, an obvious reason that moths can hear ultrasonic sounds and that is because their arch-enemy bats have a super-sense of their own echo-location -which uses ultrasonic sound. Echolocation, however, may not be such a super-sense after all. I recently saw a documentary about bats in which blind people were being taught to click their tongue and they were then able to detect solid objects like lampposts in their way. Even the programme's presenter was able to avoid a solid object in complete darkness by using tongue clicking.

Another couple of moths that the schoolchildren liked were the Brown-tail and Yellow-tail moths. Both are plain white and very fluffy round their head, legs, and thorax, as well as the edges of their wings. Why so fluffy? In just the same way that a stealth bomber doesn't reflect radar, a fluffy moth doesn't reflect ultrasound - another facet in predator-prey evolution.

### A History of Pett Methodist Chapel. Part 3 - War and Remembrance

Between 1914 and 1919 Pett, like every other community in Britain, saw many of its young men go off to war. A memorial inside the chapel honours the memory of those who failed to return.

Recent research leads us to conclude that the memorial was the handiwork of Mr. J Barden, as one almost identical in design (though larger to include names from both Pett and Fairlight) is described as being installed at the "Iron Room\*." Mr. Barden was a skilled craftsman and builder whose family connections to Methodism go back to the very beginning when members met in Barden's Forge before the building of the Chapel.

Originally, the memorial listed fourteen names. A fifteenth was added in 1920 when Private Sydney Fleet died, after the war ended, but because of injuries sustained during the conflict. Over 100 years later, local historians realised that two other local men were absent from the list and so the names of Leading Seaman William Brooman and Private George Weston were added, the skilfully

extended memorial being rededicated in a special service on 14th November 2021.

During that service, we heard something of the life stories of these two men, reminding us that these are not just names, but sons, brothers, husbands and fathers. Each entry records one life lost and others changed forever, as a letter from Signalman Bernard Foster illustrates. It was written in 1918, only days before his death, and sent to his daughter, Mary, then aged four.



Monday Sept 9th

My own Dear little Mary,

Today it is your birthday and Daddie sends you a little letter wishing you many happy returns of the day and I trust and pray that you may be spared to see many more and Daddie prays that before another birthday comes, he may be with you all again and this awful war finished. Daddie does so long to be with little Mary again and I know you want to see Daddie again. You must get Mamma to read this to you as I am sending her a few lines with yours. I hope you will have a happy birthday and may God Bless you and soon bring me back to you again.

With love and kisses from Daddie. Xxxxxxxxxx

\* The Iron Room was built by Florentia Lucas-Shadwell in memory of her late husband, William Drew Lucas-Shadwell who died in 1875. Built as a Mission Hut (Florentia was the daughter of Rev Henry Wynch, Rector of Pett 1823-53), the building served as a community meeting room during the early part of the 20th century. Being subsequently used for various purposes, it eventually fell into disrepair. Its remains can be seen, if you know where to look, in a private garden.

Next time - the post war years and the building of the "new" church.

# La Cucina de Angela

### Pennette in saffron cream

This recipe doesn't have a specific origin. I tried it a long time ago in a restaurant in Milan and since then I have made it thousands of times as it is incredibly tasty. According to history, the pennette pasta are born towards the end of the last century, when Giovanni Batista Capurro (a pasta maker from San Martino D'Albano, in the province of Genoa) decided to invent a machine able to cut pasta diagonally without breaking it.

Personally I love this recipe as it is also easy and quick to prepare.

#### Ingredients

400g pennette pasta 50g shallots, finely chopped

300g single cream 250-300g pancetta cubes

4 teaspoons grated parmesan cheese (to sprinkle) 2g saffron 4 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

Seasoning (pepper and salt)

Boil some water and add some salt then cook the pasta according to the instructions on the package.

At the same time, in a frying non-stick pan, put the oil and the shallots to fry. When they are soft and golden, add the pancetta cubes and cook for a few minutes until crispy.

At this point add the saffron and a glass of water from the cooking pasta, allowing the water to evaporate for a couple of minutes.

Meanwhile the pasta should be cooked, so use a sieve to drain the water and mix the pasta with the other ingredients. Mix well and pour the single cream over it. Continue to stir then serve with a sprinkle of parmesan cheese, and season with black pepper and...

### My Garden Blog

Some rain, much wind and plenty of sunshine. I am currently spending a lot of time watching Wimbledon. One of the most infuriating things is seeing loads of rain there interrupting matches and having none here. It would be perfect if we have rain here, avoiding the need to water, whilst watching a sunny Wimbledon. Thank goodness for the covered courts!

I made a mistake with my peas, which were producing many mangetout and sugar snaps, when I realised my plastic fencing, which was doing a good job of keeping the peas safe within, did not stop the pigeons perching on top and nibbling the new shoots which had reached the top! I have rescued a few but lost out as the plants are beginning to die off.

However, the French and runner beans are coming along well and are nearly ready to start picking. Also doing well are courgettes and I am just finishing off the broad beans. Tomatoes in the greenhouse are fruiting well and need a little while longer to ripen, the cucumbers are now producing fruit too. Failures this year include spinach, which is normally guaranteed but the slugs seem to have had most of it. For years I have had abject failures with carrots and promised not to bother again but I found an old packet of seeds and threw them on an unprepared bed and hey ho, they have grown. This is the mystery of gardening!

I was working on the rockery the other day when I came across a large excavation under one of the stones - in it were a few angry bees/wasps. I concluded that the badger had been at work as there was a mound of excavated soil below the hole. I left it well alone and worked around it! I am still unsure as to whether it is a bee or wasp residence. Talking of bees - a huge swarm flew over the garden and settled in one of next door's apple trees. It is quite surreal being surrounded by the cloud of humming bees as they make their way to their next settling point.

I am still waiting for a surge of butterflies as the buddleias are now in bloom. There has been bee activity on the lavenders but only a few butterflies so far. I have left patches of nettles whilst weeding hoping they will attract.

Hedges, brambles and weeds have all gone berserk, so it is very difficult to keep everything under control, and so I haven't even tried. I will work on the basis that the birds will be very happy with the blackberries and other wild fruits.

I mentioned the fruit cage last month fearing badger incursion. That has not happened, but I fear rats have taken the strawberries as there are small holes dug under the fencing - too small for badgers, too big for mice. That will be yet another challenge for next year!

The pond is not doing as well as I would like. It is very green and sludgy so will need a big overhaul in the autumn. The frogs, however, are very happy with it and are being extremely noisy with whatever their communications with each other mean.

Fox family is doing very well with the cubs doing their own thing and coming up unattended any time after 8.30pm. Badger comes up later but still seems to find some crumbs worth having. Badger and foxes graze close to each other with no aggression. When Samson did a mock charge on one of the adult foxes the other night the fox just looked at him disdainfully and ignored him! Don't know what reaction Samson wanted as he doesn't like it when the seagull dive bombs him!!

#### **Water Shrew**

I love Jaws, the 1975 movie which sent three men out into the Atlantic on a fishing boat in search of a marauding Great White Shark. There's another aquatic monster hunting in the ponds and shallow streams of Sussex. But to find a Water Shrew...you're gonna need a smaller boat.

Water Shrews weigh 15g and measure just 16cm. Unlike other shrews they have an amazing ability to swim and hunt underwater. They're covered



in dense fur - vital insulation against the cold and wet. This sleek wetsuit also traps air bubbles, transforming the shrew into a furry Aero helping it stay buoyant. Powerful, extra hairy hind feet propel this tiny torpedo through the water.

Water Shrews and Great White Sharks have a common feature that sets them apart from their close relatives. They both have a striking demarcation between their dark upperparts and their white underparts. Looking from above, their black backs blend with the pond bottom or seabed. From below, their pale bellies make them invisible in the sunlit water. It's a submarine survival strategy that helps conceal both hunters and hunted. And the Water Shrew is both.

With sharp, red-tipped fangs, a Water Shrew's jaws are as fearsome as any shark's. But the Water Shrew has a trick up its teeth. It's Britain's only venomous mammal. When it bites it injects a stupefying saliva which subdues its victims. In *Jaws*, the grizzled skipper Quint (Robert Shaw) relates the chilling true tale of the torpedoed WWII cruiser Indianapolis, which sank leaving hundreds of sailors adrift in shark-infested waters. Well, my mate Barry was once bitten by a Water Shrew in Newhaven and his finger went all tingly for about two hours. OK, it doesn't exactly compare, but the fact that a tiny shrew can make such an impact on a human is pretty impressive.

Slice open a dead shrew's stomach and rummage inside and you'll find bits of beetle legs, snail shells, and fishbones. They are relentless, frenetic hunters. If the shrew goes without a meal for more than an hour it will die. What we are dealing with here is a perfect engine, an eating machine. All this machine does is swim and eat and make little shrews. Between April and September, the mating of the shrew can produce 2-3 litters of 3-15 young. They live a fast, brief life. Few of them will survive for more than a year.

The best way to see a Water Shrew is to sit by a Sussex stream as the sun sets. Bring a couple of friends and some Apricot Brandy, share some tall tales, and wait for a shrew to strike.
